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14 WHEREAS, the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and 15 Management Act emphasized preventing overfishing and rebuilding 16 overfished stocks, and

WHEREAS, recent revisions to the act were prompted in part by criticism of progress toward ending overfishing and rebuilding fish stocks, and

20 WHEREAS, such revisions impose significant restrictions on 21 commercial and recreational fishing in federal waters and 22 prohibitively short deadlines to end overfishing, and

23 WHEREAS, every federally managed fishery that is classified 24 as undergoing overfishing is required to have annual catch 25 limits and accountability measures in place by 2010, and

26 WHEREAS, all other federally managed species are required 27 to have annual catch limits and accountability measures in place 28 by 2011, and

29 WHEREAS, such requirements include accountability measures 30 which stipulate that if catch limits are exceeded for such 31 federally managed species, federal actions must be stipulated to 32 compensate for the harvest overage, and

33 WHEREAS, the consequence of such accountability measures is 34 that certain types of fishing activity, such as recreational 35 fishing, could be faced with ever-increasing limits imposed over 36 a minimal timeframe, and

37 WHEREAS, in the federal waters of the South Atlantic, there 38 are 10 species of economically important reef fish that are 39 subject to the new deadline, and

40 WHEREAS, a number of similar actions to restrict harvest of 41 reef fish in the Gulf of Mexico have been instituted, and

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42 WHEREAS, federal managers are considering a complete 43 closure of all fishing for the Atlantic red snapper fishery, and 44 WHEREAS, severely restricting or eliminating harvest for 10 45 of the state's most valuable reef fish species simultaneously will have the unfortunate impact of putting people out of 46 47 business, and 48 WHEREAS, the act requires federal managers to use the best 49 scientific information available to end overfishing and provide 50 future sustainable harvest, and 51 WHEREAS, even though fishery scientists are using the best 52 scientific information available, there continues to be 53 inadequate funding to conduct the level of fisheries monitoring 54 and research work necessary to meet the standards of the act, 55 and WHEREAS, to meet such standards, it is imperative to 56 57 provide federal fishery managers with the financial means 58 necessary to gather and analyze more complete and continuous 59 information on the status of fish stocks, and 60 WHEREAS, consistent with these conservation requirements, 61 recent changes to the act direct that economic impacts to 62 fishing communities be minimized and that mechanisms be provided 63 to support the economic health of fishing communities, and WHEREAS, every effort should be made to provide economic 64 65 assistance to key fishing industries and businesses that cannot 66 survive the restrictions being implemented by recent changes to

the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, 68 NOW, THEREFORE,

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
