All net profits from sales of alcoholic beverages collected during the permit period must be retained by the nonprofit civic organization. Any such civic organization may be issued only three such permits per calendar year. The director of the division may issue a permit to such civic organization more than three times per calendar year, but not more than 15 times per calendar year, upon the approval of the incorporated municipality, town, or board of county commissioners having jurisdiction over the location of
