Section 233.0659, Florida Statutes, is 11 12 created to read: 13 233.0659 Recitation of the Declaration of 14 Independence. --The Legislature finds and declares that: 15 (1)The horrific attack on America and its ideals on 16 (a) 17 September 11, 2001, mandated that a war be declared against 18 the inhumane barbarism of terrorists. It promises to be a long 19 war. The strongest weapon in our arsenal is the firm American 20 character informed by the reasoned principles of the 21 Declaration of Independence. Reason is the strongest weapon 2.2 against the mindless fear the terrorist seeks. 23 (b) In writing the Declaration of Independence, in 24 addition to listing the specific grievances of the American 25 colonies against the British King and Parliament, Thomas Jefferson set forth in 55 words a statement of the fundamental 26 27 human principles of government upon which the new nation was 28 to be founded, and this statement continues to have resonance long after the contents of the remainder of the document have 29 30 been forgotten. 31

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1 (2) To underscore the importance of this statement in 2 forming American character, at the beginning of each school 3 day, public school principals and teachers shall conduct an 4 oral recitation by students of the following words of the 5 Declaration of Independence: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are 6 7 endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that 8 among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among 9 Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the 10 11 governed." 12 (3) Student recitation of this statement from the 13 Declaration of Independence shall serve to reaffirm the American ideals of individual liberty. 14 15 Section 2.
