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14	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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16	Section 1. Section 465.189, Florida Statutes, is amended
17	to read:
18	465.189 Administration of vaccines and epinephrine
19	autoinjection influenza virus immunizations
20	(1) In accordance with guidelines of the Centers for
21	Disease Control and Prevention for each recommended immunization
22	or vaccine, a pharmacist may administer the following vaccines
23	to an adult within the framework of an established protocol
24	under a supervising physician licensed under chapter 458 or
25	chapter 459:
26	(a) Influenza vaccine.
27	(b) Pneumococcal vaccine.
28	(2) In accordance with guidelines of the Centers for
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29 Disease Control and Prevention, a pharmacist may administer the 30 shingles vaccine within the framework of an established protocol 31 and pursuant to a written or electronic prescription issued to 32 the patient by a physician licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 33 459. 34 (3) In order to address any unforeseen allergic reaction, a pharmacist may administer epinephrine using an autoinjector 35 36 delivery system within the framework of an established protocol 37 under a supervising physician licensed under chapter 458 or 38 chapter 459. 39 (1) Pharmacists may administer influenza virus immunizations to adults within the framework of an established 40 protocol under a supervisory practitioner who is a physician 41 42 licensed under chapter 458 or chapter 459. Each protocol shall 43 contain specific procedures for addressing any unforeseen 44 allergic reaction to influenza virus immunizations. 45 (4) (4) (2) A pharmacist may not enter into a protocol unless he or she maintains at least \$200,000 of professional liability 46 47 insurance and has completed training in administering vaccines authorized under influenza virus immunizations as provided in 48 49 this section. 50 (5) (3) A pharmacist administering vaccines under this 51 section influenza virus immunizations shall maintain and make 52 available patient records using the same standards for confidentiality and maintenance of such records as those that 53 54 are imposed on health care practitioners under s. 456.057. These 55 records shall be maintained for a minimum of 5 years. 56 (6) (4) The decision by a supervising physician licensed Page 2 of 6

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57 under chapter 458 or chapter 459 supervisory practitioner to enter into a protocol under this section is a professional 58 59 decision on the part of the practitioner, and a person may not 60 interfere with a physician's supervisory practitioner's decision as to entering into such a protocol. A pharmacist may not enter 61 62 into a protocol that is to be performed while acting as an 63 employee without the written approval of the owner of the pharmacy. Pharmacists shall forward vaccination immunization 64 65 records to the department for inclusion in the state registry of immunization information. 66

67 (7) (7) (5) Any pharmacist seeking to administer vaccines influenza virus immunizations to adults under this section must 68 be certified to administer such vaccines influenza virus 69 70 immunizations pursuant to a certification program approved by 71 the Board of Pharmacy in consultation with the Board of Medicine 72 and the Board of Osteopathic Medicine. The certification program 73 shall, at a minimum, require that the pharmacist attend at least 74 20 hours of continuing education classes approved by the board. 75 The program shall have a curriculum of instruction concerning 76 the safe and effective administration of such vaccines influenza 77 virus immunizations, including, but not limited to, potential 78 allergic reactions to such vaccines influenza virus 79 immunizations.

80 <u>(8)(6)</u> The written protocol between the pharmacist and 81 supervising physician <u>under this section</u> must include particular 82 terms and conditions imposed by the supervising physician upon 83 the pharmacist relating to the administration of <u>vaccines</u> 84 <u>influenza virus immunizations</u> by the pharmacist <u>pursuant to this</u>

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85 section. The written protocol shall include, at a minimum, 86 specific categories and conditions among patients for whom the 87 supervising physician authorizes the pharmacist to administer 88 such vaccines influenza virus immunizations. The terms, scope, 89 and conditions set forth in the written protocol between the 90 pharmacist and the supervising physician must be appropriate to the pharmacist's training and certification for administering 91 92 such vaccines immunization. Pharmacists who have been delegated 93 the authority to administer vaccines under this section 94 influenza virus immunizations by the supervising physician under 95 the protocol shall provide evidence of current certification by the Board of Pharmacy to the supervising physician. A 96 97 supervising physician physicians shall review the administration 98 of such vaccines influenza virus immunizations by the pharmacist 99 pharmacists under such physician's supervision pursuant to the 100 written protocol between them, and this review shall take place as outlined in the written protocol. The process and schedule 101 102 for the review shall be outlined in the written protocol between 103 the pharmacist and the supervising physician.

