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Section 11. Subsection (3) of section 1009.53, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

1009.53 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.-

8 (3) The Department of Education shall administer the Bright 9 Futures Scholarship Program according to rules and procedures 10 established by the State Board of Education. A single <u>state</u> 11 application must be sufficient for a student to apply for any of 12 the three types of awards. <u>For a student applying for an initial</u> 13 <u>award in the 2010-2011 academic year and thereafter, in order to</u>

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14	become eligible each year for a Bright Futures Scholarship
15	award, the student must submit the Free Application for Federal
16	Student Aid, along with a valid expected family contribution.
17	The department must advertise the availability of the
18	scholarship program and must notify students, teachers, parents,
19	guidance counselors, and principals or other relevant school
20	administrators of the criteria and application procedures. The
21	department must begin this process of notification no later than
22	January 1 of each year.
23	Section 12. Subsection (2) of section 1009.531, Florida
24	Statutes, is amended, and subsection (6) is added to that
25	section, to read:
26	1009.531 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program;
27	student eligibility requirements for initial awards
28	(2) For students graduating from high school prior to the
29	2010-2011 academic year, a student is eligible to accept an
30	initial award for 3 years following high school graduation and
31	to accept a renewal award for 7 years following high school
32	graduation. For a student who enlists in the United States Armed
33	Forces immediately after completion of high school, the 3-year
34	eligibility period for his or her initial award shall begin upon
35	the date of separation from active duty. For a student who is
36	receiving a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship and discontinues
37	his or her education to enlist in the United States Armed
38	Forces, the remainder of his or her 7-year renewal period shall
39	commence upon the date of separation from active duty. For
40	students graduating from high school in the 2010-2011 academic
41	year and thereafter, a student is eligible to accept an initial
42	award for 3 years after high school graduation and to accept a

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43 renewal award for 4 years after high school graduation. A student who applies for an award by high school graduation and 44 45 who meets all other eligibility requirements, but who does not 46 accept his or her award, may reapply during subsequent application periods up to 3 years after high school graduation. 47 For a student who enlists in the United States Armed Forces 48 49 immediately after completion of high school, the 3-year 50 eligibility period for his or her initial award shall begin upon 51 the date of separation from active duty. For a student who is 52 receiving a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship and discontinues 53 his or her education to enlist in the United States Armed 54 Forces, the remainder of his or her 4-year 7-year renewal period shall commence upon the date of separation from active duty. 55 56 Effective for students graduating from high school in the 2010-57 2011 academic year and thereafter, if a course of study is not 58 completed after 4 academic years, an exception of 1 year to the 59 renewal timeframe may be granted due to a verifiable illness or 60 other documented emergency pursuant to s. 1009.40(1)(b)4. 61 (6) (a) The State Board of Education shall publicize from 62 the 2009 SAT Percentile Ranks the examination score required for 63 a student to be eligible for a Florida Academic Scholars award 64 pursuant to s. 1009.534(1)(a) or (b), as follows: 65 1. For high school students graduating in the 2010-2011 and 66 2011-2012 academic years, the student must earn a score of 1270 67 or a concordant ACT score of 28. 68 2. For high school students graduating in the 2012-2013 69 academic year, the student must earn the 88th SAT percentile 70 rank score of 1280 or a concordant ACT score of 28. 71 3. For high school students graduating in the 2013-2014

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72 academic year and thereafter, the student must earn the 89th SAT 73 percentile rank score of 1290 or a concordant ACT score of 29. 74 (b) The State Board of Education shall publicize from the 75 2009 SAT Percentile Ranks the examination score required for a 76 student to be eligible for a Florida Medallion Scholars award 77 pursuant to s. 1009.535(1)(a) or (b), as follows: 78 1. For high school students graduating in the 2010-2011 79 academic year, the student must earn a score of 970 or a 80 concordant ACT score of 20; or for home educated students whose 81 parents cannot document a college-preparatory curriculum, a 82 score of 1070 or a concordant ACT score of 23. 83 2. For high school students graduating in the 2011-2012 academic year, the student must earn the 44th SAT percentile 84 85 rank score of 980 or a concordant ACT score of 21; or for home 86 educated students whose parents cannot document a college-87 preparatory curriculum, a score of 1070 or a concordant ACT score of 23. 88 89 3. For high school students graduating in the 2012-2013 90 academic year, the student must earn the 50th SAT percentile rank score of 1020 or a concordant ACT score of 22; or for home 91 92 educated students whose parents cannot document a college-93 preparatory curriculum, a score of 1070 or a concordant ACT 94 score of 23. 95 4. For high school students graduating in the 2013-2014 96 academic year and thereafter, the student must earn the 56th SAT 97 percentile rank score of 1050 or a concordant ACT score of 23; 98 or for home educated students whose parents cannot document a 99 college-preparatory curriculum, a score of 1100 or a concordant 100 ACT score of 24.

