I. SUMMARY:

Under current law, it is illegal to possess or display blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's licenses and identification cards (ID cards), and a violation is punishable as a third-degree felony. Current law does not address the sale, manufacture, or delivery of such documents.

This bill makes it a third-degree felony to knowingly sell, manufacture, or deliver, or knowingly offer to sell, manufacture, or deliver, any blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's license, ID card, or likeness without authorization from the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles.

As provided in the bill, these violations may be investigated by any law enforcement agency, including the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco.

The bill does not appear to have a fiscal impact on state or local governments.

The effective date of the bill is October 1, 2002.

<u>Individual Freedom:</u> The bill establishes a criminal penalty for certain activities relating to the sale, manufacture, and delivery of fake or illegally obtained driver's licenses or identification cards.

<u>Lower Taxes:</u> The bill creates a new third-degree felony offense with a punishment that includes a fine up to \$5,000.

B. PRESENT SITUATION:

Under s. 322.212, F.S., without prior authorization from the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV), it is unlawful for any person to knowingly:

- Possess or display any blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's license or ID card, or any instrument resembling a driver's license or ID card;
- Possess any instrument resembling a driver's license issued by DHSMV, its agents, or the corresponding agency of another state;
- Possess any instrument resembling an ID card issued by DHSMV, its agents, or the corresponding agency of another state.

Violation of these provisions will usually constitute a third-degree felony. However, it is only a second-degree misdemeanor when a driver's license or ID card is unlawfully issued as a result of a person giving a false age in an application for a driver's license or an ID card, or when a person possesses a driver's license, identification card, or a document resembling one of them, with an altered date of birth.

Currently, Florida law does not specifically prohibit a person from selling, manufacturing, or delivering blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's licenses, ID cards, or instruments resembling them.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

The bill makes it a third-degree felony for a person to knowingly sell, manufacture, or deliver, or to knowingly offer to sell, manufacture, or deliver, any blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's license or identification card, or document resembling them, unless that person has received authorization from DHSMV.

Violation of these prohibitions may be investigated by any law enforcement agency, including, but not limited to, the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco.

D. SECTION-BY-SECTION ANALYSIS:

Section 1. Amends s. 322.212, F.S.; provides that it is a third-degree felony to knowingly sell, manufacture or deliver, or to knowingly offer to sell, manufacture, or deliver a blank, forged, stolen, fictitious, counterfeit, or unlawfully issued driver's license or ID card. Authorizes investigation by any law enforcement agency, including the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco.

Section 2. Provides an effective date of October 1, 2002.
