public pools or spas requires licensure; however, the usage of such equipment for the purposes of water treatment or cleaning residential pools or spas shall not require licensure unless the usage involves construction, modification, or replacement of such equipment. Water treatment that does not require such equipment does not require a license. In addition, a license shall not be required for the cleaning of the pool or spa in any way that does not affect the structural integrity of the residential pool or spa or its associated equipment.

(1) "Swimming pool/spa servicing contractor" means a contractor whose scope of work involves, but is not limited to, the repair and servicing of any swimming pool, or hot tub or spa, whether public, or private, or otherwise, regardless of use. The scope of work includes the repair or replacement of existing equipment; any cleaning or equipment sanitizing: which requires at least a partial disassembling, excluding filter changes, and the installation of new pool/spa equipment: — interior refinishing: — the reinstallation or addition of pool heaters: the repair or replacement of all perimeter piping and filter piping: the repair of equipment rooms or housing for pool/spa equipment: 7 and the substantial or complete draining of a swimming pool, or hot tub or spa, for the purpose of any repair or renovation. The scope of such work does not include direct connections to a sanitary sewer system or to potable water lines. The installation, construction, modification, substantial or complete disassembly, or replacement of equipment permanently attached to and associated with the pool or spa for the purpose of water treatment or cleaning of the pool or spa and the usage of such equipment for the purposes of water treatment or

cleaning on commercial or public pools or spas requires licensure; however, the usage of such equipment for the purposes of water treatment or cleaning on residential pools 3 or spas shall not require licensure unless the usage involves construction, modification, substantial or complete 5 disassembly, or replacement of such equipment. Water treatment 7 that does not require such equipment does not require a license. In addition, a license shall not be required for the 8 cleaning of the pool or spa in any way that does not affect 10 the structural integrity of the pool or spa or its associated 11 equipment. (20) "Provisional license" means a license granted to 12 13 a swimming pool/spa servicing contractor who has met all qualifications for licensure but has no proven work experience 14 15 related to the scope of work of such a contractor. A provisional license shall be effective for a period of 1 year 16 from the date of issuance, at which time a license will be 17 granted to the individual or business organization qualified 18 19 by that individual. During the term of provisional licensure, the contractor shall be prohibited from performing any work 20 involving public swimming pools, or hot tubs or spas, interior 21 22 refinishing of private swimming pools, or hot tubs or spas, and any draining of a private swimming pool, or hot tub or 23 2.4 spa, for the purpose of any repair or renovation. During the term of provisional licensure, the contractor may partially 25 drain up to 75 percent of a private swimming pool, or hot tub 26 or spa, for the purposes of water treatment. 27 Section 2. Paragraph (c) of subsection (2) of section 28 29 489.111, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 30 489.111 Licensure by examination.--31 (2) A person shall be eligible for licensure by

examination if the person:

- (c) Meets eligibility requirements according to one of the following criteria:
- 1. Has received a baccalaureate degree from an accredited 4-year college in the appropriate field of engineering, architecture, or building construction and has 1 year of proven experience in the category in which the person seeks to qualify. For the purpose of this part, a minimum of 2,000 person-hours shall be used in determining full-time equivalency.
- 2. Has a total of at least 4 years of active experience as a worker who has learned the trade by serving an apprenticeship as a skilled worker who is able to command the rate of a mechanic in the particular trade or as a foreman who is in charge of a group of workers and usually is responsible to a superintendent or a contractor or his or her equivalent, provided, however, that at least 1 year of active experience shall be as a foreman.
- 3. Has a combination of not less than 1 year of experience as a foreman and not less than 3 years of credits for any accredited college-level courses; has a combination of not less than 1 year of experience as a skilled worker, 1 year of experience as a foreman, and not less than 2 years of credits for any accredited college-level courses; or has a combination of not less than 2 years of experience as a skilled worker, 1 year of experience as a foreman, and not less than 1 year of credits for any accredited college-level courses. All junior college or community college-level courses shall be considered accredited college-level courses.
- 4.a. An active certified residential contractor is 31 eligible to take the building contractors' examination if he

or she possesses a minimum of 3 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.

- b. An active certified residential contractor is eligible to take the general contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 4 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- c. An active certified building contractor is eligible to take the general contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 4 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- 5.a. An active certified air-conditioning Class C contractor is eligible to take the air-conditioning Class B contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 3 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- b. An active certified air-conditioning Class C contractor is eligible to take the air-conditioning Class A contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 4 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- c. An active certified air-conditioning Class B contractor is eligible to take the air-conditioning Class A contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 1 year of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- 6.a. An active certified swimming pool servicing contractor is eligible to take the residential swimming pool contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 3 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- 31 b. An active certified swimming pool servicing

contractor is eligible to take the swimming pool commercial contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 4 years of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.

- c. An active certified residential swimming pool contractor is eligible to take the commercial swimming pool contractors' examination if he or she possesses a minimum of 1 year of proven experience in the classification in which he or she is certified.
- d. An applicant is eligible to take the swimming pool/spa servicing contractors' examination if he or she has satisfactorily completed 60 hours of instruction in courses related to the scope of work covered by that license and approved by the Construction Industry Licensing Board by rule and has at least 1 year of proven experience related to the scope of work of such a contractor.

Section 3. Section 514.075, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

certification.—Any person who cleans, sanitizes, or uses chemicals in residential, commercial, or public pools or spas for the purpose of water treatment or cleaning must complete a course of at least 14 hours, but no more than 16 hours, approved by the Department of Health which has national recognition, such as the National Swimming Pool Foundation's Certified Pool—Spa Operator training program. This section applies to any nonlicensed service company, commercial pool or spa service contractor, residential pool or spa service contractor, swimming pool or spa service contractor, or person permitted as a public pool operator as defined in s. 514.011 or direct employee of such a person permitted as a public pool

operator who cleans, sanitizes, or uses chemicals for the purpose of water treatment. The department shall establish by 2 rule which courses satisfy this requirement. The department 3 may require that a public pool, as defined in s. 514.011, be 5 serviced by a person certified as a pool service technician. To be certified, an individual must demonstrate knowledge of 6 public pools which includes, but is not limited to: pool 7 8 cleaning; general pool maintenance; source of the water supply; bacteriological, chemical, and physical quality of 9 10 water; and water purification, testing, treatment, and 11 disinfection procedures. The department may, by rule, establish the requirement for the certification course and 12 13 course approval. The department shall deem certified any 14 individual who is certified by a course of national 15 recognition or any person licensed under s. 489.105(3)(j), 16 (k), or (l). This requirement does not apply to a person, or the direct employee of a person, permitted as a public pool 17 18 operator under s. 514.031. Section 4. Section 515.39, Florida Statutes, is 19 20 created to read: 21 515.39 Training requirement. -- Any person who cleans, 22 sanitizes, or uses chemicals in residential, commercial, or public pools or spas for the purpose of water treatment or 23 2.4 cleaning must complete a course of at least 14 hours, but no more than 16 hours, approved by the Department of Health which 25 has national recognition, such as the National Swimming Pool 26 Foundation's Certified Pool-Spa Operator training program. 27 This section applies to any nonlicensed service company, 28 29 commercial pool or spa service contractor, residential pool or spa service contractor, swimming pool or spa service 30 contractor, or person permitted as a public pool operator as
