115.135, F.S.; providing that an employee of the state or any county, municipality, or other political subdivision who is the spouse of a military servicemember may not be compelled to work overtime or extended work hours during active duty deployment of his or her spouse; prohibiting the imposition of a sanction or penalty upon such employee for failure or refusal to work overtime or extended work hours during the period of his or her spouse's active duty deployment; requiring an employing authority to grant a request by such employee for unpaid leave for specified purposes during the active duty deployment; providing a limitation on such unpaid leave; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 115.135, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

115.135 Overtime and leave considerations; spouses of military servicemembers on active duty.—

(1) (a) An employee of the state or any county, municipality, or other political subdivision who is the spouse of a servicemember of the United States Armed Forces may not be compelled by his or her employing authority to work overtime or extended work hours during a period in which his or her spouse

- (b) An employing authority may not impose a sanction or penalty upon an employee who is the spouse of a servicemember of the United States Armed Forces for failure or refusal to work overtime or extended work hours during a period in which his or her spouse is deployed on active duty military service.
- (2) An employing authority shall grant a request by an employee who is the spouse of a servicemember of the United

 States Armed Forces deployed on active duty military service for unpaid leave not to exceed 4 working days for the purpose of attending to matters directly related to the implementation of deployment orders of his or her spouse.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2013.
