20	infantsEvery physician, midwife, or other person in
21	attendance at the birth of a child in the state is required to
22	instill or have instilled into the eyes of the baby within 1
23	hour after birth an effective prophylactic recommended by the
24	Committee on Infectious Diseases of the American Academy of
25	Pediatrics for the prevention of neonatal ophthalmia. <u>In</u>
26	addition, every baby born in a hospital in the state shall,
27	before being discharged from the hospital, receive an eye
28	examination using an opthalmoscope and dilation of the pupils
29	for detection of pediatric congenital and ocular
30	abnormalities; however, this requirement is not subject to s.
31	383.07. This section does not apply to cases where the parents
