Subsection (13) of section 465.003, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 21 22 465.003 Definitions.--As used in this chapter, the 23 term: "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" includes 24 (13)25 compounding, dispensing, and consulting concerning contents, therapeutic values, and uses of any medicinal drug; consulting 26 27 concerning therapeutic values and interactions of patent or proprietary preparations, whether pursuant to prescriptions or 28

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in the absence and entirely independent of such prescriptions

or orders; and other pharmaceutical services. For purposes of this subsection, "other pharmaceutical services" means the

monitoring of the patient's drug therapy and assisting the 2 patient in the management of his or her drug therapy, and 3 includes review of the patient's drug therapy and 4 communication with the patient's prescribing health care 5 provider as licensed under chapter 458, chapter 459, chapter 6 461, or chapter 466, or similar statutory provision in another 7 jurisdiction, or such provider's agent or such other persons 8 as specifically authorized by the patient, regarding the drug 9 therapy. However, nothing in this subsection may be 10 interpreted to permit an alteration of a prescriber's 11 directions, the diagnosis or treatment of any disease, the initiation of any drug therapy, the practice of medicine, or 12 the practice of osteopathic medicine, unless otherwise 13 permitted by law. "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" 14 15 also includes any other act, service, operation, research, or transaction incidental to, or forming a part of, any of the 16 17 foregoing acts, requiring, involving, or employing the science or art of any branch of the pharmaceutical profession, study, 18 19 or training, and shall expressly permit a pharmacist to 20 transmit information from persons authorized to prescribe medicinal drugs to their patients. "Practice of the profession 21 of pharmacy" also includes the administering to adults of 22 influenza virus immunizations by a pharmacist within the 23 24 framework of an established protocol under a supervisory 25 practitioner who is a physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459 or by written agreement with a county health 26 27 department. Each protocol must contain specific procedures to 28 address any unforeseen allergic reaction to an immunization. A 29 pharmacist may not enter into a protocol unless he or she 30 maintains at least \$200,000 of professional liability insurance and not until the pharmacist has completed training 31

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1 in immunizations as provided in this subsection. The decision by a supervisory practitioner to enter into such a protocol is 2 3 a professional decision of the practitioner, and a person may not interfere with a supervisory practitioner's decision as to 4 whether to enter into such a protocol. A pharmacist may not 5 6 enter into a protocol that is to be performed while acting as 7 an employee without the written approval of the owner of the pharmacy. Any pharmacist seeking to immunize patients under 8 9 this subsection must be certified to administer immunizations 10 pursuant to a certification program approved by the Board of Pharmacy upon consultation with the Board of Medicine. The 11 12 certification program must, at a minimum, require that a pharmacist attend at least 20 hours of continuing education 13 14 classes approved by the Board of Pharmacy. The program must 15 have a curriculum of instruction concerning the safe and effective administration of immunizations, including, but not 16 limited to, potential allergic reactions to immunizations. 17 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2004. 18 19 STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR 20 Senate Bill 2716 21 22 23 The committee substitute limits the immunizations that a pharmacist may administer to influenza virus immunizations to adults, within an established protocol. The bill revises the training requirements for a pharmacist to administer influenza virus immunizations to adults. The Board of Pharmacy in consultation with the Board of Medicine is authorized to 24 25 approve a certification program for pharmacists to immunize patients, which must require at least 20 hours of continuing 26 27 education. 2.8 29
