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A bill to be entitled An act relating to guardianship; amending s. 737.2065, F.S.; authorizing the guardian of the property of an incapacitated person to contest the validity of a trust before it becomes irrevocable; amending s. 744.311, F.S.; requiring the court to determine whether there is an alternative to guardianship if a person is determined incapable of exercising his or her delegable rights; authorizing an interested person to file a verified statement indicating a belief that an incapacitated person's trust, trust amendment, or durable power of attorney is invalid, in which case such instrument may not be an alternative to the appointment of a guardian; amending s. 744.441, F.S.; requiring the court to determine whether an action contesting the validity of a trust is in the ward's best interests before authorizing a quardian to bring such actions; creating s. 744.462, F.S.; requiring that the validity of a ward's durable power of attorney, trust, or trust amendment be reported in the guardianship proceedings; requiring the court to review the continued need fir a guardian and delegation of the ward's rights under certain conditions; providing an effective date. Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Section 737.2065, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

737.2065 Trust contests.--An action to contest the validity of all or part of a trust may not be commenced until the trust becomes irrevocable, except that this section shall not prohibit such action by the guardian of the property of an incapacitated grantor.

Section 2. Paragraphs (b) and (f) of subsection (6) of section 744.331, Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

744.331 Procedures to determine incapacity.--

- (6) ORDER DETERMINING INCAPACITY.--If, after making findings of fact on the basis of clear and convincing evidence, the court finds that a person is incapacitated with respect to the exercise of a particular right, or all rights, the court shall enter a written order determining such incapacity. A person is determined to be incapacitated only with respect to those rights specified in the order.
- incapable of exercising delegable rights, the court must consider and find whether there is an alternative to guardianship which will sufficiently address the problems of the incapacitated person. A guardian must be appointed to exercise the incapacitated person's delegable rights unless the court finds there is an alternative. A guardian shall not be appointed if the court finds there is an alternative to guardianship which will sufficiently address the problems of the incapacitated person. In any order declaring a person incapacitated the court must find that alternatives to guardianship were considered and that no alternative to guardianship will sufficiently address the problems of the ward.

- - 1. That he or she has a good faith belief that the alleged incapacitated person's trust, trust amendment, or durable power of attorney is invalid; and
 - 2. A reasonable factual basis for that belief,

the trust, trust amendment, or durable power of attorney shall not be deemed to be an alternative to the appointment of a guardian. The appointment of a guardian shall not limit the court's power to determine that certain authority granted by a durable power of attorney is to remain exercisable by the attorney in fact. When an order is entered which determines that a person is incapable of exercising delegable rights, a guardian must be appointed to exercise those rights.

Section 3. Subsection (11) of section 744.441, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

744.441 Powers of guardian upon court approval.--After obtaining approval of the court pursuant to a petition for authorization to act, a plenary guardian of the property, or a limited guardian of the property within the powers granted by the order appointing the guardian or an approved annual or amended guardianship report, may:

(11) Prosecute or defend claims or proceedings in any jurisdiction for the protection of the estate and of the guardian in the performance of his or her duties. Before authorizing a guardian to bring an action described in s.

737.2065, the court shall first find that the action appears to be in the ward's best interests during the ward's probable lifetime. If the court denies a request that a guardian be authorized to bring an action described in s. 737.2065, the

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1 court shall review the continued need for a guardian and the 2 extent of the need for delegation of the ward's rights. 3 Section 4. Section 744.462, Florida Statutes, is 4 created to read: 5 744.462 Determination regarding alternatives to 6 guardianship .-- Any judicial determination concerning the 7 validity of the ward's durable power of attorney, trust, or trust amendment shall be promptly reported in the guardianship 8 9 proceeding by the guardian of the property. This act shall take effect upon becoming a 17 law. 18 19 20 SENATE SUMMARY Authorizes a guardian of property of an incapacitated person to contest the validity of a trust before it becomes irrevocable. Requires the court to find an alternative to guardianship under certain circumstances. Authorizes an interested person to file a verified statement indicating a reasonable factual basis that the incapacitated person's trust, trust amendment, or durable power of attorney is invalid. Provides that the appointment of a guardian does not limit the court's power to determine certain authority granted by a durable power of attorney. Requires the court to determine whether an action contesting the validity of a trust is in the ward's best interests before authorizing a guardian to bring such action. Requires the validity of a ward's durable power of attorney, trust, or trust amendment to be reported in the guardianship proceedings.
