Senate Resolution

A resolution recognizing January 2015 as "Haitian Independence Month" in Florida.

WHEREAS, located in the West Indies on the western third of the Island of Hispaniola, Haiti lies between Cuba and Puerto Rico in the Caribbean Sea, and

WHEREAS, the island was first inhabited by native tribes, the Arawak, Taíno, and Caraibe, and in 1492 was claimed by Christopher Columbus for Spain, which later ceded the western third of the island to France, and

WHEREAS, after the French Revolution in 1789, and under the leadership of Generals Toussaint L'Ouverture, Dessalines, and Pétion, slaves revolted against the oppressive slavery regime, and

WHEREAS, on January 1, 1804, the Republic of Haiti declared its independence and became the first, and only, state to be created from a successful slave rebellion, and

WHEREAS, Haiti was the first independent nation in Latin America and the first post-colonial independent nation led by blacks in the world, and

WHEREAS, by declaring independence, Haiti became the second independent state in the Western Hemisphere, joining only the United States in this unique and exemplary distinction, and

WHEREAS, Haiti and the United States share a history of freedom and belief in human rights, and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 1805, Haiti ratified its first constitution, strengthening national unity and bringing together the country's various factions and peoples by reaffirming the

permanent abolition of slavery and the freedom and equality of all Haitians, and

WHEREAS, Haitians and Haitian Americans have played an important role in the history of the Americas as educators, leaders, activists, and artists, and

WHEREAS, many famous and inspirational Haitians and Haitian Americans have left their indelible mark on this state, country, and the world, including icons such as Jean Baptiste Point du Sable, founder of the City of Chicago; civil rights activist W.E.B. Du Bois; State Representative Yolly Roberson; City of North Miami Mayor Smith Joseph; National Football League player Pierre Garçon; author and candidate for the Nobel Prize for Literature in 2009, Frankétienne; and Tony Award-winning actress and singer Nikki M. James, and

WHEREAS, Florida is home to nearly half a million Haitian Americans who improve our communities with a wealth of talent and achievement and strive, through their diversity and culture, to exemplify the meaning of freedom and democracy, and

WHEREAS, Little Haiti, in the City of Miami, is a symbol of the undeniable relationship between this state and the Republic of Haiti, and

WHEREAS, the richness and complexness of Haiti's resilient culture and people transformed the island into an exceptional nation that has continued to profoundly impact the world since Christopher Columbus set foot on its shores more than 500 years ago, NOW, THEREFORE,
