I. Summary:

SB 386 authorizes an elector who moves within the state to notify the Supervisor of Elections of the change in his or her address via online form. The bill requires Supervisors of Elections to make an online address change form available on his or her official website.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2015.

II. Present Situation:

Currently, s. 97.1031, F.S., requires electors to change their address utilizing a voter registration application. However, that statute also allows an elector who is moving within Florida to notify the Supervisor of Elections of the elector's new county via telephone or electronic means. To confirm that the elector is who he or she represents himself or herself to be, the elector must provide his or her date of birth in the telephone call or electronic communication. In addition to these two methods, an elector who moves within Florida may also change his or her address via written notice to the new Supervisor of Elections.

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

SB 386 authorizes an elector who moves within the state to notify the Supervisor of Elections of the change in his or her address via online form. The bill requires supervisors of Elections to make an online address change form available on his or her official website.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2015.
