20	Section 1. Section 1003.495, Florida Statutes, is created

24	(1) The purpose of this section is to ensure that each						
25	Florida student receives a sufficient education for success						
26	after high school and that all students have equal access to a						
27	substantive and rigorous curriculum that is designed to						

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challenge their minds, enhance their knowledge and skills, and
prepare them for success in college and work.
(2) For purposes of this section:
(a) "Advanced Placement course" means a course sponsored
by the College Board that is offered for college credit at the
high school level and taught by an Advanced Placement teacher.
(b) "Advanced Placement Vertical Team" means a group of
teachers and educators from different grade levels in a given
discipline who work cooperatively to develop and implement a
vertically aligned program aimed at helping students from
diverse backgrounds acquire the academic skills necessary for
success in Advanced Placement courses and other challenging
courses.
(c) "Pre-Advanced Placement teacher training" means a set
of professional development resources and services designed to
equip middle and high school teachers with the strategies and
tools they need to engage their students in active, high-level
learning, thereby ensuring that middle and high school students
develop the skills, habits of mind, and concepts they need to
succeed in Advanced Placement courses.
(3) By the 2007-2008 school year, each high school in the
state must offer at least four Advanced Placement courses, one
each in English, mathematics, science, and a foreign language
taught by an Advanced Placement teacher.
(4) The State Board of Education shall establish clear,
specific, and challenging training guidelines that require each
teacher of an Advanced Placement course to have obtained

57	(5) Funds to provide Advanced Placement and Pre-Advanced							
58	Placement teacher training to Florida teachers shall be provided

(b) 93 Focus state and federal funding to carry out activities that target school districts serving high 94 95 concentrations of low-income and underrepresented students. Provide a plan of communication which includes, but 96 (C) need not be limited to, disseminating to parents materials that 97 98 emphasize the importance of Advanced Placement courses or other 99 advanced courses to a student's ability to gain access to and to 100 succeed in postsecondary education and materials that emphasize 101 the importance of the PSAT/NMSQT, which provide diagnostic 102 feedback on skills and relate student scores to the probability 103 of success in Advanced Placement courses and examinations. Such 104 information shall also be disseminated to students, teachers, 105 counselors, administrators, school districts, community 106 colleges, and state universities. Annually evaluate the impact of the implementation of 107 (d) 108 this section on the rates of student enrollment and success in Advanced Placement courses, on high school graduation rates, and 109 110 on college enrollment rates.
