Paragraph (a) of subsection (6) of section 1002.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 38 1002.20 K-12 student and parent rights. -- Parents of public 39 40 school students must receive accurate and timely information 41 regarding their child's academic progress and must be informed 42 of ways they can help their child to succeed in school. K-12 43 students and their parents are afforded numerous statutory 44 rights including, but not limited to, the following: 45 (6) EDUCATIONAL CHOICE .--Public school choices.--Parents of public school 46 (a) students may seek whatever public school choice options that are 47 48 applicable to their students and are available to students in 49 their school districts. (10) A Florida resident who is denied admission as an 99 undergraduate to a state university for failure to meet the high 100 101 school grade point average requirement may appeal the decision 102 to the university and request a recalculation of the grade point average including in the revised calculation the grades earned 103 104 in up to three credits of advanced fine arts courses. The 105 university shall provide the student with a description of the 106 appeals process at the same time as notification of the 107 admissions decision. The university shall recalculate the 108 student's grade point average using the additional courses and 109 advise the student of any changes in the student's admission status. Paragraph (m) of subsection (1) of section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, is amended, paragraphs (n), (o), (p), (q), and (r) of said subsection are redesignated as paragraphs (o), (p), (q), (r), and (s), respectively, and a new paragraph (n) is added to said subsection, to read: HB 1751 261 1011.62 Funds for operation of schools.--If the annual 262 allocation from the Florida Education Finance Program to each 263 district for operation of schools is not determined in the 264 annual appropriations act or the substantive bill implementing 265 the annual appropriations act, it shall be determined as 266 follows:

A value of 0.12 full-time 277 278 equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each 279 student enrolled in a half-credit Advanced International 280 Certificate of Education course who receives a score of E $\frac{1}{2}$ or 281 higher on a subject examination. A value of 0.3 full-time 282 equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each 283 student who receives received an Advanced International 284 Certificate of Education diploma. Such value shall be added to 285 the total full-time equivalent student membership in basic 286 programs for grades 9 through 12 in the subsequent fiscal year. 287 The school district shall distribute to each classroom teacher 288 who provided Advanced International Certificate of Education instruction: 289

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290 A bonus in the amount of \$50 for each student taught by 1. 291 the Advanced International Certificate of Education teacher in each full-credit Advanced International Certificate of Education 292 course who receives a score of E = 2 or higher on the Advanced 293 International Certificate of Education examination. A bonus in 294 the amount of \$25 for each student taught by the Advanced 295 296 International Certificate of Education teacher in each halfcredit Advanced International Certificate of Education course 297 who receives a score of E + r or higher on the Advanced 298 International Certificate of Education examination. 299

An additional bonus of \$500 to each Advanced 300 2. International Certificate of Education teacher in a school 301 designated performance grade category "D" or "F" who has at 302 303 least one student scoring $E \ge 2$ or higher on the full-credit 304 Advanced International Certificate of Education examination, 305 regardless of the number of classes taught or of the number of 306 students scoring an E $\frac{a}{2}$ or higher on the full-credit Advanced International Certificate of Education examination. 307

Additional bonuses of \$250 each to teachers of half-308 3. 309 credit Advanced International Certificate of Education classes in a school designated performance grade category "D" or "F" 310 311 which has at least one student scoring an E a - 1 or higher on the half-credit Advanced International Certificate of Education 312 examination in that class. The maximum additional bonus for a 313 teacher awarded in accordance with this subparagraph shall not 314 exceed \$500 in any given school year. Teachers receiving an 315 316 award under subparagraph 2. are not eligible for a bonus under this subparagraph. 317

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HB 1751 2004 319 Bonuses awarded to a teacher according to this paragraph shall 320 not exceed \$2,000 in any given school year and shall be in 321 addition to any regular wage or other bonus the teacher received 322 or is scheduled to receive.

323 (n) Calculation of additional full-time equivalent membership based on International General Certificate of 324 325 Secondary Education examination scores of students.--A value of 326 0.12 full-time equivalent student membership shall be calculated 327 for each student enrolled in an International General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE) course who 328 329 receives a score of E or higher on a subject examination. A value of 0.15 full-time equivalent student membership shall be 330 calculated for each student who receives an International 331 332 Certificate of Education diploma. Such value shall be added to 333 the total full-time equivalent student membership in basic 334 programs for grades 9 through 12 in the subsequent fiscal year.

335 Section 10. For the purpose of incorporating the amendment 336 to section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, in a reference thereto, 337 subsection (2) of section 1011.69, Florida Statutes, is 338 reenacted to read:

1011.69 Equity in School-Level Funding Act.--

340 (2) Beginning in the 2003-2004 fiscal year, district school boards shall allocate to schools within the district an 341 342 average of 90 percent of the funds generated by all schools and 343 guarantee that each school receives at least 80 percent of the funds generated by that school based upon the Florida Education 344 345 Finance Program as provided in s. 1011.62 and the General 346 Appropriations Act, including gross state and local funds, 347 discretionary lottery funds, and funds from the school

Total 349 funding for each school shall be recalculated during the year to 350 reflect the revised calculations under the Florida Education 351 Finance Program by the state and the actual weighted full-time 352 equivalent students reported by the school during the full-time 353 equivalent student survey periods designated by the Commissioner 354 of Education. If the district school board is providing programs or services to students funded by federal funds, any eligible 355 356 students enrolled in the schools in the district shall be 357 provided federal funds. Only academic performance-based charter 358 school districts, pursuant to s. 1003.62, are exempt from the 359 provisions of this section.

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Section 11. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004.

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
