Senator Constantine moved the following amendment:
Senate Amendment (with title amendment)
Between line(s) 4497 and 4498,
insert:
Section 86. <u>Recycling</u>
(1) The Legislature finds that the failure or inability to
economically recover material and energy resources from solid
waste results in the unnecessary waste and depletion of our
natural resources. As Florida continues to grow, so will the
potential amount of discarded material that must be treated and
disposed of, necessitating the improvement of solid waste
collection and disposal. Therefore, the maximum recycling and
reuse of such resources are considered high-priority goals of
this state.

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17	(2) By the year 2020, the long-term goal for the recycling
18	efforts of state and local governmental entities, private
19	companies and organizations, and the general public is to reduce
20	the amount of solid waste disposed of in waste management
21	facilities, landfills, or incineration facilities by a statewide
22	average of at least 75 percent.
23	(3) The Department of Environmental Preservation shall
24	develop a comprehensive recycling program that is designed to
25	achieve the percentage stated in subsection (2) and submit such
26	program to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the
27	House of Representatives by January 1, 2010. The program may not
28	be implemented until approved by the Legislature. The program
29	must be developed in coordination with input from state and local
30	entities, private businesses, and the public. Under the program,
31	recyclable materials shall include, but are not limited to,
32	metals, paper, glass, plastic, textile, rubber materials, and
33	mulch. Components of the program shall include, but are not
34	limited to:
35	(a) Programs to identify environmentally preferable
36	purchasing practices to encourage the purchase of recycled,
37	durable, and less toxic goods;
38	(b) Programs to educate students in grades K-12 in the
39	benefits of, and proper techniques for, recycling;
40	(c) Programs for statewide recognition of successful
41	recycling efforts by schools, businesses, public groups, and
42	private citizens;
43	(d) Programs for municipalities and counties to develop and
44	implement efficient recycling efforts to return valuable
45	materials to productive use, conserve energy, and protect natural
46	resources;
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47	(e) Programs by which the department can provide technical
48	assistance to municipalities and counties in support of their
49	recycling efforts;
50	(f) Programs to educate and train the public in proper
51	recycling efforts;
52	(g) Evaluation of how financial assistance can best be
53	provided to municipalities and counties in support of their
54	recycling efforts; and
