# A bill to be entitled

2 An act relating to tobacco education and prevention; 3 amending s. 381.84, F.S.; providing an additional purpose in implementing the Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco 4 Education and Use Prevention Program; expanding the 5 counter-marketing and advertising campaign component to 6 7 include utilization of innovative communication 8 strategies, including the use of physicians and dentists; 9 expanding the cessation programs, counseling, and treatment component to include the use of physicians and 10 dentists; substituting the term "tobacco-use cessation" 11 for "smoking cessation"; expanding the community programs 12 and chronic disease prevention component to include 13 statewide programs; deleting county health department 14 funding eligibility; specifying purposes for the use of 15 16 funds distributed under the program; requiring the Department of Health to award contracts and grants for 17 certain purposes; deleting obsolete language; providing an 18 19 effective date. 20 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 21 22 Section 1. Section 381.84, Florida Statutes, is amended to 23 24 read: 25 381.84 Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and Use 26 Prevention Program. --27 (1)DEFINITIONS. -- As used in this section and for purposes 28 of the provisions of s. 27, Art. X of the State Constitution,

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29 the term:

30 (a) "AHEC network" means an area health education center31 network established under s. 381.0402.

32 (b) "CDC" means the United States Centers for Disease33 Control and Prevention.

34 (c) "Council" means the Tobacco Education and Use35 Prevention Advisory Council.

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(d) "Department" means the Department of Health.

(e) "Tobacco" means, without limitation, tobacco itself and tobacco products that include tobacco and are intended or expected for human use or consumption, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, and smokeless tobacco.

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(f) "Youth" means minors and young adults.

PURPOSE, FINDINGS, AND INTENT. -- It is the purpose of 43 (2)44 this section to implement s. 27, Art. X of the State 45 Constitution. The Legislature finds that s. 27, Art. X of the State Constitution requires the funding of a statewide tobacco 46 47 education and use prevention program that focuses on tobacco use by youth. The Legislature further finds that the primary goals 48 49 of the program are to reduce the prevalence of tobacco use among 50 youth, adults, and pregnant women; reduce per capita tobacco consumption; implement interventions to detect, prevent, and 51 treat tobacco-related chronic diseases; and reduce exposure to 52 environmental tobacco smoke. Further, it is the intent of the 53 54 Legislature to base increases in funding for individual components of the program on the results of assessments and 55 evaluations. Recognizing that some components will need to grow 56 Page 2 of 13

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57 faster than inflation, it is the intent of the Legislature to 58 fund portions of the program on a nonrecurring basis in the 59 early years so that those components that are most effective can 60 be supported as the program matures.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS AND REQUIREMENTS. -- The department 61 (3) shall conduct a comprehensive, statewide tobacco education and 62 63 use prevention program consistent with the recommendations for 64 effective program components contained in the 1999 Best 65 Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Programs of the CDC, as amended by the CDC. The program shall include the following 66 67 components, each of which shall focus on educating people, particularly youth and their parents, about the health hazards 68 of tobacco and discouraging the use of tobacco: 69

(a) Counter-marketing and advertising; <u>Internet</u> cyberspace resource center.--The counter-marketing and advertising campaign shall include, at a minimum, Internet, print, radio, and television advertising and shall be funded with a minimum of one-third of the total annual appropriation required by s. 27, Art. X of the State Constitution.

The campaign shall include an Internet A cyberspace 76 1. 77 resource center for copyrighted materials and information concerning tobacco education and use prevention, including 78 79 cessation, shall be maintained by the program. Such resource center must be accessible to the public, including parents, 80 teachers, and students, at each level of public and private 81 schools, universities, and colleges in the state and shall 82 provide links to other relevant resources. The Internet address 83 for the resource center must be incorporated in all advertising. 84 Page 3 of 13

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The information maintained in the resource center shall be used by the other components of the program.

The campaign shall utilize innovative communication 87 2. 88 strategies, such as targeting specific audiences through 89 personal communication devices and online networking 90 environments. The campaign shall specifically employ innovative 91 channels to disseminate the campaign message, including 92 utilizing physicians licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459 93 and dentists licensed under chapter 466 to target specific 94 audiences and provide brief advice to quit the use of tobacco.

