17	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

19	Section 1. Section 97.0585, Florida Statutes, is amended
20	to read:
21	97.0585 Public-records exemption; information regarding
22	voters and voter registration Declinations to register; place of
23	registration and registration information; confidentiality
24	(1) The following information concerning voters and voter
25	registration held by an agency as defined in s. 119.011 is
26	confidential and exempt from s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I
27	of the State Constitution and may be used only for purposes of
28	voter registration:

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29 (a) All declinations to register to vote made pursuant to ss. 97.057 and 97.058 are confidential and exempt from the 30 provisions of s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State 31 32 Constitution and may be used only for voter registration 33 purposes. (b) (2) Information relating to the place where a person 34 35 registered to vote or where a person updated a voter 36 registration. The social security number, driver's license number, 37 (C) 38 and Florida identification number of a voter registration 39 applicant or voter. The signature of a voter registration applicant or a 40 (2) voter is confidential and exempt from the provisions of s. 41 42 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State Constitution; and a voter's signature, social security number, and telephone number 43 44 may not be copied and is are exempt for that purpose from the provisions of s. 119.07(1) and s. 24(a), Art. I of the State 45 Constitution. 46 (3) This section applies to information held by an agency 47 before, on, or after the effective date of this exemption. 48 49 Section 2. Section 97.0585, Florida Statutes, as amended 50 by this act, is subject to the Open Government Sunset Review Act 51 of 1995 in accordance with section 119.15, Florida Statutes, and shall stand repealed on October 2, 2010, unless reviewed and 52 53 saved from repeal through reenactment by the Legislature. 54 Section 3. (1) The Legislature recognizes that the Help America Vote Act of 2002 requires the implementation of a new 55 56 single, uniform, centralized, interactive, and computerized Page 2 of 5

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57 statewide voter registration system by January 1, 2006. The Florida Voter Registration System (FVRS) will replace the 58 existing state's voter registration system. The FVRS will 59 60 interface with and integrate voter registration information and 61 records from the offices of the 67 county supervisors of elections. The FVRS will contain the name and other registration 62 information of every legally registered voter in the state. The 63 FVRS will be the official list of registered voters in the state 64 65 and will be used as the registration system for federal and 66 state elections. Any such system must keep information 67 concerning a person's decision not to register or information 68 concerning the place where a person registers to vote 69 confidential in accordance with the National Voter Registration 70 Act. Therefore, the Legislature finds it necessary to continue the existing public-records exemption to keep such information 71 72 confidential and exempt in order to conform with the 73 requirements of the National Voter Registration Act. 74 Additionally, because persons may register to vote or update 75 voter registration information at designated voter registration 76 agencies that may include any office that provides public 77 assistance, this exemption is also necessary to protect from disclosure personal information concerning those persons who 78 79 apply for or receive public assistance at these offices. 80 (2) The Legislature also finds it necessary to broaden the existing exemption from public-records access to social security 81 82 numbers of voters and voter registration applicants to include 83 driver's license numbers and Florida identification numbers. The 84 Legislature finds that access to such information can lead to Page 3 of 5

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fraud, personal identity theft, and invasion of privacy. The 85 Florida Voter Statewide Voter Registration System, once 86 implemented and maintained, will constitute one of the most 87 88 comprehensive and up-to-date databases of persons in this state. The Legislature finds it not only necessary to exempt from 89 copying social security numbers, driver's license numbers, and 90 Florida identification numbers of those persons in the Florida 91 Voter Registration System but also to exempt those numbers from 92 93 inspection. Even the memorization of a single person's social 94 security number, driver's license number, or Florida 95 identification number could result in economic and personal harm 96 to that individual whose numbers may be used to perpetrate fraud 97 or may be coupled with other readily available public information to commit personal identity theft or to gain access 98 to records, such as financial, educational, or medical records. 99 100 The Legislature also finds it necessary to keep the social security numbers, driver's license numbers, and Florida 101 identification numbers in the Florida Voter Registration System 102 103 confidential and exempt in order to encourage voter registration 104 and remove disincentives to registering to vote. 105 The Legislature also finds it necessary to continue (3) 106 and to expand the existing exemption that precludes the copying 107 of a voter's signature. Currently, a voter's signature is exempt 108 from copying but only if contained on a voter registration 109 application or precinct register. Two advisory opinions from the Attorney General issued in 2001 stated that a voter's signature 110 on an absentee ballot certificate is not part of the voter 111 112 registration record and therefore not exempt from copying.

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113	Because express exemption from copying did not exist for
114	absentee ballot certificates, any person or entity may request
115	and obtain copies of all signatures of voters who voted absentee
116	in any particular election. Consequently, any person or entity
117	may also request and obtain copies of all signatures of voters
118	who signed provisional ballot envelopes, early voting
119	certificates, or any other voting-related documents other than a
120	voter registration application or a precinct register. The
121	Legislature intends that a voter's signature be protected in
122	order to prevent fraud, identity theft, or invasion of privacy
123	in all instances. Nonetheless, the Legislature finds that any
124	exemption for such signatures must be balanced against the
125	continuing administrative need to allow for public inspection of
126	the signatures of voters or voter registration applicants for
127	purposes of voter verification, matching, or authenticity as may
128	occur in a voter's challenge or canvassing of an absentee
129	ballot. Therefore, the Legislature finds that it is a public
130	necessity to continue the existing exemption solely from copying
131	of voters' signatures and to expand that exemption to apply to
132	voters' signatures as may also appear on absentee ballot
133	certificate envelopes, provisional ballot envelopes, early-
134	voting certificates, or any other voting-related document that
135	must be executed for purposes of voting or voter registration.
136	Section 4. This act shall take effect on the same date
137	that House Bill 1589 or similar legislation takes effect, if
138	such legislation is enacted in the same legislative session or
139	an extension thereof and becomes law.

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
