2	An act relating to Lyme disease; providing a
3	short title; creating s. 381.801, F.S.;
4	providing definitions; requiring certain health
5	insurance policies and health maintenance
6	organization contracts to provide coverage for

8	s. 627.64194, F.S.; providing definitions;
9	requiring certain health insurance policies to
10	provide coverage for Lyme disease diagnosis and
11	treatment; providing applicability for
12	referrals made in accordance with procedures
13	authorized by health insurance policies;
14	amending s. 641.31, F.S.; providing
15	definitions; requiring certain health
16	maintenance organization contracts to provide
17	coverage for Lyme disease diagnosis and
18	treatment; providing applicability for
19	referrals made in accordance with procedures
20	authorized by health maintenance organization
21	contracts; providing an effective date.
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23	WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that Lyme disease
24	exists in Florida and has a negative impact on its citizens,
25	and
26	WHEREAS, Lyme disease is the most common vector-borne
27	disease in the United States and other tick-associated
28	diseases are being identified, and
29	WHEREAS, the Department of Health maintains that early
30	diagnosis and proper treatment of Lyme disease are important
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1 strategies in avoiding the complications and expenses of 2 infection and late-stage illness, and 3 WHEREAS, the lack of insurance coverage for diagnosis 4 and long-term antibiotic therapies or other newly developed evidence-based therapies or treatment is a major barrier to 5 6 adequate medical care for patients with symptoms compatible 7 with chronic Lyme disease, and 8 WHEREAS, the Legislature feels a responsibility to help the citizens of the state who suffer from Lyme disease and who 9 may not obtain a timely diagnosis or obtain the appropriate 10 treatment, and to protect the physicians who treat sufferers 11 12 of Lyme disease, by adopting legislation that promotes the 13 diagnosis and treatment of Lyme disease in Florida, NOW, THEREFORE, 14 15 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 16 17 18 Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Lyme Disease Insurance Coverage Act." 19 20 Section 2. Section 381.801, Florida Statutes, is 21 created to read: 22 381.801 Lyme disease; definitions; coverage.--23 (1) For purposes of this section: (a) "Coverage" means an insurer may not contest, 2.4 reverse, or deny payment for diagnostic testing or long-term 25 antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based 26 therapy based upon a physician's order, whether the physician 27 2.8 is in a preferred provider network as defined in s. 627.6471(1)(c) or not, if the treating physician has 29 30 determined the therapy to be medically necessary. 31

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1	(b) "Long-term antibiotic therapy" means
2	administration of oral, intramuscular, or intravenous
3	antibiotics, singly or in combination, for a period of more
4	than 4 weeks.
5	<u>(c) "Lyme disease" means the clinical diagnosis by a</u>
6	physician of the presence in a patient of signs and symptoms
7	compatible with acute, late-stage, recurrent, or chronic
8	infection with Borrelia burgdorferi or with complications
9	related to such an infection. Lyme disease includes an
10	infection that meets the surveillance criteria set forth by
11	the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and also
12	includes other acute, late-stage, recurrent, and chronic
13	manifestations of such an infection as determined by the
14	treating physician.
15	(d) "Medically necessary" means the use of long-term
16	antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based
17	therapy that the physician has determined is necessary in a
18	particular case based on the patient's symptoms, signs, and
19	responsiveness to the treatment prescribed by the physician.
20	(e) "Physician" means a person licensed to practice
21	<u>medicine under chapter 458 or osteopathic medicine under</u>
21	
22	chapter 459 or a person who is licensed to practice medicine
23 24	or osteopathic medicine in any other state and whose license is currently valid and the requirements for practicing in such
24 25	<u>a capacity are substantially similar to or are more stringent</u>
26	than those of this state.
27	(2) Health insurance policies and health maintenance
28	organization contracts shall provide coverage for the
29 20	diagnosis and treatment of Lyme disease, including long-term
30	antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based
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1 therapy, as deemed to be medically necessary by a physician, as specified in ss. 627.64194 and 641.31(36). 2 Section 3. Section 627.64194, Florida Statutes, is 3 4 created to read: 5 627.64194 Required coverage for Lyme disease.-б (1) As used in this section: 7 (a) "Coverage" means an insurer may not contest, reverse, or deny payment for diagnostic testing or long-term 8 9 antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based 10 therapy based upon a physician's order, whether the physician is in a preferred provider network as defined in s. 11 627.6471(1)(c) or not, if the treating physician has 12 13 determined the therapy to be medically necessary. 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1 particular case based on the patient's symptoms, signs, and 2 responsiveness to the treatment prescribed by the physician. (e) "Physician" means a person licensed to practice 3 4 medicine under chapter 458 or osteopathic medicine under 5 chapter 459 or a person who is licensed to practice medicine 6 or osteopathic medicine in any other state and whose license 7 is currently valid and the requirements for practicing in such 8 a capacity are substantially similar to or are more stringent than those of this state. 9 10 (2) A health insurance policy that covers a resident of this state and that is issued, amended, delivered, or 11 12 renewed in this state on or after July 1, 2006, shall provide 13 coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of Lyme disease and its sequelae, including, but not limited to, long-term 14 antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based 15 therapy to control Lyme disease and its sequelae, when a 16 17 physician deems the treatment to be medically necessary and 18 orders such therapy after making a thorough evaluation of the patient's symptoms and signs, diagnostic test results, and 19 20 response to treatment and the physician has documented 21 objective clinical change. 22 (3) This section shall apply to a physician who is 23 licensed to practice medicine or osteopathic medicine in any other state and whose license is currently valid and the 2.4 requirements for practicing in such a capacity are 25 substantially similar to or are more stringent than those of 26 27 this state, provided a referral for the required coverage is 2.8 made in accordance with the procedures authorized by the 29 health insurance policy. 30 Section 4. Subsections (36) through (40) of section 641.31, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (37) 31

