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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to the Governor's School for Science and Technology; creating s. 1002.371, F.S.; establishing the school within the Florida K-20 public education system and the Department of Education; providing for the Governor's School for Science and Technology to offer intensive instruction for students in grades 9 through 12 and summer programs for teachers; providing for the school to be located in Brevard County; providing for a board of trustees to be appointed by the Governor and subject to confirmation by the Senate; providing for terms of office; providing for members of the board of trustees to be reimbursed for travel expenses; authorizing the board of trustees to adopt rules, subject to approval by the State Board of Education; providing powers and duties of the board of trustees; requiring the board of trustees to submit a progress report; providing requirements for legislative budget requests; providing for funding the Governor's School for Science and Technology in the General Appropriations Act and from private entities; requiring that students enrolled in the school be recorded as enrolled in their home school district for purposes of funding; amending ss. 110.205, 216.251, 1000.04, 1002.20, and 1003.02, F.S., relating to exemptions concerning career service positions, appropriations for salaries, the components of the delivery of public education, the rights of students and parents concerning public school choice, and parental notice of acceleration mechanisms by district school boards; conforming provisions to changes made by

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the act; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 1002.371, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

1002.371 Governor's School for Science and Technology.--The Governor's School for Science and Technology is established within the Florida K-20 public education system and shall be administratively housed within the Department of Education.

- (1) The mission of the Governor's School for Science and Technology is to provide advanced educational classes in the areas of science, mathematics, engineering, and technology in a residential setting which are taught by highly qualified scientists and instructors and organized and provided in short periods of intensive specialized real-life learning experiences for highly motivated and talented students in grades 9 through 12.
- (2) The school shall be located in Brevard County and be situated where a formal partnership between the school and the Kennedy Space Center may readily be established and maintained in order to provide real-life learning experiences for students. The attendance area for the school is the entire state; however, admission to the school is a privilege reserved for those qualified students who are selected through a statewide application and qualification system and is not a right afforded to the general population of students in this state. Students enrolled in the school must reside on the school's premises and be under the control of the school.

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(3) The board of trustees created in subsection (5) shall take such actions as are necessary for planning and establishing the Governor's School for Science and Technology as provided in this section. The board shall submit a progress report to the Commissioner of Education, the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by January 1, 2009, which must include a timeline for future actions to be completed and a summary of the legislative budget request for the 2009-2010 fiscal year.

- (4) It is the intent of the Legislature that existing facilities be used for the school and that by the 2010-2011 school year the school begin offering:
- (a) Advanced learning opportunities in the areas of mathematics, science, engineering, and technology to qualified students; and
- (b) Summer programs for elementary, middle, and high school teachers.
- (5) (a) A board of trustees is created for the Governor's School for Science and Technology which shall consist of seven members. The trustees shall be appointed by the Governor and are subject to confirmation by the Senate. Trustees shall be appointed to 4-year terms, except that the initial terms shall be staggered so that three members are appointed to 4-year terms, two members are appointed to 3-year terms, and two members are appointed to 2-year terms. The Governor may remove any member for cause and shall fill all vacancies that occur.
- (b) The board of trustees shall elect a chair annually. The trustees are entitled to reimbursement for travel expenses as provided in s. 112.061, the accounts of which shall be paid by

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the Chief Financial Officer upon itemized vouchers duly approved by the chair.

- (c) The board of trustees may adopt rules pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and 120.54 to implement provisions of law relating to operation of the Governor's School for Science and Technology. Such rules shall be submitted to the State Board of Education for approval or disapproval. After a rule is approved by the State Board of Education, the rule shall be filed immediately with the Department of State. The board of trustees shall act at all times in conjunction with the rules of the State Board of Education.
- The board of trustees is a body corporate and shall have a corporate seal. Unless otherwise provided by law, all actions of the board of trustees shall be consistent with all laws and rules applicable to state agencies. Title to any gift, donation, or bequest received by the board of trustees pursuant to subparagraph (e)11. shall vest in the board of trustees. Title to all other property and other assets of the Governor's School for Science and Technology shall vest in the State Board of Education, but the board of trustees has complete jurisdiction over the management of the school.
 - (e) The board of trustees may:
- 1. Appoint or remove a director, faculty, teachers, and other employees according to its best judgment and to fix their compensation.
- 2. Procure professional services such as architectural and engineering services.
- 3. Procure legal services without the prior written approval of the Attorney General.
 - 4. Determine eligibility of students and procedures for

