14	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

16	Section 1. Section 465.189, Florida Statutes, is amended
17	to read:
18	465.189 Administration of vaccines and epinephrine
19	autoinjection influenza virus immunizations
20	(1) In accordance with guidelines of the Centers for
21	Disease Control and Prevention for each recommended immunization
22	or vaccine, a pharmacist may administer the following vaccines
23	within the framework of an established protocol under a
24	supervising physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459:
25	(a) Influenza vaccine.
26	(b) Pneumococcal vaccine.
27	(2) In accordance with guidelines of the Centers for
28	Disease Control and Prevention, a pharmacist may administer the
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29 <u>shingles vaccine within the framework of an established protocol</u> 30 <u>and pursuant to a written or electronic prescription issued to</u> 31 <u>the patient by a physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter</u> 32 <u>459.</u>

33 <u>(3) In order to address any unforeseen allergic reaction,</u> 34 <u>a pharmacist may administer epinephrine using an autoinjector</u> 35 <u>delivery system within the framework of an established protocol</u> 36 <u>under a supervising physician licensed under chapter 458 or</u> 37 chapter 459.

38 (1) Pharmacists may administer influenza virus 39 immunizations to adults within the framework of an established 40 protocol under a supervisory practitioner who is a physician 41 licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459. Each protocol shall 42 contain specific procedures for addressing any unforeseen 43 allergic reaction to influenza virus immunizations.

44 <u>(4) (2)</u> A pharmacist may not enter into a protocol unless 45 he or she maintains at least \$200,000 of professional liability 46 insurance and has completed training in <u>administering vaccines</u> 47 <u>authorized under</u> influenza virus immunizations as provided in 48 this section.

49 <u>(5)-(3)</u> A pharmacist administering <u>vaccines under this</u> 50 <u>section</u> influenza virus immunizations shall maintain and make 51 available patient records using the same standards for 52 confidentiality and maintenance of such records as those that 53 are imposed on health care practitioners under s. 456.057. These 54 records shall be maintained for a minimum of 5 years.

55 <u>(6)</u> (4) The decision by a <u>supervising physician licensed</u> 56 <u>under chapter 458 or chapter 459</u> <del>supervisory practitioner</del> to Page 2 of 6

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57 enter into a protocol under this section is a professional 58 decision on the part of the practitioner, and a person may not interfere with a physician's supervisory practitioner's decision 59 as to entering into such a protocol. A pharmacist may not enter 60 into a protocol that is to be performed while acting as an 61 employee without the written approval of the owner of the 62 63 pharmacy. Pharmacists shall forward vaccination immunization 64 records to the department for inclusion in the state registry of immunization information. 65

66 (7) (7) (5) Any pharmacist seeking to administer vaccines influenza virus immunizations to adults under this section must 67 be certified to administer such vaccines influenza virus 68 69 immunizations pursuant to a certification program approved by 70 the Board of Pharmacy in consultation with the Board of Medicine 71 and the Board of Osteopathic Medicine. The certification program 72 shall, at a minimum, require that the pharmacist attend at least 73 20 hours of continuing education classes approved by the board. 74 The program shall have a curriculum of instruction concerning 75 the safe and effective administration of such vaccines influenza 76 virus immunizations, including, but not limited to, potential 77 allergic reactions to such vaccines influenza virus 78 immunizations.

79 <u>(8)(6)</u> The written protocol between the pharmacist and 80 supervising physician <u>under this section</u> must include particular 81 terms and conditions imposed by the supervising physician upon 82 the pharmacist relating to the administration of <u>vaccines</u> 83 <u>influenza virus immunizations</u> by the pharmacist <u>pursuant to this</u> 84 <u>section</u>. The written protocol shall include, at a minimum,

