Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Nick Oelrich Gift
of Life Act."

Section 2. Section 765.510, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

765.510 Legislative declaration.--Because of the rapid medical progress in the fields of tissue and organ preservation, transplantation of tissue, and tissue culture, and because it is in the public interest to aid the medical developments in these fields, the Legislature in enacting this part intends to encourage and aid the development of reconstructive medicine and surgery and the development of medical research by facilitating premortem and postmortem authorizations for donations of tissue and organs. It is the purpose of this part to regulate the gift

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of a body or parts of a body, the gift to be made after the death of a donor, giving due regard to the balance between the rights of the donor and the donor's family and the need for anatomical gifts.

Section 3. Subsection (3) of section 765.5215, Florida Statutes, is amended, and subsection (5) is added to said section, to read:

765.5215 Education program relating to anatomical gifts.—The Agency for Health Care Administration subject to the concurrence of the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, shall develop a continuing program to educate and inform medical professionals, law enforcement agencies and officers, high school children, state and local government employees, and the public regarding the laws of this state relating to anatomical gifts and the need for anatomical gifts.

- (3) The Agency for Health Care Administration shall, no later than March 1 of each year, submit a report to the Legislature containing statistical data on the effectiveness of the program in procuring donor organs and the effect of the program on state spending for health care. The report shall also include statistical data regarding the number of family members who attempt to modify, deny, or prevent a donor's wish or intent to make an anatomical gift from being accomplished after the donor's death and the number of anatomical gifts revoked pursuant to s. 765.516, delineated by the following categories:
- (a) The execution and delivery to the donee of a signed statement.
 - (b) An oral statement that is:
 - 1. Made to the donor's spouse.

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- 2. Made in the presence of two persons and communicated to the donor's family or attorney or to the donee.
- (c) A statement made during a terminal illness or injury addressed to an attending physician, who must communicate the revocation of the gift to the procurement organization that is certified by the state.
- (d) A signed document found on the donor's person or in the donor's effects.
- (5) The Agency for Health Care Administration shall conduct a survey to determine whether making irrevocable the donation of an anatomical gift would affect the number of donations. The results of the survey shall be submitted to the Legislature no later than March 1, 2004, in conjunction with the report required by subsection (3).

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2003.
