Section 1009.892, Florida Statutes, is 18 19 created to read: 20 1009.892 Innovation Florida Scholarships for 21 Developing High-Tech Jobs Program. --22 (1) This section may be cited as the "Innovation 23 Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs Act." 24 (2) The Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing 25 High-Tech Jobs Program is created to provide need-based financial assistance to any graduate of a high school in this 26 27 state who merits recognition of high academic achievement and 2.8 who enrolls in a certified degree program at an eligible 29 postsecondary educational institution within 3 years after 30 graduation from high school. As used in this section, the term: 31

1	(a) "Certified degree program" means a degree program
2	that:
3	1. Is certified by the Department of Education.
4	2. Addresses the need for support of degree programs
5	in targeted employment areas.
6	3. Includes an internship component as described in
7	this section.
8	(b) "Targeted employment" means employment in any of
9	the following business areas:
10	1. Advanced manufacturing, including the following:
11	a. Automotive and electronics.
12	b. Aerospace technology.
13	c. Robotics.
14	d. Engineering design technology.
15	2. Life sciences, including the following:
16	a. Orthopedics or medical devices.

21	3. Information technology, including the following:

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- Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs
 Program according to rules and procedures established by the
 State Board of Education. The department must advertise the
 availability of the scholarship program and must notify
 students, teachers, parents, guidance counselors, and
 principals or other relevant school administrators of the
 criteria and application procedures. The department must begin
 this process of notification no later than January 1 of each
 year.
- (5) Funds for the Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs Program shall be appropriated annually in the General Appropriations Act.
- (a) If funds appropriated are not adequate to provide the maximum allowable award to each eligible applicant, awards must be prorated to each eligible applicant using the same percentage reduction.
- (b) Notwithstanding s. 216.301, if all funds allocated to the Innovative Florida Scholarships for Developing

 High-Tech Jobs Program are not used in any fiscal year, up to 20 percent of the total allocation may be carried forward and used for awards in the following year.
- (6) The department shall issue awards from the scholarship program annually. Annual awards may be for up to 45 semester credit hours or the equivalent for the amount of demonstrated unmet need for the cost of education, not to exceed an amount equal to the average cost of tuition, fees, and assigned books and supplies for the prior academic year at state universities or such other amount as specified in the General Appropriations Act. A demonstrated unmet need of less than \$100 shall render the applicant ineligible for a

scholarship. Before the registration period each semester, the
department shall transmit payment for each award to the
president or director of the postsecondary educational
institution, or his or her representative, except that the
department may withhold payment if the receiving institution
fails to report or to make refunds to the department as
required in this section.

- (a) Within 30 days after the end of regular registration each semester, the educational institution shall certify to the department the eligibility status of each student who receives an award. After the end of the drop and add period, an institution is not required to reevaluate or revise a student's eligibility status, but must make a refund to the department if a student who receives an award disbursement terminates enrollment for any reason during an academic term and a refund is permitted by the institution's refund policy.
- (b) An institution that receives funds from the program shall certify to the department the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to the department any undisbursed advances within 60 days after the end of regular registration.
- (c) Each institution that receives moneys through this program shall prepare an annual report that includes an annual financial audit conducted by an independent certified public accountant or the Auditor General. The report must include an audit of the institution's administration of the program and a complete accounting of the moneys for the program. This report must be submitted to the department annually by March 1. The department may conduct its own annual audit of an institution's administration of the program. The department

1 may request a refund of any moneys overpaid to the institution for the program. The department may suspend or revoke an 2 3 institution's eligibility to receive future moneys for the program if the department finds that an institution has not 4 5 complied with this section. The institution must remit within 6 60 days any refund requested in accordance with this 7 subsection. 8 (7)(a) A student enrolled in 6 to 8 semester credit hours may receive up to one-half of the maximum award; a 9 10 student enrolled in 9 to 11 credit hours may receive up to 11 three-fourths of the maximum award; and a student enrolled in 12 or more credit hours may receive up to the full award. 12 (b) If a recipient transfers from one eliqible 13 institution to another and continues to meet eligibility 14 requirements, the award must be transferred with the student. 15 A student may use an award for summer term 16 17 enrollment if funds are available. The student is enrolled full-time in the early

admission program of an eligible postsecondary educational

institution or completes a home education program according to

- 2. The student earns a high school diploma from an out-of-state school while living with a parent who is on military or public service assignment away from Florida.
- (c) Have achieved a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent in high school courses designated by the Department of Education, unless the student has attended a home education program according to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12, in which case the student must have attained at least the score identified by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program.
- (d) Be accepted by and enroll in a Florida public or independent postsecondary educational institution identified by the Department of Education.
- (e) Be enrolled for at least 6 semester credit hours or the equivalent in quarter hours or clock hours.
- (f) Have not been convicted of a felony offense, unless the student's civil rights have been restored by the Governor and Cabinet sitting as the Board of Executive Clemency. This paragraph does not apply to an offense for which adjudication of guilt is withheld.
- (g) Apply for a scholarship from the program by the time of high school graduation.
- (9) A student is eligible to accept an initial award for 3 years following high school graduation and to accept a renewal award for 7 years following high school graduation. A student who applies for an award by the time of high school graduation and who meets all other eligibility requirements,

but who does not accept his or her award, may reapply during subsequent application periods for 3 years after high school graduation.

(10) Eligibility for renewal awards shall be based on continued academic achievement of a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent by the student at the eligible institution, continued eligibility for financial assistance pursuant to this section, and participation of the student for at least one summer during the course of the student's postsecondary education in an internship program that is relevant to at least one of the areas of targeted employment as defined in this section. A student must work a minimum of 160 hours during the summer internship.

certified degree program may provide a grant to an employer that hires a student in the certified degree program to work in an area of targeted employment as part of a summer internship program approved by the institution for wages paid to the student, not to exceed \$500 per student per summer. An employer that receives a grant under this subsection must pay each student in the internship program wages at a rate that is at least 120 percent of the federal minimum wage.

(12) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules under ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54 to administer this section.

Section 2. There is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to the Department of Education for fiscal year 2003-2004 the sum of \$30 million to implement the provisions of this act.

Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.

SENATE SUMMARY Creates the Innovation Florida Scholarships for Developing High-Tech Jobs Program within the Department of Education. Provides for need-based scholarships to be awarded to high school graduates who enroll in degree programs that support employment in areas of high-technology. Provides requirements for educational institutions that participate in the program. Provides for the program to fund grants to employers that hire students to work in internships in areas of targeted employment. Requires the State Board of Education to adopt rules to administer the program. (See bill for details.)
