Paragraph (a) of subsection (6) of section 15 1002.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 16 17 1002.20 K-12 student and parent rights.--Parents of 18 public school students must receive accurate and timely information regarding their child's academic progress and must 19 be informed of ways they can help their child to succeed in 20 21 school. K-12 students and their parents are afforded numerous 22 statutory rights including, but not limited to, the following: 23 (6) EDUCATIONAL CHOICE. --(a) Public school choices.--Parents of public school 2.4 students may seek whatever public school choice options that 25 are applicable to their students and are available to students 26 27 in their school districts. These options may include 2.8 controlled open enrollment, lab schools, charter schools, charter technical career centers, magnet schools, alternative 29 schools, special programs, advanced placement, dual 30 enrollment, International Baccalaureate, International General 31

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1 Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced 2 International Certificate of Education, early admissions, credit by examination or demonstration of competency, the New 3 World School of the Arts, the Florida School for the Deaf and 4 the Blind, and the Florida Virtual School. These options may 5 6 also include the public school choice options of the 7 Opportunity Scholarship Program and the McKay Scholarships for 8 Students with Disabilities Program. Section 2. Paragraph (d) of subsection (2) of section 9 1002.23, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 10 1002.23 Family and School Partnership for Student 11 12 Achievement Act. --13 (2) To facilitate meaningful parent and family involvement, the Department of Education shall develop 14 guidelines for a parent guide to successful student 15 achievement which describes what parents need to know about 16 17 their child's educational progress and how they can help their 18 child to succeed in school. The guidelines shall include, but need not be limited to: 19 20 (d) Opportunities for parents to learn about rigorous 21 academic programs that may be available for their child, such 22 as honors programs, dual enrollment, advanced placement, 23 International Baccalaureate, International General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced International 2.4 Certificate of Education, Florida Virtual High School courses, 25 26 and accelerated access to postsecondary education; 27 Section 3. Subsection (2) of section 1007.22, Florida 2.8 Statutes, is amended to read: 29 1007.22 Articulation; postsecondary institution 30 coordination and collaboration. --31

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1 (2) The levels of postsecondary education shall 2 collaborate in further developing and providing articulated programs in which students can proceed toward their 3 educational objectives as rapidly as their circumstances 4 permit. Time-shortened educational programs, as well as the 5 6 use of acceleration mechanisms, shall include, but not be 7 limited to, the International Baccalaureate, Advanced 8 International Certificate of Education, credit by examination or demonstration of competency, advanced placement, early 9 admissions, and dual enrollment. 10 Section 4. Subsection (10) of section 1007.261, 11 Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 12 13 1007.261 State universities; admissions of students. -- Each university board of trustees is authorized to 14 adopt rules governing the admission of students, subject to 15 this section and rules of the State Board of Education. 16 17 (10) A Florida resident who is denied admission as an 18 undergraduate to a state university for failure to meet the high school grade point average requirement may appeal the 19 decision to the university and request a recalculation of the 20 21 grade point average including in the revised calculation the 22 grades earned in up to three credits of advanced fine arts 23 courses. The university shall provide the student with a description of the appeals process at the same time as 2.4 notification of the admissions decision. The university shall 25 26 recalculate the student's grade point average using the 27 additional courses and advise the student of any changes in 2.8 the student's admission status. For purposes of this section, 29 fine arts courses include courses in music, drama, painting, sculpture, speech, debate, or a course in any art form that 30 requires manual dexterity. Advanced level fine arts courses 31

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1 include fine arts courses identified in the course code directory as Advanced Placement, pre-International 2 Baccalaureate, or International Baccalaureate, International 3 General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), or 4 Advanced International Certificate of Education, or fine arts 5 6 courses taken in the third or fourth year of a fine arts 7 curriculum. 8 Section 5. Subsection (9) of section 1007.27, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 9 10 1007.27 Articulated acceleration mechanisms.--(9) The Advanced International Certificate of 11 12 Education Program and the International General Certificate of 13 Secondary Education (pre-AICE) Program shall be the curricula curriculum in which eligible secondary students are enrolled 14 15 in programs of study a program of studies offered through the Advanced International Certificate of Education Program or the 16 17 International General Certificate of Secondary Education 18 (pre-AICE) Program administered by the University of Cambridge Local Examinations Syndicate. The State Board of Education 19 shall establish rules which specify the cutoff scores and 20 21 Advanced International Certificate of Education examinations 22 which will be used to grant postsecondary credit at community 23 colleges and universities. Any such rules, which have the effect of raising the required cutoff score or of changing the 2.4 Advanced International Certification of Education examinations 25 26 which will be used to grant postsecondary credit, shall apply 27 to students taking Advanced International Certificate of 2.8 Education Examinations after such rules are adopted by the State Board of Education. Paragraph (a) of subsection (3) of section 1009.531, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 8 1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program; 9 10 student eligibility requirements for initial awards .--(3) For purposes of calculating the grade point 11 12 average to be used in determining initial eligibility for a 13 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship, the department shall assign additional weights to grades earned in the following 14 15 courses: (a) Courses identified in the course code directory as 16 17 Advanced Placement, pre-International Baccalaureate, or 18 International Baccalaureate, International General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), or Advanced International 19 Certificate of Education. 20 21 22 The department may assign additional weights to courses, other 23 than those described in paragraphs (a) and (b), that are identified by the Department of Education as containing 2.4 rigorous academic curriculum and performance standards. The 25 additional weight assigned to a course pursuant to this 26 27 subsection shall not exceed 0.5 per course. The weighted 2.8 system shall be developed and distributed to all high schools in the state prior to January 1, 1998. The department may 29 30 determine a student's eligibility status during the senior 31