95 (b) Cessation programs, counseling, and treatment.--This
 96 program component shall include <u>three</u> <del>two</del> subcomponents:

97 1. A statewide toll-free cessation service, which may
98 include counseling, referrals to other local resources and
99 support services, and treatment to the extent funds are
100 available for treatment services.; and

2. A local community-based program to disseminate
information about <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> cessation, how <u>tobacco-use</u>
<del>smoking</del> cessation relates to prenatal care and obesity
prevention, and other chronic tobacco-related diseases.

<u>3. A statewide program that utilizes physicians licensed</u>
 <u>under chapter 458 or chapter 459 and dentists licensed under</u>
 <u>chapter 466 to deliver brief advice to quit the use of tobacco.</u>

(c) Surveillance and evaluation.--The program shall conduct ongoing epidemiological surveillance and shall contract for annual independent evaluations of the effectiveness of the various components of the program in meeting the goals as set forth in subsection (2).

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(d) Youth school programs.--School and after-school programs shall use current evidence-based curricula and programs that involve youth to educate youth about the health hazards of tobacco, help youth develop skills to refuse tobacco, and demonstrate to youth how to stop using tobacco.

Statewide and community programs and chronic disease 118 (e) 119 prevention. -- The department shall promote and support statewide and local community-based partnerships that encourage and 120 121 support individuals, especially youth, to make behavior choices consistent with tobacco-free norms. In addition, the department 122 123 shall promote and support statewide and community emphasize programs involving youth, including programs for the prevention, 124 125 detection, and treatment early intervention of tobacco-related 126 smoking related chronic diseases, such as cancer, chronic lung 127 and respiratory diseases, and heart disease.

(f) Training.--The program shall include the training of
health care practitioners, <u>tobacco-use cessation</u> <del>smoking</del>
<del>cessation</del> counselors, and teachers by health professional
students and other tobacco-use prevention specialists who are
trained in preventing tobacco use and health education. <u>Tobacco-</u>
<u>use cessation</u> <del>Smoking-cessation</del> counselors shall be trained by
specialists who are certified in tobacco-use cessation.

(g) Administration and management.--The department shall
administer the program within the expenditure limit established
in subsection (8). As part of this component, the department
shall coordinate the activities of the state and local tobacco
control community. In addition, statewide programs, and county
health departments. Each county health department is eligible
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141 to receive a portion of the annual appropriation, on a per 142 capita basis, for coordinating tobacco education and use 143 prevention programs within that county. Appropriated funds may 144 be used to improve the infrastructure of the county health 145 department to implement the comprehensive, statewide tobacco 146 education and use prevention program. each county health 147 department shall prominently display in all treatment rooms and waiting rooms, counter-marketing and advertisement materials in 148 149 the form of wall posters, brochures, television advertising if televisions are used in the lobby or waiting room, and 150 151 screensavers and Internet advertising if computer kiosks are available for use or viewing by people at the county health 152 department. 153

154 (h) Enforcement and awareness of related laws.--In 155 coordination with the Department of Business and Professional 156 Regulation, the program shall monitor the enforcement of laws, 157 rules, and policies prohibiting the sale or other provision of 158 tobacco to minors, as well as the continued enforcement of the 159 Clean Indoor Air Act prescribed in chapter 386. The advertisements produced in accordance with paragraph (a) may 160 161 also include information designed to make the public aware of 162 these related laws and rules. The departments may enter into interagency agreements to carry out this program component. 163

(i) AHEC <u>tobacco-use cessation</u> <del>smoking-cessation</del>
initiative.--For the <del>2007 2008 and</del> 2008-2009 fiscal <u>year</u> <del>years</del>
only, the AHEC network shall expand the AHEC <u>tobacco-use</u>
<u>cessation</u> <del>smoking-cessation</del> initiative to each county within the

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168 state and perform other activities as determined by the 169 department.

170 (4) ADVISORY COUNCIL; MEMBERS, APPOINTMENTS, AND
171 MEETINGS.--The Tobacco Education and Use Prevention Advisory
172 Council is created within the department.

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(a) The council shall consist of 23 members, including:

174 1. The State Surgeon General, who shall serve as the175 chairperson.