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101 (c) If the percentile ranks in paragraphs (a) and (b) do 102 not exactly correspond to an SAT score, the next highest 103 percentile rank shall be used.

104 Section 13. Section 1009.532, Florida Statutes, is amended 105 to read:

106 1009.532 Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program;
107 student eligibility requirements for renewal awards.-

108 (1) To be eligible to renew a scholarship from any of the
109 three types of scholarships under the Florida Bright Futures
110 Scholarship Program, a student must:

111 (a) Effective for students funded in the 2009-2010 academic 112 year and thereafter, earn at least 24 semester credit hours or the equivalent in the last academic year in which the student 113 114 earned a scholarship if the student was enrolled full time, or a prorated number of credit hours as determined by the Department 115 of Education if the student was enrolled less than full time for 116 117 any part of the academic year. For students funded prior to the 2010-2011 academic year, if a student fails to earn the minimum 118 119 number of hours required to renew the scholarship, the student 120 shall lose his or her eligibility for renewal for a period 121 equivalent to 1 academic year. Such student is eligible to 122 restore the award the following academic year if the student 123 earns the hours for which he or she was enrolled at the level 124 defined by the department and meets the grade point average for 125 renewal. A student is eligible for such restoration one time. 126 The department shall notify eligible recipients of the 127 provisions of this paragraph. Each institution shall notify 128 award recipients of the provisions of this paragraph during the 129 registration process.



(b) Maintain the cumulative grade point average required bythe scholarship program, except that:

132 1. If a recipient's grades fall beneath the average 133 required to renew a Florida Academic Scholarship, but are 134 sufficient to renew a Florida Medallion Scholarship or a Florida 135 Gold Seal Vocational Scholarship, the Department of Education 136 may grant a renewal from one of those other scholarship 137 programs, if the student meets the renewal eligibility 138 requirements; or

139 2. For students funded prior to the 2010-2011 academic 140 term, if τ at any time during the eligibility period, a student's 141 grades are insufficient to renew the scholarship, the student may restore eligibility by improving the grade point average to 142 143 the required level. A student is eligible for such a restoration 144 one time. The Legislature encourages education institutions to 145 assist students to calculate whether or not it is possible to raise the grade point average during the summer term. If the 146 institution determines that it is possible, the education 147 institution may so inform the department, which may-reserve the 148 student's award if funds are available. The renewal, however, 149 150 must not be granted until the student achieves the required cumulative grade point average. If the summer term is not 151 152 sufficient to raise the grade point average to the required 153 renewal level, the student's next opportunity for renewal is the 154 fall semester of the following academic year.; or

155 3. If a student is receiving a Florida Bright Futures 156 Scholarship, is a servicemember of the Florida National Guard or 157 United States Reserves while attending a postsecondary 158 institution, is called to active duty or state active duty, as

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159 defined in s. 250.01, prior to completing his or her degree, and 160 meets all other requirements for the scholarship, the student 161 shall be eligible to continue the scholarship for 2 years after 162 completing active duty or state active duty.

(c) Reimburse or make satisfactory arrangements to reimburse the institution for the award amount received for courses dropped after the end of the drop and add period or courses from which the student withdraws after the end of the drop and add period unless the student has received an exception pursuant to s. 1009.53(11).

169 (2) Effective for students initially funded in the 2010-170 2011 academic term and thereafter, if a scholarship is not 171 renewed because of lack of completion of sufficient credit hours 172 or insufficient grades, the scholarship shall be renewed only 173 for the following reasons:

(a) The student failed to complete sufficient credit hours,
 or to meet sufficient grades requirements due to verifiable
 illness or other documented emergency and may be granted an
 exception pursuant to s. 1009.40(1)(b)4.; or

(b) If a student is a servicemember of the Florida National Guard or United States Reserves while attending a postsecondary institution, is called to active duty or state active duty, as defined in s. 250.01, prior to completing his or her degree, and meets all other requirements for the scholarship, the student shall be eligible to continue the scholarship for 2 years after completing active duty or state active duty.

