community health centers, and mobile dental or health units. 2 Dental charting may also be performed on a volunteer basis at health fairs. Each person, or the parent or legal quardian of 3 4 that person, who receives a dental charting pursuant to this section must receive and acknowledge a written disclosure in 5 6 advance of the charting which states that the purpose of the 7 dental charting is to collect data for use by a dentist at a prompt subsequent examination. The disclosure form also must 8 emphasize that diagnosis of caries, soft-tissue disease, oral 9 10 cancer, temporomandibular joint syndrome, and dento-facial malocclusions can only be completed by a dentist in the 11 12 context of delivering a comprehensive dental examination. As 13 used in this section, the term "dental charting" means the recording of visual observations of clinical conditions of the 14 oral cavity without the use of X rays, laboratory tests, or 15 other diagnostic methods or equipment, except the instruments 16 necessary to record visual restorations, missing teeth, 18 suspicious areas, and periodontal pockets. The Board of Dentistry shall approve the content of the charting and 19 disclosure forms to be used under this section. Both forms 2.0 21 must emphasize the inherent limitations of a dental charting 2.2 exercise, encourage complete examination by a dentist in 23 rendering a professional diagnosis of the patient's overall oral health needs, and state that dental charting should not 2.4 be substituted for a comprehensive dental examination. Medical 2.5 clearance by a physician or dentist is required in those cases 2.6 2.7 when a periodontal probe is used by a dental hygienist when 2.8 dental charting. This section does not authorize direct reimbursement for dental charting by Medicaid, health 29 insurers, health maintenance organizations, prepaid dental 30 plans, or other third-party payors beyond what is otherwise 31

1	allowed by law. Any referral made in conjunction with
2	providing dental charting services must comply with federal
3	and state laws governing patient referral, kickbacks, and
4	patient brokering. The performance of dental charting without
5	supervision does not create a patient of record with respect
6	to the dental hygienist performing the procedure.