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85 specific categories and conditions among patients for whom the 86 supervising physician authorizes the pharmacist to administer 87 such vaccines influenza virus immunizations. The terms, scope, 88 and conditions set forth in the written protocol between the 89 pharmacist and the supervising physician must be appropriate to 90 the pharmacist's training and certification for administering 91 such vaccines immunization. Pharmacists who have been delegated 92 the authority to administer vaccines under this section 93 influenza virus immunizations by the supervising physician under 94 the protocol shall provide evidence of current certification by 95 the Board of Pharmacy to the supervising physician. A supervising physician physicians shall review the administration 96 97 of such vaccines influenza virus immunizations by the pharmacist 98 pharmacists under such physician's supervision pursuant to the 99 written protocol between them, and this review shall take place 100 as outlined in the written protocol. The process and schedule for the review shall be outlined in the written protocol between 101 102 the pharmacist and the supervising physician.

103 <u>(9)(7)</u> The pharmacist shall submit to the Board of 104 Pharmacy a copy of his or her protocol or written agreement to 105 administer <u>vaccines under this section</u> influenza virus 106 immunizations.

Section 2. Subsection (13) of section 465.003, FloridaStatutes, is amended to read:

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465.003 Definitions.—As used in this chapter, the term:

(13) "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" includes compounding, dispensing, and consulting concerning contents, therapeutic values, and uses of any medicinal drug; consulting

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113 concerning therapeutic values and interactions of patent or 114 proprietary preparations, whether pursuant to prescriptions or 115 in the absence and entirely independent of such prescriptions or 116 orders; and other pharmaceutical services. For purposes of this 117 subsection, "other pharmaceutical services" means the monitoring of the patient's drug therapy and assisting the patient in the 118 119 management of his or her drug therapy, and includes review of the patient's drug therapy and communication with the patient's 120 121 prescribing health care provider as licensed under chapter 458, 122 chapter 459, chapter 461, or chapter 466, or similar statutory 123 provision in another jurisdiction, or such provider's agent or such other persons as specifically authorized by the patient, 124 125 regarding the drug therapy. However, nothing in this subsection 126 may be interpreted to permit an alteration of a prescriber's 127 directions, the diagnosis or treatment of any disease, the 128 initiation of any drug therapy, the practice of medicine, or the 129 practice of osteopathic medicine, unless otherwise permitted by 130 law. "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" also includes any 131 other act, service, operation, research, or transaction incidental to, or forming a part of, any of the foregoing acts, 132 133 requiring, involving, or employing the science or art of any branch of the pharmaceutical profession, study, or training, and 134 shall expressly permit a pharmacist to transmit information from 135 persons authorized to prescribe medicinal drugs to their 136 patients. The practice of the profession of pharmacy also 137 includes the administration of vaccines influenza virus 138 139 immunizations to adults pursuant to s. 465.189. Section 3. Effective October 1, 2012, subsection (6) is 140

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141 added to section 465.009, Florida Statutes, to read: 142 465.009 Continuing professional pharmaceutical education.-143 (6) Notwithstanding subsections (1)-(5): 144 (a) Each pharmacist certified to administer a vaccine or 145 epinephrine autoinjection under s. 465.189 must complete a 3-146 hour continuing education course, which shall be offered by a 147 statewide professional association of physicians in this state 148 accredited to provide educational activities designated for the American Medical Association Physician's Recognition Award (AMA 149 150 PRA) Category I credit, on the safe and effective administration 151 of vaccines and epinephrine autoinjection as part of biennial 152 relicensure or recertification. This course may be offered in a 153 distance-learning format and must be included in the 30 hours of 154 continuing professional pharmaceutical education specified in 155 subsection (1). 156 (b) Each pharmacist must submit confirmation of having 157 completed the course specified in paragraph (a) on a form 158 provided by the board when submitting fees for license renewal. 159 Failure to comply with paragraphs (a) and (b) results (C) 160 in the revocation of the authorization for a pharmacist to 161 administer a vaccine or epinephrine autoinjection under s. 162 465.189. Such authorization may be restored upon completion of 163 such requirements. 164 Section 4. Except as otherwise specifically provided in 165 this act, this act shall take effect July 1, 2012.

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
