#### I. Summary:

Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution 1172 amends the requirements for the passage of amendments to the Florida Constitution.

Passage under the committee substitute requires a favorable majority vote of all electors voting *on the measure*; and, such vote must constitute a majority of the total votes cast at the election.

This joint resolution substantially amends Article XI, section 5 of the Florida Constitution.

#### II. Present Situation:

The Florida Constitution provides that passage of an amendment to the Florida Constitution requires a majority vote of all the electors casting ballots *on the measure*. Art. XI, s. 5(d); *see also*, Art. X, s. 12(d).

#### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The committee substitute adds a requirement for passage of amendments to the Florida Constitution. In addition to a favorable majority vote of all the electors voting *on the measure*, such vote must constitute a *majority of votes cast at the election*.

Had the new passage requirement in the committee substitute been in place, 5 of the 7 amendments that passed by the narrowest margins over the past decade would have failed of adoption --- including Class Size (2002) and High Speed Rail (2000):

Each constitutional amendment is required to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in each county, once in the sixth week and once in the tenth week preceding the general election. Costs for advertising vary depending upon the length of the amendment: however, the cost per amendment is estimated to be approximately \$35,000.