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117 admission, including, but not limited to:

- a. The requirements that an individual must meet in order to be qualified for admission to the Governor's School for Science and Technology and the standards by which applicants will be selected for admission to the school. Priority must be given to individuals who excel or demonstrate interest in the areas of mathematics, science, engineering, or technology. The requirements and standards may include, but need not be limited to, scores on tests or favorable recommendations from teachers or other school officials.
- b. The number of students that may be enrolled at the school based on the resources that are available.
- c. The procedures by which an individual may apply for admission to the school or appeal a decision concerning an application to attend the school.
- 5. Provide necessary housing, food, and transportation for students while attending the school and the cost of transportation from their home to the school and return.
- 6. Provide for the proper keeping of accounts and records and for budgeting of funds.
 - 7. Enter into contracts.
 - 8. Sue and be sued.
 - 9. Secure public liability insurance.
- 10. Do and perform every other matter or thing requisite to the proper management, maintenance, support, and control of the school at the highest efficiency economically possible, taking into consideration the purposes of the school.
- 11. Receive gifts, donations, and bequests of money or property, real or personal, tangible or intangible, from any

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person, firm, corporation, or other legal entity. However, the board of trustees may not obligate the state to any expenditure or policy that is not specifically authorized by law. If the bill of sale, will, trust indenture, deed, or other legal conveyance specifies terms and conditions concerning the use of such money or property, the board of trustees shall observe such terms and conditions.

- 12. Sell or convey by bill of sale, deed, or other legal instrument any property, real or personal, received as a gift, donation, or bequest upon such terms and conditions as the board of trustees considers to be in the best interest of the school and its students.
- 13. Invest such moneys in securities enumerated under s. 215.47(1), (2)(c), (3), (4), and (9), and in The Common Fund, an Investment Management Fund exclusively for nonprofit educational institutions.
 - (f) The board of trustees shall:
- 1. Annually prepare and submit a legislative budget request for the Governor's School for Science and Technology. The legislative budget request shall be prepared using the same format, procedures, and timelines required for the submission of the legislative budget of the Department of Education. The school's legislative budget request shall be submitted to the department for review and approval. Subsequent to the department's approval, the commissioner shall include the Governor's School for Science and Technology in the department's legislative budget request to the State Board of Education, the Governor, and the Legislature. The legislative budget request and the appropriation for the Governor's School for Science and

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Technology shall be a separate identifiable sum in the public schools budget entity of the Department of Education. The annual appropriation for the school shall be distributed monthly in payments as nearly equal as possible.

- 2. Approve and administer an annual operating budget.
- 3. Require all funds received other than gifts, donations, bequests, funds raised by or belonging to student clubs or student organizations, and funds held for specific students or in accounts for individual students to be deposited in the State Treasury and expended as authorized in the General Appropriations Act.
- 4. Require all purchases to be in accordance with the provisions of chapter 287, except for purchases made with funds received as gifts, donations, or bequests; funds raised by or belonging to student clubs or student organizations; or funds held for specific students or in accounts for individual students.
- 5. Administer and maintain personnel programs for all employees of the board of trustees and the Governor's School for Science and Technology, who shall be state employees, including the personnel classification and pay plan established in accordance with ss. 110.205(2)(d) and 216.251(2)(a)6. for academic and academic administrative personnel, the provisions of chapter 110, and the provisions of law that grant authority to the Department of Management Services over such programs for state employees.
- 6. Give preference in appointment and retention in positions of employment as provided within s. 295.07(1).
 - 7. Ensure that the Governor's School for Science and

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Technology complies with procedures that are comparable to those set out in s. 1013.351 concerning the coordination of planning between the school and local governing bodies.

