I. SUMMARY:

THIS DOCUMENT IS NOT INTENDED TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUING STATUTES, OR TO BE CONSTRUED AS AFFECTING, DEFINING, LIMITING, CONTROLLING, SPECIFYING, CLARIFYING, OR MODIFYING ANY LEGISLATION OR STATUTE.

The Department of Children and Families, in consultation with local communities, is required to establish a community alliance of the stakeholders, community leaders, client representatives and funders of human services in each county to provide a focal point for community participation and governance of community-based services.

The initial membership of the community alliance in a county is composed of the district administrator and representatives from county government, the school district, the county United Way, county sheriff's office, the circuit court corresponding to the county, and from the county children's board, if one exists.

This bill includes the local state attorney and public defender among those persons who may be added to the membership of a county community alliance after the initial meeting of the community alliance.

This bill does not appear to have a fiscal impact on state or local governments.

B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Section 20.19(6)(a), F.S. requires that the Department of Children and Families (DCF), in consultation with local communities, establish a community alliance of the stakeholders, community leaders, client representatives and funders of human services in each county to provide a focal point for community participation and governance of community-based services. A community alliance may cover more than one county when it is determined that such an arrangement is necessary to provide more effective representation. The duties of the community alliance include, but are not necessarily limited to:

- Joint planning for resource utilization in the community, including resources appropriated to the department and any funds that local funding sources choose to provide.
- Needs assessment and establishment of community priorities for service delivery.
- Determining community outcome goals to supplement state-required outcomes.
- Serving as a catalyst for community resource development.
- Providing for community education and advocacy on issues related to delivery of services.
- Promoting prevention and early intervention services.

The initial membership of the community alliance in a county is composed of the following:

- The district administrator:
- A representative from county government;
- A representative from the school district;
- A representative from the county United Way;
- A representative from the county sheriff's office;
- A representative from the circuit court corresponding to the county; and
- A representative from the county children's board, if one exists.

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The members of the alliance can be expanded beyond the initial core membership at any time after the initial meeting of the alliance to better meet the needs of the community. According to DCF, there are 33 alliances in place that cover all 67 counties in Florida.
