37 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

39 Section 1. Paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of section 40 1001.43, Florida Statutes, is amended, and paragraph (g) is 41 added to subsection (2) of that section, to read:

1001.43 Supplemental powers and duties of district school
board.--The district school board may exercise the following
supplemental powers and duties as authorized by this code or
State Board of Education rule.

46 (1) STUDENT MANAGEMENT.--The district school board may
47 adopt programs and policies to ensure the safety and welfare of
48 individuals, the student body, and school personnel, which
49 programs and policies may:

50 (b) Require uniforms to be worn by the student body, or 51 impose other dress-related requirements, if the district school Page 2 of 10

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52 board finds that those requirements are necessary for the safety 53 or welfare of the student body or school personnel. <u>However</u>, 54 <u>students may wear sunglasses</u>, <u>hats</u>, <u>or other sun-protective wear</u> 55 <u>while outdoors during school hours</u>, <u>such as when students are at</u> 56 recess.

57 (2) FISCAL MANAGEMENT.--The district school board may
58 adopt policies providing for fiscal management of the school

65 Section 2. Subsections (5) and (6) are added to section66 1003.02, Florida Statutes, to read:

1003.02 District school board operation and control of 67 public K-12 education within the school district. -- As provided 68 in part II of chapter 1001, district school boards are 69 70 constitutionally and statutorily charged with the operation and control of public K-12 education within their school district. 71 72 The district school boards must establish, organize, and operate 73 their public K-12 schools and educational programs, employees, 74 and facilities. Their responsibilities include staff development, public K-12 school student education including 75 education for exceptional students and students in juvenile 76 justice programs, special programs, adult education programs, 77 and career education programs. 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80	(5)(a) If selecting a vendor to market class rings to

(1) (a) District school boards shall use school buses, as 110 111 defined in s. 1006.25, for all regular transportation. Regular 112 transportation or regular use means transportation of students 113 to and from school or school-related activities that are part of a scheduled series or sequence of events to the same location. 114 "Students" means, for the purposes of this section, students 115 116 enrolled in the public schools in prekindergarten disability programs and in kindergarten through grade 12. District school 117 118 boards may regularly use motor vehicles other than school buses only under the following conditions: 119

120 <u>1.(a)</u> When the transportation is for physically 121 handicapped or isolated students and the district school board 122 has elected to provide for the transportation of the student 123 through written or oral contracts or agreements.

124 <u>2.(b)</u> When the transportation is a part of a comprehensive 125 contract for a specialized educational program between a 126 district school board and a service provider who provides 127 instruction, transportation, and other services.

193 (3) Each school district shall establish <u>an ABC'S</u> a

(a) The committee shall be appointed by the school board
and be composed of one school district administrator, at least
one member of the business community, and at least one member of
a local chamber of commerce.

(b) The committee shall evaluate the feasibility of each proposal, including the operating cost, number of students to be served, proposed student-to-teacher ratio, proposed number of years the satellite school would operate, and any other operational or facilities considerations the school board or committee deems appropriate.

(c) The committee shall recommend to the school board those proposals for satellite schools which the committee deems viable and worthy of being established. The school board must take official action on the recommendation of the committee within 60 days after receipt of the recommendation.

(4) <u>"A Business-Community School (ABC'S)</u> "Florida Business
and Education in School Together (Florida BEST) school" is
defined as a public school offering instruction to students from
kindergarten through third grade. The school may offer
instruction in any single grade level or for multiple grade
levels. <u>ABC'S</u> Florida BEST schools shall comply with the
constitutional class size requirements.

 (a) First priority for admission of students to the <u>ABC'S</u>
 Florida <u>BEST</u> school shall be given to the children of owners and Page 8 of 10

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employees of the host business. If additional student capacity remains after those children are admitted, the host business may choose which other neighboring businesses may also participate to generate a viable number of students for the school. The school board shall make the necessary arrangements to accommodate students from other school districts whose parents are associated with the host business or business partners.

(b) Parents shall be responsible for providingtransportation to and from school for the students.

A multiyear contract for operation of the ABC'S 228 (5) 229 Florida BEST school may be entered into between the school district and the host business. The contract must at least 230 231 include provisions relating to any cost of facilities modifications, provide for the assignment or waiver of 232 appropriate insurance costs, specify the number of students 233 expected to be served, provide grounds for canceling the lease, 234 and specify the advance notice required before the school may be 235 236 closed.

(a) The school board shall be responsible for providing
the appropriate instructional, support, and administrative staff
and textbooks, materials, and supplies. The school district may
also agree to operate or contract for the operation of a beforeschool and after-school program using the donated facilities.

(b) The host business shall provide the appropriate types
of space for operating the school. If special facilities, such
as restrooms or dining, recreational, or other areas are
required, the district may contribute a part of the cost of the
construction, remodeling, or renovation for such facilities from
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247 capital outlay funds of the district. A multiyear lease for 248 operation of the facility must be agreed to if the school 249 district contributes to the cost of such construction. 250 Section 5.
