15	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

17	Section 1. Section 796.045, Florida Statutes, is amended to

19	796.045 Sex trafficking; penalties
20	(1) Any person who knowingly recruits, entices, harbors,
21	transports, provides, or obtains by any means a person, knowing
22	that force, fraud, or coercion will be used to cause that person
23	to engage in prostitution, commits the offense of sex
24	trafficking, a felony of the second degree, punishable as
25	provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
26	(2) A person commits a felony of the first degree,
27	punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084,
28	if the offense of sex trafficking is committed against a person
29	who is under the age of 14 or if such offense results in death.

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30	(3) Notwithstanding any other law, a court may not suspend,
31	defer, or withhold adjudication of guilt or imposition of
32	sentence for a violation of this section.
33	(4) A person pleading guilty to or convicted of a violation
34	of this section and sentenced to a term of incarceration under
35	this section must serve not less than two-thirds of the sentenced
36	term of incarceration.
37	Section 2. (1) The Legislature finds that sex trafficking
38	is a form of modern-day slavery. Victims of sex trafficking are
39	young children, teenagers, and adults. Thousands of victims are
40	trafficked annually across international borders worldwide. Many
41	of these victims are trafficked into this state. The Legislature
42	finds that victims of sex trafficking are subjected to force,
43	fraud, or coercion for the purpose of sexual exploitation.
44	(2) The Legislature finds that sex traffickers use various
45	techniques to instill fear in victims and to keep them enslaved.
46	Some traffickers keep their victims under lock and key. However,
47	the most frequently used practices are less obvious techniques
48	that include isolating victims from the public and family
49	members; confiscating passports, visas, or other identification
50	documents; using or threatening to use violence toward victims or
51	their families; telling victims that they will be imprisoned or
52	deported for immigration violations if they contact authorities;
53	and controlling the victims' funds by holding the money
