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- (b) Each member shall be appointed to a 4-year term.

 However, for the purpose of achieving staggered terms, the

 respective members to serve a 2-year term. All subsequent
 appointments shall be for 4-year terms. Any vacancy that occurs
 shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment
 and shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term of that
 seat.
- (c) A member may not receive a commission, fee, or financial benefit in connection with serving on the council.

 Pursuant to the provisions of s. 112.061, the council members may be entitled to be reimbursed for per diem and travel expenses by the state agency the member represents. If a member is not affiliated with a state agency, the member shall be reimbursed by the Department of Legal Affairs.
 - (3) ORGANIZATION AND SUPPORT.
- (a) The first meeting of the council shall be held no later than September 1, 2014. Thereafter, the council shall meet at least once per quarter per calendar year. Meetings may be held via teleconference or other electronic means.
- (b) A majority of the members of the council shall constitute a quorum.
- (c) The Department of Legal Affairs shall provide the council with staff necessary to assist the council in the performance of its duties.

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- (4) DUTIES.—The council shall:
- (a) Develop recommendations for comprehensive programs and services for victims of human trafficking to include recommendations for certification criteria for safe houses and safe foster homes.
- (b) Make recommendations for apprehending and prosecuting traffickers and enhancing coordination of responses.
- (c) Annually hold a statewide policy summit in conjunction with an institution of higher learning in this state.
- (d) Work with the Department of Children and Families to create and maintain an inventory of human trafficking programs and services in each county, including, but not limited to, awareness programs and victim assistance services, which can be used to determine how to maximize existing resources and address unmet needs and emerging trends.
- (e) Develop policy recommendations that advance the duties of the Council and that further the efforts to combat human trafficking in our state.
- (5) REPORT.—By October 31 of each year, the council shall submit a report to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives summarizing the accomplishments of the council during the preceding fiscal year and making recommendations regarding the development and coordination of state and local law enforcement and social services responses to fight human trafficking and support victims.
