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I. Summary:

This joint resolution submits to the voters an amendment to Section 3 of Article III of the State Constitution and the creation of Section 27 of Article XII of the State Constitution, which would change the date for convening the regular session of the Florida Legislature from the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in June.

This joint resolution must be approved by a three-fifth majority of the members of each chamber of the Legislature.¹ The amendment would then require a 60 percent vote² in favor by the voters of a general election, or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose.³

The joint resolution substantially amends Section 3 of Article III of the State Constitution and creates Section 27 of Article XII of the State Constitution.

II. Present Situation:

The State Constitution sets the date to convene regular sessions of the Florida Legislature as the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March.⁴ The Constitution allows the Legislature to set another date to convene during even numbered years.⁵

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

This joint resolution submits to the voters an amendment to Section 3 of Article III of the State Constitution that would change the date for convening the regular session of the Florida Legislature from the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in June.

This joint resolution also submits to the voters a new Section 27 of Article XII of the Florida Constitution. This provision sets 2010 as the first year the new regular session start date would go into effect.

This joint resolution must be approved by a three-fifths majority of the members of each chamber of the Legislature. The amendment would then require a 60 percent vote in favor by the voters of a general election, or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose.

This joint resolution must be approved by a three-fifths majority of the members of each chamber of the Legislature.⁶ The amendment would then require a 60 percent vote⁷ in favor by the voters of a general election, or at an earlier special election specifically authorized by law for that purpose.⁸

Costs for advertising vary depending upon the length of the amendment; however, the cost per amendment is estimated to be approximately \$60,000.
