6	Section 87. Section 403.7032, Florida Statutes, is created
7	to read
8	403.7032 Recycling
9	(1) The Legislature finds that the failure or inability to
10	economically recover material and energy resources from solid
11	waste results in the unnecessary waste and depletion of our
12	natural resources. As the state continues to grow, so will the
13	potential amount of discarded material that must be treated and
14	disposed of, necessitating the improvement of solid waste
15	collection and disposal. Therefore, the maximum recycling and
16	reuse of such resources are considered high-priority goals of the
17	state.

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18	(2) By the year 2020, the long-term goal for the recycling
19	efforts of state and local governmental entities, private
20	companies and organizations, and the general public is to reduce
21	the amount of recyclable solid waste disposed of in waste
22	management facilities, landfills, or incineration facilities by a
23	statewide average of at least 75 percent. However, any solid
24	waste used for the production of renewable energy shall count
25	toward the long term recycling goal as set forth in this section.
26	(3) The Department of Environmental Protection shall
27	develop a comprehensive recycling program that is designed to
28	achieve the percentage under subsection (2) and submit the
29	program to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the
30	House of Representatives by January 1, 2010. The program may not
31	be implemented until approved by the Legislature. The program
32	must be developed in coordination with input from state and local
33	entities, private businesses, and the public. Under the program,
34	recyclable materials shall include, but are not limited to,
35	metals, paper, glass, plastic, textile, rubber materials, and
36	mulch. Components of the program shall include, but are not
37	limited to:
38	(a) Programs to identify environmentally preferable
39	purchasing practices to encourage the purchase of recycled,
40	durable, and less toxic goods.
41	(b) Programs to educate students in grades K-12 in the
42	benefits of, and proper techniques for, recycling.
43	(c) Programs for statewide recognition of successful
44	recycling efforts by schools, businesses, public groups, and
45	private citizens.
46	(d) Programs for municipalities and counties to develop and
47	implement efficient recycling efforts to return valuable

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48	materials to productive use, conserve energy, and protect natural
49	resources.
50	(e) Programs by which the department can provide technical
51	assistance to municipalities and counties in support of their
52	recycling efforts.
53	(f) Programs to educate and train the public in proper
54	recycling efforts;
55	(g) Evaluation of how financial assistance can best be
56	provided to municipalities and counties in support of their
57	recycling efforts.
58	(h) Evaluation of why existing waste management and
59	recycling programs in the state have not been better used.
60	Section 88. Section 403.7033, Florida Statutes, is created

62	403.7033 Departmental analysis of particular recyclable
63	materialsThe Legislature finds that prudent regulation of
64	recyclable materials is crucial to the ongoing welfare of
65	Florida's ecology and economy. As such, the Department of
66	Environmental Protection shall undertake an analysis of the need
67	for new or different regulation of auxiliary containers,
68	wrappings, or disposable plastic bags used by consumers to carry
69	products from retail establishments. The analysis shall include
70	input from state and local government agencies, stakeholders,
71	private businesses, and citizens, and shall evaluate the efficacy
72	and necessity of both statewide and local regulation of these
73	materials. To ensure consistent and effective implementation, the
74	department shall submit a report with conclusions and
75	recommendations to the Legislature no later than February 1,
76	2010. Until such time that the Legislature adopts the
77	recommendations of the department, no local government, local

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78	governmental agency, or state government agency may enact any
79	rule, regulation, or ordinance regarding use, disposition, sale,
80	prohibition, restriction, or tax of such auxiliary containers,
81	wrappings, or disposable plastic bags.
82	Section 89. 403.706 Local government solid waste
83	responsibilities
84	(2)(a) Each county shall implement a recyclable materials
85	recycling program. Counties and municipalities are encouraged to
86	form cooperative arrangements for implementing recycling
87	programs.
88	(b) Such programs shall be designed to recover a
89	significant portion of at least four of the following materials
90	from the solid waste stream prior to final disposal at a solid
91	waste disposal facility and to offer these materials for
92	recycling: newspaper, aluminum cans, steel cans, glass, plastic
93	bottles, cardboard, office paper, and yard trash. Local
94	governments which operate permitted waste-to-energy facilities
95	may retrieve ferrous and nonferrous metal as a byproduct of
96	combustion.
97	(c) Local governments are encouraged to separate all
98	plastics, metal, and all grades of paper for recycling prior to
99	final disposal and are further encouraged to recycle yard trash
100	and other mechanically treated solid waste into compost available
101	for agricultural and other acceptable uses.
102	(d) By July 1, 2010, each county shall develop and
103	implement a plan to achieve a goal to compost is encouraged to
104	consider plans for composting or mulching of organic materials
105	that would otherwise be disposed of in a landfill. The goal shall
106	provide that up to 10 percent and no less than 5 percent of
107	organic material would be composted within the county and the

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108	municipalities within its boundaries. The department may reduce
109	or modify the compost goal if the county demonstrates to the
110	department that achievement of the goal would be impractical
111	given the county's unique demographic, urban density, or
112	inability to separate normally compostable material from the
113	solid waste stream. The composting <u>plan is</u> or mulching plans are
114	encouraged to address partnership with the private sector.
115	(e) Each county is encouraged to consider plans for
116	mulching organic materials that would otherwise be disposed of in
117	a landfill. The mulching plans are encouraged to address
118	partnership with the private sector.
