Section 458.353, Florida Statutes, is 14 created to read: 15 16 458.353 Notification of adverse incident; public records exemption .-- The information contained in the 17 notification of an adverse incident, which is required under 18 19 s. 458.351 and provided to the department by a physician licensed under this chapter, is confidential and exempt from 20 s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution. 21 22 The information may not be made available to the public as part of the record of investigation or prosecution in a 23 disciplinary proceeding. This section is subject to the Open 24 25 Government Sunset Review Act of 1995 in accordance with s. 119.15 and shall stand repealed October 2, 2007, unless 26 27 reviewed and saved from repeal through reenactment by the 28 Legislature. Section 2. Section 459.028, Florida Statutes, is 29 30 created to read: 31

| 15 | from public records requirements provided in sections 458.353 |
| 16 | and 459.028, Florida Statutes, are a public necessity, and |
| 17 | that it would be an invasion of a patient's privacy for |
| 18 | personal, sensitive information contained in the notification |
| 19 | of an adverse incident to be publicly available. Furthermore, |
| 20 | the Legislature finds that failure to protect the |
| 21 | confidentiality of any information submitted to or collected |
| 22 | by the Department of Health pursuant to section 458.351, |
| 23 | Florida Statutes, or section 459.026, Florida Statutes, |
| 24 | regarding an adverse incident, including, but not limited to, |
| 25 | the identity of the patient, the type of adverse incident, and |
| 26 | the fact that an investigation is being conducted, would deter |
| 27 | the collection and reporting of this information to the |
| 28 | department. This would prevent the department and the |
| 29 | appropriate regulatory boards from effectively carrying out |
| 30 | their responsibility to enforce safe patient care and take |
| 31 | necessary disciplinary action for practice violations. Release |
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of such information would deter physicians and osteopathic physicians licensed in this state from reporting adverse incidents. This could lead to the deterioration of services and care rendered, to the detriment of the health of those served. These exemptions apply the same exemption accorded б under sections 395.0198 and 395.0193, Florida Statutes, relating to the reporting of adverse incidents by facilities licensed under chapter 395, Florida Statutes. The Legislature has thus consistently and repeatedly acknowledged the public necessity of these types of exemptions. Section 4. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law. SENATE SUMMARY Provides exemptions from public-records requirements for osteopathic physicians of adverse incidents occurring in office practice settings. Provides for future review and repeal. Provides findings of public necessity.

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
