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A bill to be entitled An act relating to assisted-living services for minority persons; providing legislative findings; directing the University of South Florida's Policy Exchange Center on Aging to conduct a study; providing for access to records and data of the Department of Elderly Affairs, the Agency for Health Care Administration, and the Department of Community Affairs; requiring a report; providing for development of a private-public partnership to facilitate the development of a facility in a Front Porch Community; providing design principles; providing for appointment of an advisory group to guide the study and the private-public partnership development effort; providing for the advisory group's membership, meetings, and staff support; providing for termination of the advisory group; providing an appropriation; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Legislative findings.--The Legislature finds that many elderly persons face a multitude of chronic health problems and need an integrated package of health, personal care, and social services, which are often not offered in any systematic way in their communities. The Legislature finds that the model of long-term-care support known as "assisted living" is a residential-care model that combines rental apartment living with supportive services to

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aid the frail elderly person in performing the activities of
    daily living. The Legislature finds that assisted living
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    offers elderly persons services that may include personal
    care, housekeeping, linen service, medication management, and
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    24-hour oversight. The Legislature also finds that purchasing
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    assisted-living services is often out of the reach of
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    low-income and moderate-income elderly persons and that
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    existing long-term-care services do not adequately meet the
    needs of these persons. The Legislature finds that assisted
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    living can be a cost-effective option for meeting the needs of
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    frail elderly persons. The Legislature finds that in addition
    to providing more options for residents, expanding
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    long-term-care options has positive economic impacts on
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    communities, as initial construction of new facilities and
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    renovation of existing buildings boost the local economy. The
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    Legislature finds that there are barriers to the development
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    of affordable assisted-living facilities to serve low-income
    and moderate-income frail elderly persons, particularly in
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    urban, African-American communities, and that technical
    expertise from various groups and disciplines must be brought
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    together to overcome these barriers.
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           Section 2. Affordable assisted-living services for
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    minority persons. --
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          (1) STUDY; REPORT. -- The University of South Florida's
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    Policy Exchange Center on Aging, in consultation with the
    Institute on Urban Policy and Commerce at Florida Agricultural
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    and Mechanical University shall study the adequacy and
    availability of affordable assisted-living services to
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    minority persons in at least one Front Porch Community in at
    least one of the following counties: Miami-Dade, Pinellas,
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   Orange, Hillsborough, Duval, and Leon. The Department of
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Elderly Affairs, the Agency for Health Care Administration,
    and the Department of Community Affairs shall provide access
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    to such reports, records, and data as are needed by the
    institute to complete the study. The institute shall submit
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    its report to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the
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    House of Representatives, and the majority and minority
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    leaders in each house of the Legislature by December 22, 2003.
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          (2) DEVELOPMENT OF AN AFFORDABLE ASSISTED-LIVING
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    FACILITY; PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP. -- The Policy Exchange
    Center on Aging, the Institute, the Office of Urban
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    Opportunity, the agency, and the departments shall work
    together to develop a public-private partnership to facilitate
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    the development and operation of an affordable assisted-living
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    facility in a Front Porch Community in one or more of the
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    following counties: Miami-Dade, Pinellas, Orange,
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   Hillsborough, Duval and Leon. Those entities and the
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    public-private partnership shall include at least the
    following principles in their design:
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          (a) Accessibility for visually, cognitively, or
    mobility impaired residents as a basic requirement for a
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    functional environment.
          (b) A stimulating environment that is safe but
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    challenging.
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          (c) Accommodation for changes in visual, auditory, and
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    olfactory senses in the environment and design.

          (3) ADVISORY GROUP. -- The director of the Policy

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                       STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR Senate Bill 1860
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       The Committee Substitute for SB 1860 requires the Policy Exchange Center on Aging, in consultation with the Institute on Urban Policy and Commerce, to study the adequacy and availability of affordable assisted living services to
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       availability of affordable assisted living services to minority persons in at least one Front Porch community. The Center and the Institute are to work together with state agencies to develop a public-private partnership to facilitate the development and operation of an affordable assisted living facility in a Front Porch community in one or more of the counties specified. The director of the Center, in consultation with the director of the Institute and the selected Front porch Council, is to appoint an advisory group with specified members which terminates upon submission of the required report. The bill appropriates $100,000 to the Center from the Front Porch Florida Initiative to fund the study.
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
