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SUMMARY ANALYSIS

This bill authorizes counties to inspect and regulate the operation of private school buses. However, any such inspection requirement imposed by a county may not apply to any vehicle that is required to be inspected by state law, rule of a state agency, or the district school board in that county.

The bill does not specify the passenger size of such buses or the standards to be used in the inspection and regulation process.

The bill is not expected to have a significant fiscal impact on state or local governments.

Reduce government?

The bill grants authority to home rule county government(s) to inspect and regulate the operation of private school buses. To the extent that the bill grants regulatory authority that counties do not already have, the bill appears to expand the scope of government rather than reduce it.

B. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

Present Situation

Current law requires each district school board to designate and adopt a specific plan for adequate examination of, maintenance, and repair of transportation equipment. Examination of the mechanical and safety condition of each school bus must be made pursuant to rules of the State Board of Education.

Any school bus of a district that is in unsafe condition must be withdrawn from use until the bus meets all safety requirements provided in the law or rules of the State Board of Education. The Department of Education may inspect, or have inspected, any school bus to determine whether it meets requirements. The department may also order an unsafe bus withdrawn from use.

These laws and rules do not apply to vehicles owned by private schools that are used to transport private school students.

Effect of Proposed Changes

This bill authorizes home rule counties to inspect and regulate the operation of private school buses. However, any such inspection requirement imposed by a county may not apply to any vehicle that is required to be inspected by state law, rule of a state agency, or the district school board in that county.

The bill does not specify the passenger size of such buses or the standards to be used in the inspection and regulation process.

C. SECTION DIRECTORY:

Section 1. Amends s. 316.008, F.S., authorizing home rule chartered counties to inspect and regulate private school buses.

Section 2. Provides that the act shall take effect upon becoming law.
