SUMMARY ANALYSIS

The bill reduces from three to one the number of years a clam license is valid, and it reduces the license fees accordingly. CS/HB 655 also reduces the penalty for late purchase of a license. It reduces the number of clam harvesting licenses which may be issued from 500 to 400. It also directs the Fish and Wildlife Commission to remit license proceeds, less reasonable costs, to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. Finally, the bill extends the expiration date of the Special Act from July 1, 2003 to July 1, 2008.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Under current law in Brevard County, all clam licenses are issued for a three year period. Licenses for residents cost \$300 and licenses for non-residents costs \$1,200. There is an additional \$1,200 late fee if the license is purchased after the annual 61 day license issuance period. The maximum number of licenses which may be active and renewed is 500 licenses.

Under the proposed changes, licenses will be purchased annually. The current 3 year \$300 resident license is changed to a 1 year, \$100 license and the 3 year \$1200 non-resident license is changed to a \$400 annual license. The penalty for purchasing a late license is changed from \$1200 to \$400. Also, there is a prohibition upon the issuance of new clam licenses until the total number of active and renewed licenses falls below 400 licenses for the previous year. The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is allowed to retain reasonable costs associated with issuing the licenses and assessing the late fees. The remaining licensing funds are transferred to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The expiration of this Special Law is extended from July 1, 2003 to July 1, 2008.

Section 1. Amends subsections (1), (3), (4) and (7) of section 2 and sections 5 and 12 of section 1 of Chapter 2000-451, Laws of Florida, relating to the costs of clam licenses and late fees in Brevard County, and directing these proceeds, less reasonable costs of issuance, to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Section 2. Extends the expiration of the Special Act to July 1, 2008.