3	641.31 Health maintenance contracts
4	(36)(a) As used in this subsection:
5	1. "Coverage" means an insurer may not contest,
6	reverse, or deny payment for diagnostic testing or long-term
7	antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based
8	therapy based upon a physician's order, whether the physician
9	is in a health maintenance organization's provider network or
10	not, if the treating physician has determined the therapy to
11	be medically necessary.
12	2. "Long-term antibiotic therapy" means administration
13	of oral, intramuscular, or intravenous antibiotics, singly or
14	in combination, for a period of more than 4 weeks.
15	3. "Lyme disease" means the clinical diagnosis by a
16	physician of the presence in a patient of signs and symptoms
17	compatible with acute, late-stage, recurrent, or chronic
18	infection with Borrelia burgdorferi or with complications
19	related to such an infection. Lyme disease includes an
20	infection that meets the surveillance criteria set forth by
21	the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and also
22	includes other acute, late-stage, recurrent, and chronic
23	manifestations of such an infection as determined by the
24	treating physician.
25	4. "Medically necessary" means the use of long-term
26	antibiotic therapy or other newly developed evidence-based
27	therapy that the physician has determined is necessary in a
28	particular case based on the patient's symptoms, signs, and
29	responsiveness to the treatment prescribed by the physician.
30	5. "Physician" means a person licensed to practice
31	medicine under chapter 458 or osteopathic medicine under

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1	chapter 459 or a person who is licensed to practice medicine
2	or osteopathic medicine in any other state and whose license
3	is currently valid and the requirements for practicing in such
4	a capacity are substantially similar to or are more stringent
5	than those of this state.
6	(b) A health maintenance organization contract that
7	covers a resident of this state and that is issued, amended,
8	delivered, or renewed in this state on or after July 1, 2006,
9	shall provide coverage for the diagnosis and treatment of Lyme
10	disease and its sequelae, including, but not limited to,
11	long-term antibiotic therapy or other newly developed
12	evidence-based therapy to control Lyme disease and its
13	sequelae, when a physician deems the treatment to be medically
14	necessary and orders such therapy after making a thorough
15	evaluation of the patient's symptoms and signs, diagnostic
16	test results, and response to treatment and the physician has
17	documented objective clinical change.
18	(c) This subsection shall apply to a physician who is
19	licensed to practice medicine or osteopathic medicine in any
20	other state and whose license is currently valid and the
21	requirements for practicing in such a capacity are
22	substantially similar to or are more stringent than those of
23	this state, provided a referral for the required coverage is
24	made in accordance with the procedures authorized by the
25	health maintenance organization contract.
26	Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2006.
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
