96 (7) (5) "Orthotic fitter" means a person who is licensed to 97 practice orthotics, pursuant to a licensed physician's written 98 prescription, whose scope of practice is limited to fitting 99 prefabricated cervical orthoses not requiring more than minor 100 modification and not used for the treatment of cervical fractures 101 or dislocations; custom-made and prefabricated compression 102 garments pressure gradient hose; trusses; custom-molded and 103 noncustom diabetic therapeutic footwear; prefabricated corset or 104 frame-type spinal orthoses, except for those used in the treatment of vertebral fractures or scoliosis, rigid body jackets 105 106 made of thermoformable materials, and "halo" devices; and 107 prefabricated orthoses of the upper and lower extremities, except 108 for those used in the treatment of bone fractures and open 109 diabetic ulcers.

110 <u>(8)(6)</u> "Orthotic fitter assistant" means a person who is 111 licensed to practice orthotics, pursuant to a licensed 112 physician's written prescription, whose scope of practice is 113 limited to fitting, without modification, prefabricated soft 114 cervical orthoses not used for the treatment of cervical 115 <u>fractures or dislocations</u>; prefabricated soft spinal supports <u>not</u> 116 used for treatment of vertebral fractures; prefabricated

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117 <u>compression garments</u> pressure gradient hose; trusses; and soft 118 prefabricated orthoses for the upper and lower extremities <u>not</u> 119 used in the treatment of bone fractures and open diabetic ulcers.

120 (9) (7) "Orthotics" means the practice, pursuant to a 121 licensed physician's written prescription, of evaluating, 122 treatment formulating, measuring, designing, fabricating, 123 assembling, fitting, adjusting, servicing, or providing the initial training necessary to accomplish the fitting of an 124 125 orthosis or pedorthic device; however, the repair, replacement, 126 adjustment, or servicing of any existing orthosis may be 127 performed without an additional prescription from the patient's 128 physician, unless the original prescription states otherwise. If a patient is under the care of a licensed occupational therapist 129 130 or physical therapist, the orthotist must consult with the 131 therapist if the therapist has requested consultation regarding 132 the fitting, design, or fabrication of an orthosis or regarding 133 treatment with an orthosis.

136 (11) (9) "Pedorthic device" means therapeutic shoes, shoe 137 modifications made for therapeutic purposes, nondynamic 138 prosthetic fillers of the forefoot, and foot orthoses for use on 139 the human foot limited anatomically to that part distal to the 140 maleoli from the ankle and below, but does not include arch 141 supports; nontherapeutic accommodative inlays and nontherapeutic 142 accommodative footwear, regardless of method of manufacture; 143 unmodified, over-the-counter shoes; or prefabricated foot care products. For purposes of this subsection, "accommodative" means 144 designed with the primary goal of conforming to the individual's 145

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146 anatomy and "inlay" means any removable material upon which the 147 foot directly rests inside the shoe and which may be an integral 148 design component of the shoe.

149 (12) (10) "Pedorthics" means the practice, pursuant to a 150 licensed physician's written prescription, of evaluating, 151 treatment formulating, measuring, designing, fabricating, 152 assembling, fitting, adjusting, servicing, or providing the 153 initial training necessary to accomplish the fitting of a 154 pedorthic device; however, the repair, replacement, adjustment, 155 or servicing of any existing pedorthic device may be performed 156 without an additional prescription from the patient's physician, 157 unless the original prescription states otherwise. If a patient 158 is under the care of a licensed occupational therapist or 159 physical therapist, the pedorthist must consult with the 160 therapist if the therapist has requested consultation regarding the fitting, design, or fabrication of a pedorthic device or 161 162 regarding treatment with a pedorthic device.

163 <u>(13) (11)</u> "Pedorthist" means a person licensed to practice 164 pedorthics pursuant to this chapter.

165 (14) (12) "Prosthesis" means a medical device used to 166 replace a missing appendage or other external body part, 167 including an artificial limb, hand, or foot. It does not include surgically implanted devices or artificial eyes; dental 168 169 appliances; ostomy products; or cosmetic devices such as breast 170 prostheses, eyelashes, or wigs; or other devices that do not have a significant impact on the musculoskeletal functions of the 171 172 body.

173 <u>(15)(13)</u> "Prosthetics" means the practice, pursuant to a 174 licensed physician's written prescription, of evaluating,

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175 treatment formulating, measuring, designing, fabricating, 176 assembling, fitting, adjusting, servicing, or providing the 177 initial training necessary to accomplish the fitting of a prosthesis, except the repair, replacement, adjustment, or 178 179 servicing of any existing prosthesis may be performed without an 180 additional prescription from the patient's physician, unless the 181 original prescription states otherwise. If a patient is under the 182 care of a licensed occupational therapist or physical therapist, the prosthetist must consult with the therapist if the therapist 183 184 has requested consultation regarding the fitting, design, or 185 fabrication of a prosthesis or regarding treatment with a 186 prosthesis.

187 <u>(16) (14)</u> "Prosthetist" means a person licensed to practice 188 prosthetics pursuant to this chapter.

189 <u>(17) (15)</u> "Prosthetist-orthotist" means a person licensed to 190 practice as a prosthetist and as an orthotist.

191 (18) "Resident" means a person registered to practice 192 orthotics or prosthetics under the supervision of a licensed 193 orthotist or prosthetist as defined by the board by rule.

(19) "Therapeutic" means designed and fabricated to provide
 support, correction, or alleviation of neuromuscular or
 musculoskeletal dysfunction, disease, injury, or deformity. It
 does not include devices used solely to increase comfort through
 the use of soft materials or spreading out of forces.