104 <u>(9)(7)</u> The pharmacist shall submit to the Board of 105 Pharmacy a copy of his or her protocol or written agreement to 106 administer <u>vaccines under this section</u> influenza virus 107 immunizations.

Section 2. Subsection (13) of section 465.003, Florida
Statutes, is amended to read:

110 465.003 Definitions.—As used in this chapter, the term: 111 (13) "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" includes 112 compounding, dispensing, and consulting concerning contents,

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113 therapeutic values, and uses of any medicinal drug; consulting 114 concerning therapeutic values and interactions of patent or 115 proprietary preparations, whether pursuant to prescriptions or 116 in the absence and entirely independent of such prescriptions or 117 orders; and other pharmaceutical services. For purposes of this subsection, "other pharmaceutical services" means the monitoring 118 119 of the patient's drug therapy and assisting the patient in the management of his or her drug therapy, and includes review of 120 121 the patient's drug therapy and communication with the patient's prescribing health care provider as licensed under chapter 458, 122 123 chapter 459, chapter 461, or chapter 466, or similar statutory provision in another jurisdiction, or such provider's agent or 124 such other persons as specifically authorized by the patient, 125 126 regarding the drug therapy. However, nothing in this subsection 127 may be interpreted to permit an alteration of a prescriber's 128 directions, the diagnosis or treatment of any disease, the 129 initiation of any drug therapy, the practice of medicine, or the 130 practice of osteopathic medicine, unless otherwise permitted by 131 law. "Practice of the profession of pharmacy" also includes any 132 other act, service, operation, research, or transaction 133 incidental to, or forming a part of, any of the foregoing acts, 134 requiring, involving, or employing the science or art of any 135 branch of the pharmaceutical profession, study, or training, and shall expressly permit a pharmacist to transmit information from 136 137 persons authorized to prescribe medicinal drugs to their patients. The practice of the profession of pharmacy also 138 includes the administration of vaccines influenza virus 139 immunizations to adults pursuant to s. 465.189. 140

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Section 3. Effective October 1, 2012, subsection (6) is 141 142 added to section 465.009, Florida Statutes, to read: 143 465.009 Continuing professional pharmaceutical education.-144 (6) Notwithstanding subsections (1) - (5): 145 (a) Each pharmacist certified to administer a vaccine or 146 epinephrine autoinjection under s. 465.189 must complete a 3hour continuing education course, which shall be offered by a 147 148 statewide professional association of physicians in this state 149 accredited to provide educational activities designated for the 150 American Medical Association Physician's Recognition Award (AMA 151 PRA) Category I credit, on the safe and effective administration 152 of vaccines and epinephrine autoinjection as part of biennial 153 relicensure or recertification. This course may be offered in a 154 distance-learning format and must be included in the 30 hours of 155 continuing professional pharmaceutical education specified in 156 subsection (1). 157 (b) Each pharmacist must submit confirmation of having 158 completed the course specified in paragraph (a) on a form 159 provided by the board when submitting fees for license renewal. (C) 160 Failure to comply with paragraphs (a) and (b) results 161 in the revocation of the authorization for a pharmacist to 162 administer a vaccine or epinephrine autoinjection under s. 163 465.189. Such authorization may be restored upon completion of 164 such requirements. 165 Section 4. Except as otherwise specifically provided in 166 this act, this act shall take effect July 1, 2012.

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