176 2. One county health department director, appointed by the177 State Surgeon General.

178 3. Two members appointed by the Commissioner of Education,179 of whom one must be a school district superintendent.

180 4. The chief executive officer of the Florida Division of181 the American Cancer Society, or his or her designee.

182 5. The chief executive officer of the Greater Southeast
183 Affiliate of the American Heart Association, or his or her
184 designee.

185 6. The chief executive officer of the American Lung186 Association of Florida, or his or her designee.

187 7. The dean of the University of Miami School of Medicine,188 or his or her designee.

189 8. The dean of the University of Florida College of190 Medicine, or his or her designee.

191 9. The dean of the University of South Florida College of192 Medicine, or his or her designee.

10. The dean of the Florida State University College ofMedicine, or his or her designee.

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195 11. The dean of Nova Southeastern College of Osteopathic196 Medicine, or his or her designee.

197 12. The dean of the Lake Erie College of Osteopathic198 Medicine in Bradenton, Florida, or his or her designee.

199 13. The chief executive officer of the Campaign for200 Tobacco Free Kids, or his or her designee.

14. The chief executive officer of the Legacy Foundation,or his or her designee.

15. Four members appointed by the Governor, of whom two must have expertise in the field of tobacco-use prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> cessation and one individual who shall be between the ages of 16 and 21 at the time of his or her appointment.

16. Two members appointed by the President of the Senate,
of whom one must have expertise in the field of tobacco-use
prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> smoking cessation.

211 17. Two members appointed by the Speaker of the House of 212 Representatives, of whom one must have expertise in the field of 213 tobacco-use prevention and education or <u>tobacco-use</u> <del>smoking</del> 214 cessation.

(b) The appointments shall be for 3-year terms and shall
reflect the diversity of the state's population. A vacancy shall
be filled by appointment by the original appointing authority
for the unexpired portion of the term.

(c) An appointed member may not serve more than twoconsecutive terms.

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(d) The council shall meet at least quarterly and upon the
call of the chairperson. Meetings may be held via teleconference
or other electronic means.

(e) Members of the council shall serve without compensation, but are entitled to reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061. Members who are state officers or employees or who are appointed by state officers or employees shall be reimbursed for per diem and travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061 from the state agency through which they serve.

(f) The department shall provide council members with
information and other assistance as is reasonably necessary to
assist the council in carrying out its responsibilities.

(5) COUNCIL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES.--The council
shall advise the State Surgeon General as to the direction and
scope of the Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco Education and Use
Prevention Program. The responsibilities of the council include,
but are not limited to:

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(a) Providing advice on program priorities and emphases.

(b) Providing advice on the overall program budget.

(c) Providing advice on copyrighted material, trademark,
and future transactions as they pertain to the tobacco education
and use prevention program.

(d) Reviewing broadcast material prepared for the
Internet, portable media players, radio, and television as it
relates to the advertising component of the tobacco education
and use prevention program.

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(e) Participating in periodic program evaluation.

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(f) Assisting in the development of guidelines to ensure
fairness, neutrality, and adherence to the principles of merit
and quality in the conduct of the program.

(g) Assisting in the development of administrative procedures relating to solicitation, review, and award of contracts and grants in order to ensure an impartial, highquality peer review system.

(h) Assisting in the development and supervision of peerreview panels.

(i) Reviewing reports of peer review panels and makingrecommendations for contracts and grants.

(j) Reviewing the activities and evaluating the
performance of the AHEC network to avoid duplicative efforts
using state funds.

(k) Recommending meaningful outcome measures through a regular review of tobacco-use prevention and education strategies and programs of other states and the Federal Government.

267 (1) Recommending policies to encourage a coordinated
268 response to tobacco use in this state, focusing specifically on
269 creating partnerships within and between the public and private
270 sectors.

