This legislation terminates and re-creates the Crime Stoppers Trust Fund, effective upon becoming a law. The Crime Stoppers Trust Fund, FLAIR #41-2-202, is administered by the Department of Legal Affairs. This fund was created by Chapter 98-265.

The Crime Stoppers Trust Fund provides money to local Crime Stoppers organizations for its crime fighting programs.

This bill terminates and re-creates the trust fund in order to synchronize its review with other trust funds of the system.
