Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 381.825, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

381.825 Palliative care consumer and professional information and education program.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Appropriate" means consistent with applicable legal, health, and professional standards; consistent with the patient's clinical and other circumstances; and consistent with the patient's reasonably known wishes and beliefs.
- (b) "Medical care" means services provided, requested, or supervised by a physician, a physician assistant, or an advanced registered nurse practitioner.
- (c) "Palliative care" means patient-centered and familycentered medical care offered throughout the continuum of an
 illness which optimizes quality of life by anticipating,
 preventing, and treating the suffering caused by a serious
 illness. Palliative care involves addressing physical,
 emotional, social, and spiritual needs and facilitating patient
 autonomy, access to information, and choice. The term includes,
 but is not limited to, discussions of the patient's goals for
 treatment; discussion of treatment options appropriate to the
 patient, including, if appropriate, hospice care; and

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53 comprehensive pain and symptom management.

- (d) "Serious illness" means a medical illness or physical injury or condition that substantially impacts quality of life for more than a short period of time. The term includes, but is not limited to, cancer, renal or liver failure, heart or lung disease, and Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.
- (2) The department shall establish a palliative care consumer and professional information and education program. The purpose of the program is to maximize the effectiveness of palliative care initiatives in this state by making comprehensive and accurate information and education about palliative care available to the public, health care practitioners, and health care facilities.
- information and resources, including links to external resources, about palliative care which shall include, but not be limited to, continuing education opportunities for health care practitioners; information about palliative care delivery in the home and in primary, secondary, and tertiary care settings; best practices for palliative care delivery; and consumer educational materials and referral information for palliative care, including hospice care.
- (4) The department may develop and implement other initiatives regarding palliative care services and education to further the purposes of this section.

- Section 2. Palliative Care and Quality of Life

 Interdisciplinary Task Force.—There is established within the

 Department of Health a Palliative Care and Quality of Life

 Interdisciplinary Task Force, which is a task force as defined in s. 20.03, Florida Statutes.
- (1) The primary purpose of the task force is to consult with and advise the department on matters relating to the establishment, maintenance, operation, and outcome evaluation of palliative care initiatives in this state.
- (2) The task force shall consist of 11 members, 5 of whom are appointed by the Governor, 3 of whom are appointed by the President of the Senate, and 3 of whom are appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. All appointments shall be made by December 31, 2015. The task force membership shall include:
- (a) Professionals who have expertise in various aspects of palliative care, including, but not limited to, professionals representing the fields of interdisciplinary palliative care; medicine, nursing, social work, pharmacy, and spiritual counseling; and patient and family caregiving or advocacy. The appointing officials, in consultation with the State Surgeon General, shall ensure that representation on the task force reflects a broad perspective regarding palliative care in a variety of inpatient, outpatient, and community settings, such

as acute care, long-term care, and hospice care, and a variety of populations, including pediatric, youth, and adult.

- (b) One member who is a designee of the American Cancer Society, appointed by the Governor.
- (c) One member who is a designee of the Florida Hospice and Palliative Care Association, appointed by the Governor.
- (d) One member who is a designee of the Department of Veterans' Affairs, appointed by the Governor.
- (e) At least two members who are board-certified hospice and palliative medicine physicians, physician assistants, or nurses, one appointed by the President of the Senate and one appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (3) The task force shall adopt internal organizational procedures as necessary for its efficient organization which must, at a minimum, require the task force to elect a chair and vice chair whose duties shall be established by the task force.
- (4) The department shall provide such staff, information, and other assistance as is reasonably necessary to assist the task force in carrying out its responsibilities.
- (5) Members of the task force shall serve without compensation but may receive reimbursement as provided in s.

 112.061, Florida Statutes, for travel and other necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties.
- (6) The department shall establish a time and place for regular meetings of the task force, which shall meet at least twice a year.

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(7) The task force shall submit a preliminary report to
the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of
the House of Representatives by January 15, 2017, detailing its
recommendations for the establishment, maintenance, operation,
and outcome evaluation of palliative care initiatives in this
state and its recommendation for any statutory changes to be
considered by the Legislature. The task force shall also submit
a followup report to the Governor, the President of the Senate,
and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 31,
2018, detailing the implementation, by the department or by
legislative action, of the recommendations in the preliminary
report.
(8) This section expires December 31, 2018.

Section 3. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
