A bill to be entitled

An act relating to elections; creating s. 97.0111, F.S.; establishing the rights of the electorate; requiring that any restriction on voting rights or any change in voting practices be narrowly tailored to serve a compelling state interest; providing equal protection of the right to vote; authorizing the use of a violation of the act as a claim or defense in a

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WHEREAS, Florida has a long history of problems in election administration which has resulted in significant barriers to participation in the democratic process, and

judicial proceeding; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, in 2011, the Florida Legislature passed House Bill 1355, which was signed into law by the Governor and yielded many restrictive and undemocratic changes in election administration, including the reduction of the number of early voting days, stringent restrictions on third-party voter registration organizations, and the requirement that certain electors changing their addresses at polling places vote provisional ballots, and

WHEREAS, as a result, many residents of this state experienced long lines at early voting sites and polling places in the 2012 general election, with wait times of several hours, causing potentially thousands of voters to leave early voting sites and polling places before exercising their right to vote, and

WHEREAS, in 2012, the Florida Department of State issued inaccurate lists of potential noncitizen voters to county

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supervisors of elections, which created confusion among predominantly minority voters, and

WHEREAS, the right to vote is the most precious of all American rights, and the right to free, fair, and accessible elections should be a fundamental right, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 97.0111, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

97.0111 Rights of the electorate.-

- (1) A United States citizen who is at least 18 years of age and who is a resident of this state has an explicit, fundamental right to vote in any election held in the political subdivision in which the citizen resides. The right to vote may not be denied or abridged by this state or its political subdivisions or by any private or public entity or person. Any restriction on voting rights, or any change in voting practices or procedures which would diminish access to the ballot, must be narrowly tailored to serve a compelling state interest.
- (2) A United States citizen who is at least 18 years of age and who is a resident of this state shall have equal protection of his or her right to vote.
- (3) A person whose right to vote has been denied or abridged by this state or its political subdivisions or by any private or public entity or person in violation of this section may assert such violation as a claim or defense in a judicial proceeding to obtain appropriate relief.
 - Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
