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CS 24 Constitution. As used in this paragraph, the term "biometric identification information" means: 25 a. Any record of friction ridge detail; 26 27 b. Fingerprints; c. Palm prints; and 28 29 d. Footprints. This paragraph is subject to the Open Government Sunset 30 2. Review Act in accordance with s. 119.15 and shall stand repealed 31 on October 2, 2011, unless reviewed and saved from repeal 32 33 through reenactment by the Legislature. Section 2. The Legislature finds that it is a public 34 necessity that biometric identification information held by an 35 agency before, on, or after the effective date of this exemption 36 37 be made exempt from public records requirements. Biometric identification information is used to verify the identity of 38 persons and by its very nature involves matters uniquely related 39 to individual persons. The use of multiple methods of biometric 40 identification is a growing technology in detecting and solving 41 crime, in preventing identity theft, and in providing enhanced 42 levels of security in agency and other operations. Given 43 existing technological capabilities for duplicating, enhancing, 44 45 modifying, and transferring records, the availability of 46 biometric identification information creates the opportunity for 47 improper, illegal, or otherwise harmful use of such information. At the same time, use of biometric identification information by 48 agencies is a useful and increasingly valuable tool. Thus, the 49 50 Legislature finds that it is a public necessity to protect

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biometric identification information held by an agency before,
on, or after the effective date of this act.
Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2006, if
House Bill 151, or similar legislation relating to fingerprint
identification information held by an agency, is adopted in the
same legislative session or an extension thereof and becomes
law.

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