- (6) If the Board of Trustees for the Governor's School for Science and Technology determines that a specific requirement of the School Code prohibits the implementation of an innovative instructional practice by the Governor's School for Science and Technology, the school shall provide a report to the Legislature explaining the desired practice and the statute that prohibits its implementation.
- (7) Funding for instruction, room, board, and transportation of students and for the operation of the Governor's School for Science and Technology shall be as authorized in the General Appropriations Act. Other funding for the Governor's School for Science and Technology may be provided from:
- (a) Appropriations from the Legislature or a state agency; and
 - (b) Contributions or endowments from private entities.
- (8) Students who are approved for attendance at the Governor's School for Science and Technology shall continue to be recorded as enrolled and in attendance for the purpose of funding in their home school district for the period of time the student is away attending the Governor's School for Science and Technology.
- Section 2. Paragraph (d) of subsection (2) of section 110.205, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
 - 110.205 Career service; exemptions.--
 - (2) EXEMPT POSITIONS. -- The exempt positions that are not

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covered by this part include the following:

- and the academic personnel and academic administrative personnel of the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind and the Governor's School for Science and Technology. In accordance with ss. the provisions of s. 1002.36 and 1002.371, the salaries for academic personnel and academic administrative personnel of the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind and the Governor's School for Science and Technology shall be set by the board of trustees for each respective the school, subject only to the approval of the State Board of Education.
- Section 3. Paragraph (a) of subsection (2) of section 216.251, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
 - 216.251 Salary appropriations; limitations.--
- (2) (a) The salary for each position not specifically indicated in the appropriations acts shall be as provided in one of the following subparagraphs:
- 1. Within the classification and pay plans provided for in chapter 110.
- 2. Within the classification and pay plans established by the Board of Trustees for the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind of the Department of Education and approved by the State Board of Education for academic and academic administrative personnel.
- 3. Within the classification and pay plan approved and administered by the Board of Governors or the designee of the board for those positions in the State University System.
- 4. Within the classification and pay plan approved by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of

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Representatives, as the case may be, for employees of the Legislature.

- 5. Within the approved classification and pay plan for the judicial branch.
- 6. Within the classification and pay plans established by the Board of Trustees for the Governor's School for Science and Technology of the Department of Education and approved by the State Board of Education for academic and academic administrative personnel.
- Section 4. Subsection (5) is added to section 1000.04, Florida Statutes, to read:
- 1000.04 Components for the delivery of public education within the Florida K-20 education system.—Florida's K-20 education system provides for the delivery of public education through publicly supported and controlled K-12 schools, community colleges, state universities and other postsecondary educational institutions, other educational institutions, and other educational services as provided or authorized by the Constitution and laws of the state.
- (5) THE GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL FOR SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY.--The Governor's School for Science and Technology is a component of the delivery of public education within Florida's K-20 education system.
- Section 5. Paragraph (a) of subsection (6) of section 1002.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:
- 1002.20 K-12 student and parent rights.--Parents of public school students must receive accurate and timely information regarding their child's academic progress and must be informed of ways they can help their child to succeed in school. K-12

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students and their parents are afforded numerous statutory rights including, but not limited to, the following:

- (6) EDUCATIONAL CHOICE. --
- Public school choices. -- Parents of public school students may seek whatever public school choice options that are applicable to their students and are available to students in their school districts. These options may include controlled open enrollment, lab schools, charter schools, charter technical career centers, magnet schools, alternative schools, special programs, advanced placement, dual enrollment, International Baccalaureate, International General Certificate of Secondary Education (pre-AICE), Advanced International Certificate of Education, early admissions, credit by examination or demonstration of competency, the New World School of the Arts, the Florida School for the Deaf and the Blind, the Governor's School for Science and Technology, and the Florida Virtual School. These options may also include the public school choice options of the Opportunity Scholarship Program and the McKay Scholarships for Students with Disabilities Program.

Section 6. Paragraph (i) of subsection (1) of section 1003.02, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1003.02 District school board operation and control of public K-12 education within the school district.—As provided in part II of chapter 1001, district school boards are constitutionally and statutorily charged with the operation and control of public K-12 education within their school district. The district school boards must establish, organize, and operate their public K-12 schools and educational programs, employees, and facilities. Their responsibilities include staff development,

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public K-12 school student education including education for exceptional students and students in juvenile justice programs, special programs, adult education programs, and career education programs. Additionally, district school boards must:

- (1) Provide for the proper accounting for all students of school age, for the attendance and control of students at school, and for proper attention to health, safety, and other matters relating to the welfare of students in the following fields:
- (i) Parental notification of acceleration mechanisms.—At the beginning of each school year, notify parents of students in or entering high school of the opportunity and benefits of advanced placement, International Baccalaureate, Advanced International Certificate of Education, dual enrollment, the Governor's School for Science and Technology, and Florida Virtual School courses.

Section 7. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.
