2 An act relating to real estate appraisers; amending s. 3 475.617, F.S.; revising terminology applicable to 4 education requirements for registered trainee 5 appraisers, certified residential appraisers, and 6 certified general appraisers; authorizing qualifying 7 education courses completed by applicants for 8 registration as a trainee or certification as a 9 residential appraiser or general appraiser to be 10 completed through Internet-based instruction; revising 11 the education and experience requirements for 12 certified residential appraisers and certified general 13 appraisers according to certain real property appraiser qualification criteria adopted by the 14 15 Appraiser Qualifications Board of the Appraisal 16 Foundation on a specified date; authorizing certain 17 schools to provide in-person classroom instruction, Internet-based instruction, or both; providing 18 19 requirements for Internet-based instruction and course 20 examinations; providing a definition; providing an effective date. 21 22 23 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 24 Section 1. 25 Section 475.617, Florida Statutes, is amended 26 to read: 27 475.617 Education and experience requirements.-28 To be registered as a trainee appraiser, an applicant (1)

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29 must present evidence satisfactory to the board that she or he 30 has successfully completed at least 100 hours of approved 31 qualifying education academic courses in subjects related to 32 real estate appraisal, which must include coverage of the 33 Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice, or its 34 equivalent, as established by rule of the board, from a 35 nationally recognized or state-recognized appraisal organization, career center, accredited community college, 36 37 college, or university, state or federal agency or commission, or proprietary real estate school that holds a permit pursuant 38 to s. 475.451. The board may increase the required number of 39 40 hours to not more than 125 hours. All qualifying education 41 courses may be completed through in-person classroom instruction 42 or Internet-based instruction. A classroom hour is defined as 50 43 minutes out of each 60-minute segment. Past courses may be 44 approved on an hour-for-hour basis.

To be certified as a residential appraiser, an 45 (2)46 applicant must present satisfactory evidence to the board that she or he has met the minimum education and experience 47 48 requirements prescribed by rule of the board. The board shall 49 prescribe by rule education and experience requirements that 50 meet or exceed the following real property appraiser 51 qualification criteria adopted on December 9, 2011 February 20, 52 2004, by the Appraisal Qualifications Board of the Appraisal Foundation: 53

(a) Has at least 2,500 hours of experience obtained over a
24-month period in real property appraisal as defined by rule.
(b) Has successfully completed at least 200 classroom

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57 hours, inclusive of examination, of approved qualifying 58 education academic courses in subjects related to real estate 59 appraisal, which must include a 15-hour National Uniform 60 Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice course, or its 61 equivalent, as established by rule of the board, from a 62 nationally recognized or state-recognized appraisal organization, career center, accredited community college, 63 64 college, or university, state or federal agency or commission, 65 or proprietary real estate school that holds a permit pursuant to s. 475.451. All qualifying education courses may be completed 66 67 through in-person classroom instruction or Internet-based 68 instruction. A classroom hour is defined as 50 minutes out of 69 each 60-minute segment. Past courses may be approved by the board and substituted on an hour-for-hour basis. 70

71 (3) To be certified as a general appraiser, an applicant 72 must present evidence satisfactory to the board that she or he 73 has met the minimum education and experience requirements prescribed by rule of the board. The board shall prescribe 74 75 education and experience requirements that meet or exceed the 76 following real property appraiser qualification criteria adopted 77 on December 9, 2011 February 20, 2004, by the Appraisal 78 Qualifications Board of the Appraisal Foundation:

(a) Has at least 3,000 hours of experience obtained over a
30-month period in real property appraisal as defined by rule.

(b) Has successfully completed at least 300 classroom
hours, inclusive of examination, of approved <u>qualifying</u>
<u>education</u> academic courses in subjects related to real estate
appraisal, which must include a 15-hour National Uniform

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85 Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice course, or its 86 equivalent, as established by rule of the board, from a 87 nationally recognized or state-recognized appraisal 88 organization, career center, accredited community college, 89 college, or university, state or federal agency or commission, 90 or proprietary real estate school that holds a permit pursuant to s. 475.451. All qualifying education courses may be completed 91 through in-person classroom instruction or Internet-based 92 93 instruction. A classroom hour is defined as 50 minutes out of 94 each 60-minute segment. Past courses may be approved by the 95 board and substituted on an hour-for-hour basis. 96 (4) Internet-based instruction may be approved by the 97 board as an option for completing the classroom hours necessary 98 for satisfactory completion of any qualifying education course 99 required by this section. Schools authorized by this section to deliver qualifying education courses have the option to provide 100 the courses through in-person classroom instruction, Internet-101 102 based instruction, or both. Internet-based instruction must use a delivery method 103 (a) 104 certified or approved by an independent certifying organization 105 authorized by the board. 106 (b) Internet-based instruction must include a written, 107 closed-book final examination proctored by an appropriate 108 individual who represents the public interest and is free from 109 any conflict of interest. As used in this paragraph, the term

110 <u>"written" means administered on paper or electronically via a</u>

111 <u>computer work station or other electronic device. An oral</u>

112 <u>examination is not an acceptable form of final examination.</u>

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113 (5) (4) Each applicant must furnish, under oath, a detailed statement of the experience for each year of experience she or 114 he claims. Upon request, the applicant shall furnish to the 115 116 board, for its examination, copies of appraisal reports or file memoranda to support the claim for experience. Any appraisal 117 118 report or file memoranda used to support a claim for experience 119 must be maintained by the applicant for no less than 5 years 120 after the date of certification.

121 (6) (5) The board may implement the provisions of this
 122 section by rule.
