13	ramifications of prejudice, racism, and stereotyping, and an
14	examination of what it means to be a responsible and
15	respectful person, for the purposes of encouraging tolerance
16	of diversity in a pluralistic society and for nurturing and

5	health; prevention and control of disease; and substance use

27	either a minimum of 24 academic credits in grades 9 through 12
28	or an International Baccalaureate curriculum. The 24 credits
29	shall be distributed as follows:
30	(g) One-half credit in American government, including
31	study of the <u>Declaration of Independence and the</u> Constitution
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1 of the United States. For students entering the 9th grade in 2 the 1997-1998 school year and thereafter, the study of Florida 3 government, including study of the State Constitution, the 4 three branches of state government, and municipal and county 5 government, shall be included as part of the required study of 6 American government.

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District school boards may award a maximum of one-half credit 8 in social studies and one-half elective credit for student 9 10 completion of nonpaid voluntary community or school service 11 work. Students choosing this option must complete a minimum of 75 hours of service in order to earn the one-half credit in 12 13 either category of instruction. Credit may not be earned for service provided as a result of court action. District school 14 15 boards that approve the award of credit for student volunteer service shall develop guidelines regarding the award of the 16 credit, and school principals are responsible for approving 17 specific volunteer activities. A course designated in the 18 19 Course Code Directory as grade 9 through grade 12 that is 20 taken below the 9th grade may be used to satisfy high school 21 graduation requirements or Florida Academic Scholars award 22 requirements as specified in a district school board's student 23 progression plan. A student shall be granted credit toward 2.4 meeting the requirements of this subsection for equivalent courses, as identified pursuant to s. 1007.271(6), taken 25 through dual enrollment. 26 Section 3.
