8	for high school graduation with a career or technical
9	major area of interest; amending s. 1009.536, F.S.;
10	requiring a student to earn the credential for receipt of
11	a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award; amending s.
12	445.004, F.S.; requiring Workforce Florida, Inc., and the
13	Department of Education to ensure consistent use of the
14	credential; providing an effective date.
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16	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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18	Section 1. Paragraph (d) of subsection (3) of section
19	1004.99, Florida Statutes, is amended, subsection (4) is
20	renumbered as subsection (5), and a new subsection (4) is added
21	to that section, to read:
22	1004.99 Florida Ready to Work Certification Program
23	(3) The Florida Ready to Work Certification Program shall
24	be composed of:
25	(d) A <u>Florida Ready to Work Credential</u> certificate and
26	portfolio awarded to students upon successful completion of the
27	instruction. Each portfolio must delineate the skills

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demonstrated by the student as evidence of the student's 28 preparation for employment. 29 A Florida Ready to Work Credential shall be awarded to 30 (4)a student who successfully passes assessments in Reading for 31 Information, Applied Mathematics, and Locating Information or 32 33 any other assessments of comparable rigor. Each assessment shall 34 be scored on a scale of 3 to 7. The level of the credential each student receives is based on the following: 35 36 (a) A bronze-level credential requires a minimum score of 37 3 or above on each of the assessments. A silver-level credential requires a minimum score of 38 (b) 4 or above on each of the assessments. 39 (c) A gold-level credential requires a minimum score of 5 40 or above on each of the assessments. 41 42 Section 2. Paragraph (b) of subsection (2) of section 43 1003.428, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 1003.428 General requirements for high school graduation; 44 45 revised. --46 (2)The 24 credits may be earned through applied, integrated, and combined courses approved by the Department of 47 Education and shall be distributed as follows: 48 49 Eight credits in majors, minors, or electives: (b) Four credits in a major area of interest, such as 50 1. sequential courses in a career and technical program, fine and 51 performing arts, or academic content area, selected by the 52 student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. 53 Students may revise major areas of interest each year as part of 54 55 annual course registration processes and should update their Page 2 of 6

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education plan to reflect such revisions. Annually by October 1, 56 57 the district school board shall approve major areas of interest 58 and submit the list of majors to the Commissioner of Education 59 for approval. Each major area of interest shall be deemed 60 approved unless specifically rejected by the commissioner within 60 days. Upon approval, each district's major areas of interest 61 62 shall be available for use by all school districts and shall be posted on the department's website. Beginning with students 63 64 entering grade 9 in the 2008-2009 school year, a student must 65 earn a Florida Ready to Work Credential as created under s. 1004.99 in order to graduate with a career or technical major 66 area of interest. 67

68 2. Four credits in elective courses selected by the 69 student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. 70 These credits may be combined to allow for a second major area 71 of interest pursuant to subparagraph 1., a minor area of 72 interest, elective courses, or intensive reading or mathematics 73 intervention courses as described in this subparagraph.

A. Minor areas of interest are composed of three credits
selected by the student as part of the education plan required
by s. 1003.4156 and approved by the district school board.

b. Elective courses are selected by the student in order
to pursue a complete education program as described in s.
1001.41(3) and to meet eligibility requirements for
scholarships.

c. For each year in which a student scores at Level 1 on
 FCAT Reading, the student must be enrolled in and complete an
 intensive reading course the following year. Placement of Level
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2 readers in either an intensive reading course or a content 84 85 area course in which reading strategies are delivered shall be 86 determined by diagnosis of reading needs. The department shall 87 provide guidance on appropriate strategies for diagnosing and 88 meeting the varying instructional needs of students reading below grade level. Reading courses shall be designed and offered 89 90 pursuant to the comprehensive reading plan required by s. 1011.62(8). 91

92 d. For each year in which a student scores at Level 1 or
93 Level 2 on FCAT Mathematics, the student must receive
94 remediation the following year. These courses may be taught
95 through applied, integrated, or combined courses and are subject
96 to approval by the department for inclusion in the Course Code
97 Directory.

98 Section 3. Subsection (1) of section 1009.536, Florida99 Statutes, is amended to read:

100 1009.536 Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award.--The 101 Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars award is created within 102 the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program to recognize and 103 reward academic achievement and career preparation by high 104 school students who wish to continue their education.

(1) A student is eligible for a Florida Gold Seal
Vocational Scholars award if the student meets the general
eligibility requirements for the Florida Bright Futures
Scholarship Program and the student:

(a) Completes the secondary school portion of a sequential
 program of studies that requires at least three secondary school
 career credits taken over at least 2 academic years, and is

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112 continued in a planned, related postsecondary education program. 113 If the student's school does not offer such a two-plus-two or 114 tech-prep program, the student must complete a job-preparatory 115 career education program selected by Workforce Florida, Inc., for its ability to provide high-wage employment in an occupation 116 with high potential for employment opportunities. On-the-job 117 118 training may not be substituted for any of the three required career credits. 119

(b) Demonstrates readiness for postsecondary education by
earning a passing score on the Florida College Entry Level
Placement Test or its equivalent as identified by the Department
of Education.

(c) Earns a minimum cumulative weighted grade point average of 3.0, as calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, on all subjects required for a standard high school diploma, excluding elective courses.

(d) Earns a minimum unweighted grade point average of 3.5
on a 4.0 scale for secondary career courses comprising the
career program.

(e) Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 2008 2009 school year, earns a gold-level Florida Ready to Work
 Credential as created under s. 1004.99.

Section 4. Paragraph (j) is added to subsection (5) ofsection 445.004, Florida Statutes, to read:

136 445.004 Workforce Florida, Inc.; creation; purpose;137 membership; duties and powers.--

(5) Workforce Florida, Inc., shall have all the powers and
 authority, not explicitly prohibited by statute, necessary or
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140 convenient to carry out and effectuate the purposes as determined by statute, Pub. L. No. 105-220, and the Governor, as 141 142 well as its functions, duties, and responsibilities, including, 143 but not limited to, the following: 144 (j) In partnership with the Department of Education, 145 ensuring consistent use of the Florida Ready to Work Credential 146 as created under s. 1004.99. 147

Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.

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