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1 year before graduation and may inform the student of the award 2 at that time. Section 7. Subsection (1) of section 1009.534, Florida 3 Statutes, is amended to read: 4 5 1009.534 Florida Academic Scholars award.-б (1) A student is eligible for a Florida Academic 7 Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility 8 requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 9 Program and the student: 10 (a) Has achieved a 3.5 weighted grade point average as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high 11 12 school courses that are designated by the State Board of 13 Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has attained at least the score identified by rules of the State 14 Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative 15 parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic 16 17 Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test 18 of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or 19 (b) Has attended a home education program according to 20 21 s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the 22 International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the 23 International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the curriculum for the Advanced International Certificate of 2.4 Education but failed to earn the Advanced International 25 26 Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained at least 27 the score identified by rules of the State Board of Education 2.8 on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or 29 30 the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College 31

Subsection (1) of section 1009.535, Florida 23 Statutes, is amended to read: 1009.535 Florida Medallion Scholars award.--2.4 (1) A student is eligible for a Florida Medallion 25 Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility 26 27 requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship 2.8 Program and the student: 29 (a) Has achieved a weighted grade point average of 3.0 as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or the equivalent, in 30 high school courses that are designated by the State Board of 31 8

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Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has attained at least the score identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or (b) Has attended a home education program according to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the curriculum for the Advanced International Certificate of Education but failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or (c) Has been recognized by the merit or achievement program of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a scholar or finalist but has not completed a program of community service as provided in s. 1009.534; or (d) Has been recognized by the National Hispanic Recognition Program as a scholar, but has not completed a program of community service as provided in s. 1009.534. A bonus in the amount of \$50 for each student 1 2 taught by the Advanced International Certificate of Education teacher in each full-credit Advanced International Certificate 3 of Education course who receives a score of $\underline{E} \neq$ or higher on 4 the Advanced International Certificate of Education 5 6 examination. A bonus in the amount of \$25 for each student 7 taught by the Advanced International Certificate of Education 8 teacher in each half-credit Advanced International Certificate of Education course who receives a score of E \pm or higher on 9 the Advanced International Certificate of Education 10 examination. 11 12 2. An additional bonus of \$500 to each Advanced 13 International Certificate of Education teacher in a school designated performance grade category "D" or "F" who has at 14 least one student scoring $\underline{E} \neq 0$ or higher on the full-credit 15 Advanced International Certificate of Education examination, 16 17 regardless of the number of classes taught or of the number of students scoring an $\underline{E} = \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{2}$ or higher on the full-credit 18 Advanced International Certificate of Education examination. 19 3. Additional bonuses of \$250 each to teachers of 20 21 half-credit Advanced International Certificate of Education 22 classes in a school designated performance grade category "D" 23 or "F" which has at least one student scoring an E $\frac{a}{a}$ or higher on the half-credit Advanced International Certificate 2.4 of Education examination in that class. The maximum additional 25 26 bonus for a teacher awarded in accordance with this 27 subparagraph shall not exceed \$500 in any given school year. 2.8 Teachers receiving an award under subparagraph 2. are not 29 eligible for a bonus under this subparagraph. 30 31

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1 Bonuses awarded to a teacher according to this paragraph shall not exceed \$2,000 in any given school year and shall be in 2 3 addition to any regular wage or other bonus the teacher received or is scheduled to receive. 4 (n) Calculation of additional full-time equivalent 5 б membership based on International General Certificate of 7 Secondary Education examination scores of students. -- A value 8 of 0.12 full-time equivalent student membership shall be calculated for each student enrolled in an International 9 General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE) course 10 who receives a score of E or higher on a subject examination. 11 12 A value of 0.15 full-time equivalent student membership shall 13 be calculated for each student who receives an International Certificate of Education diploma. Such value shall be added to 14 the total full-time equivalent student membership in basic 15 programs for grades 9 through 12 in the subsequent fiscal 16 17 year. 18 Section 10. For the purpose of incorporating the amendment to section 1011.62, Florida Statutes, in a reference 19 thereto, subsection (2) of section 1011.69, Florida Statutes, 2.0 21 is reenacted to read: 22 1011.69 Equity in School-Level Funding Act .--23 (2) Beginning in the 2003-2004 fiscal year, district school boards shall allocate to schools within the district an 2.4 average of 90 percent of the funds generated by all schools 25 26 and guarantee that each school receives at least 80 percent of 27 the funds generated by that school based upon the Florida 2.8 Education Finance Program as provided in s. 1011.62 and the General Appropriations Act, including gross state and local 29 funds, discretionary lottery funds, and funds from the school 30 district's current operating discretionary millage levy. Total 31

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1	funding for each school shall be recalculated during the year
2	to reflect the revised calculations under the Florida
3	Education Finance Program by the state and the actual weighted
4	full-time equivalent students reported by the school during
5	the full-time equivalent student survey periods designated by