(6) CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS.--Contracts or grants for the
program components or subcomponents described in paragraphs
(3) (a) - (f) shall be awarded by the State Surgeon General, after
consultation with the council, on the basis of merit, as
determined by an open, competitive, peer-reviewed process that
ensures objectivity, consistency, and high quality. The

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277 department shall award such grants or contracts no later than 278 October 1 for each fiscal year. A recipient of a contract or 279 grant for the program component described in paragraph (3)(c) is 280 not eligible for a contract or grant award for any other program 281 component described in subsection (3) in the same state fiscal 282 year. A school or college of medicine that is represented on the 283 council is not eligible to receive a contract or grant under 284 this section. For the 2007-2008 and 2008-2009 fiscal years only, 285 the department shall award a contract or grant in the amount of 286 \$10 million to the AHEC network for the purpose of developing 287 the components described in paragraph (3) (i). The AHEC network may apply for a competitive contract or grant after the 2008-288 289 2009 fiscal year.

290 In order to ensure that all proposals for funding are (a) 291 appropriate and are evaluated fairly on the basis of merit, the 292 State Surgeon General, in consultation with the council, shall appoint a peer review panel of independent, qualified experts in 293 294 the field of tobacco control to review the content of each 295 proposal and establish its priority score. The priority scores 296 shall be forwarded to the council and must be considered in 297 determining which proposals will be recommended for funding.

298 The council and the peer review panel shall establish (b) 299 and follow rigorous guidelines for ethical conduct and adhere to a strict policy with regard to conflicts of interest. A member 300 of the council or panel may not participate in any discussion or 301 decision with respect to a research proposal by any firm, 302 entity, or agency with which the member is associated as a 303 member of the governing body or as an employee or with which the 304 Page 11 of 13

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305 member has entered into a contractual arrangement. Meetings of 306 the council and the peer review panels are subject to chapter 307 119, s. 286.011, and s. 24, Art. I of the State Constitution. 308 In each contract or grant agreement, the department (C) 309 shall limit the use of food and promotional items to no more 310 than 2.5 percent of the total amount of the contract or grant 311 and limit overhead or indirect costs to no more than 7.5 percent 312 of the total amount of the contract or grant. The department, in 313 consultation with the Department of Financial Services, shall 314 publish guidelines for appropriate food and promotional items. 315 (d) In each advertising contract, the department shall limit the total of production fees, buyer commissions, and 316 related costs to no more than 10 percent of the total contract 317 318 amount. 319 (e) Notwithstanding the competitive process for contracts 320 prescribed in this subsection: 1. For the 2008-2009 fiscal year only, the department 321 322 shall award a contract or grant in the amount of \$6 million to 323 the AHEC network for the purpose of developing the component 324 described in paragraph (3)(i). 325 For the 2008-2009 fiscal year only, the department 2. 326 shall equally award contracts or grants totaling \$4 million to 327 each medical school in this state recognized and approved by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Office of 328 Education for the purpose of implementing the component 329 330 described in paragraph (3)(i). Beginning with the 2008-2009 fiscal year and continuing 331 3. thereafter, the department shall award contracts or grants in 332

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the amount of \$10 million to the H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center 333 334 and Research Institute and \$1 million to the University of 335 Florida Shands Cancer Center for the purpose of implementing 336 chronic disease prevention, detection, and treatment programs in 337 accordance with paragraph (3)(e), each county health department is eligible for core funding, on a per capita basis, to 338 339 implement tobacco education and use prevention activities within that county. 340

341 (7)ANNUAL REPORT REQUIRED. -- By January 31 of each year, 342 the department shall provide to the Governor, the President of 343 the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives a report that evaluates the program's effectiveness in reducing 344 and preventing tobacco use and that recommends improvements to 345 346 enhance the program's effectiveness. The report must contain, at 347 a minimum, an annual survey of youth attitudes and behavior 348 toward tobacco, as well as a description of the progress in 349 reducing the prevalence of tobacco use among youth, adults, and 350 preqnant women; reducing per capita tobacco consumption; and 351 reducing exposure to environmental tobacco smoke.

(8) LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.--From the total
funds appropriated for the Comprehensive Statewide Tobacco
Education and Use Prevention Program in the General
Appropriations Act, an amount of up to 5 percent may be used by
the department for administrative expenses.

357 (9) RULEMAKING AUTHORIZED.--By January 1, 2008, The
358 department shall adopt rules pursuant to ss. 120.536(1) and
359 120.54 to administer this section.

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Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.

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
