An agency licensed under this part which claims that (2) 75 it provides special care for persons who have Alzheimer's 76 disease or other related disorders must disclose in its 77 advertisements or in a separate document those services that 78 distinguish the care as being especially applicable to, or 79 suitable for, such persons. The agency must give a copy of all 80 such advertisements or a copy of the document to each person who 81 requests information about the agency and must maintain a copy 82 of all such advertisements and documents in its records. The 83 Agency for Health Care Administration shall examine all such 84 85 advertisements and documents in the agency's records as part of the license renewal procedure. 86

The hospice must give a copy of all 227 such advertisements or a copy of the document to each person who 228 requests information about programs and services for persons 229 with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders offered by 230 the hospice and must maintain a copy of all such advertisements 231 and documents in its records. The agency shall examine all such 232 advertisements and documents in the hospice's records as part of 233 the license renewal procedure. 234

235 Section 5. <u>The Legislature finds that Alzheimer's disease</u> 236 <u>and related disorders pose an urgent health</u> problem in this

238	postsecondary school that prepares undergraduate or graduate
239	students for health professions as described in chapter 456,
240	Florida Statutes, is encouraged to include in its curriculum
241	basic training about Alzheimer's disease and related disorders.