185 <u>(3) (2)</u> A student who is <u>initially funded prior to the 2010-</u> 186 <u>2011 academic year and is</u> enrolled in a program that terminates 187 in an associate degree or a baccalaureate degree may receive an

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188 award for a maximum of 110 percent of the number of credit hours 189 required to complete the program. A student who is enrolled in a 190 program that terminates in a career certificate may receive an 191 award for a maximum of 110 percent of the credit hours or clock 192 hours required to complete the program up to 90 credit hours. 193 However, for a student who is initially funded in the 2010-2011 194 academic term and thereafter, the student may receive an award 195 for a maximum of 100 percent of the number of credit hours 196 required to complete an associate degree or a baccalaureate degree program, or the student may receive an award for a 197 198 maximum of 100 percent of the credit hours or clock hours required to complete up to 90 credit hours of a program that 199 200 terminates in a career certificate. A student who transfers from 201 one of these program levels to another becomes eligible for the 202 higher of the two credit hour limits.

203 Section 14. Subsections (1) and (5) of section 1009.534, 204 Florida Statutes, are amended to read:

1009.534 Florida Academic Scholars award.-

(1) A student is eligible for a Florida Academic Scholars award if the student meets the general eligibility requirements for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program and the student:

(a) Has achieved a 3.5 weighted grade point average as
calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or its equivalent, in high
school courses that are designated by the State Board of
Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has
attained at least the score <u>pursuant to s. 1009.531(6)(a)</u>
identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the
combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic

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217 Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered 218 Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, 219 or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or

220 (b) Has attended a home education program according to s. 221 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the 222 International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the 223 International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the 224 Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but 225 failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of 226 Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score pursuant 227 to s. 1009.531(6)(a) identified by rules of the State Board of 228 Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the 229 Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the 230 recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance 231 Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment 232 Program; or

(c) Has been awarded an International Baccalaureate Diploma
from the International Baccalaureate Office or an Advanced
International Certificate of Education Diploma from the
University of Cambridge International Examinations Office; or

(d) Has been recognized by the merit or achievement
programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a
scholar or finalist; or

(e) Has been recognized by the National Hispanic
Recognition Program as a scholar recipient. A student must
complete a program of community service work, as approved by the
district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic
school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service
work and require the student to identify a social problem that

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interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.

(5) Notwithstanding subsections (2) and (4), a Florida
Academic Scholar is eligible for an award equal to the amount
specified in the General Appropriations Act for the 2009-2010
academic year. This subsection expires July 1, 2010.

254 Section 15. Section 1009.5341, Florida Statutes, is created 255 to read:

256 1009.5341 Florida Bright Futures Scholarships for graduate 257 study.-Bright Futures Scholarship recipients who graduate with a 258 baccalaureate degree in 7 semesters or equivalent hours or fewer 259 and wish to pursue graduate study may apply the unused portion 260 of their academic or medallion scholarship award toward 1 261 semester of graduate study, not to exceed 15 semester hours paid 262 at the undergraduate rate. A baccalaureate degree may include, but is not limited to, college credits earned through dual 263 264 enrollment, SAT, and ACT examinations.

calculated pursuant to s. 1009.531, or the equivalent, in high
school courses that are designated by the State Board of

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Education as college-preparatory academic courses; and has attained at least the score <u>pursuant to s. 1009.531(6)(b)</u> identified by rules of the State Board of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment Program; or

282 (b) Has attended a home education program according to s. 1002.41 during grades 11 and 12 or has completed the 283 284 International Baccalaureate curriculum but failed to earn the 285 International Baccalaureate Diploma or has completed the 286 Advanced International Certificate of Education curriculum but 287 failed to earn the Advanced International Certificate of 288 Education Diploma, and has attained at least the score pursuant 289 to s. 1009.531(6)(b) identified by rules of the State Board of 290 Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the 291 Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the 292 recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance 293 Examination, or an equivalent score on the ACT Assessment 294 Program; or
