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| 20 | Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: |
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| 22 | Section 1. <u>Universal health care for children</u> |
| 23 | (1) LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS |
| 24 | (a) The Legislature finds that one of the principal |
| 25 | duties of government is to ensure the care, safety, and |
| 26 | protection of children in an environment that fosters healthy |
| 27 | social, emotional, intellectual, and physical development. To |
| 28 | ensure a secure and safe environment, it is a paramount goal |
| 29 | to promote the health and well-being of all children in this |
| 30 | state. |

| 1 | (b) The Legislature further finds that most families |
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| 2 | are competent caregivers and providers for the health care |
| 3 | needs of their children and that children achieve their |
| 4 | greatest potential when families are able to support and |
| 5 | nurture the health of their children in their own homes. |
| 6 | Therefore, the Legislature finds that the policies and |
| 7 | procedures relating to the health of children in this state |
| 8 | must ensure that all children, regardless of their parents' |
| 9 | income, have access to high-quality health care, without cost |
| 10 | to the family or child. |
| 11 | (2) DEFINITIONSAs used in this section, the term: |
| 12 | (a) "Child" means any person younger than 19 years of |
| 13 | age. |
| 14 | (b) "Child with special health care needs" means a |
| 15 | child whose serious or chronic physical or developmental |
| 16 | condition requires extensive preventive and maintenance care |
| 17 | beyond that required by typical healthy children. Health care |
| 18 | utilization by such a child exceeds the statistically expected |
| 19 | usage of the normal child adjusted for chronological age. |
| 20 | These children often need complex care requiring multiple |
| 21 | providers, rehabilitation services, and specialized equipment |
| 22 | in a number of different settings. |
| 23 | (c) "Comprehensive health care services" means |
| 24 | services, medical equipment, and supplies furnished by a |
| 25 | provider, including, but not limited to, medical, surgical, |
| 26 | and dental care; psychological, optometric, optic, |
| 27 | chiropractic, podiatric, nursing, physical therapy, and |
| 28 | pharmaceutical services; emergency services and care; health |
| 29 | education, preventive medical, rehabilitative, and home health |
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31 <u>care; nursing home care; convalescent institutional care;</u>

1 technical and professional clinical pathology laboratory 2 services; laboratory and ambulance services; appliances, drugs, medicines, and supplies; and any other care, service, 3 4 or treatment of disease or correction of defects for children. 5 (d) "Department" means the Department of Health. б (e) "Emergency services and care" means medical 7 screening, examination, and evaluation by a physician, or, to 8 the extent permitted by applicable law, by other appropriate personnel under the supervision of a physician, to determine 9 10 if an emergency medical condition exists and, if it does, the care, treatment, or surgery for a covered service by a 11 12 physician necessary to relieve or eliminate the emergency 13 medical condition, within the service capability of a hospital. 14 (f) "Family" means the group or the individuals caring 15 for a child. The family includes a child with a custodial 16 17 parent or caretaker relative who resides in the same house or 18 living unit or, in the case of a child whose disability of nonage has been removed under chapter 743, Florida Statutes, 19 the child. The family may also include other individuals whose 2.0 21 income and resources are considered in whole or in part in 2.2 determining the eligibility of the child. 23 (q) "Health care provider" means a health care professional, health care facility, or entity licensed or 2.4 certified to provide health services in this state which meets 25 the criteria as established by the department. 26 27 (h) "Medically necessary" means the use of any medical 2.8 treatment, service, equipment, or supply necessary to palliate the effects of a terminal condition or to prevent, diagnose, 29 30 correct, cure, alleviate, or preclude deterioration of a 31

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1 condition that threatens life, causes pain or suffering, or 2 results in illness or infirmity and which is: 1. Consistent with the symptom, diagnosis, and 3 4 treatment of the child's condition; 5 2. Provided in accordance with generally accepted 6 standards of medical practice; 7 3. Not primarily intended for the convenience of the child, the child's family, or the health care provider; 8 9 The most appropriate level of supply or service for 4. 10 the diagnosis and treatment of the child's condition; and Approved by the appropriate medical body or health 11 12 care specialty involved as effective, appropriate, and 13 essential for the care and treatment of the child's condition. (3) UNIVERSAL HEALTH ACCESS PLAN FOR CHILDREN. -- The 14 Universal Health Access Plan for Children is created for the 15 purpose of providing a single, publicly funded statewide 16 17 program to provide comprehensive health care service for all 18 medically necessary health services for all children of the state without cost to the child or his or her family. 19 (4) RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.--20 21 (a) The Department of Health shall: 2.2 1. Establish budget and reimbursement policy 23 quidelines for the plan, recommend priorities for implementing comprehensive plans and budgets, and determine aggregate 2.4 25 capital expenditures. 2. Establish fee schedules for health care providers. 26 27 Determine the medical standards for establishing 3. 2.8 the eligibility of children seeking comprehensive health care services from the plan based on medical priority. 29 30 31

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1 Coordinate a comprehensive delivery system to 2 enable children to take maximum advantage of all available 3 funds. 4 5. Administer and implement the plan. 5 Study the most effective methods of providing 6. б comprehensive health care services to all children in this 7 state, including children with special health care needs. 8 7. Serve as a provider and principal case manager for children with special health care needs. 9 10 8. Report annually to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on 11 12 its activities and recommend any changes in health care law 13 and funding to improve access to health care for the children of this state. 14 9. Disseminate, to health care providers and to the 15 public, information concerning the plan and the children 16 17 eligible to receive the comprehensive health care services 18 under the plan. 10. Monitor, study, and evaluate the operation of the 19 plan, including, but not limited to, the adequacy and quality 20 21 of the comprehensive health care services furnished to children under the plan, the cost of each type of service, and 2.2 23 the effectiveness of cost-containment measures under the plan. 11. Conduct necessary investigations and inquiries and 2.4 25 compel the submission of information, documents, and records it considers necessary to carry out its duties under this 26 27 section. 2.8 12. Conduct other activities the department considers necessary to carry out the purposes of this section. 29 30 13. Develop a plan of operation. 31

| 23 | Creates a universal health care plan for children. Provides for a single, publicly financed statewide |
| 24 | program to provide medically necessary health services for all children in the state without cost to the child |
| 25 | or his or her family. Requires the Department of Health to administer the plan. Directs the department to perform |
| 26 | certain specified activities and responsibilities. Directs the department to adopt rules to administer the |
| 27 | plan. Authorizes the department to hold public hearings. |
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
