A bill to be entitled

An act relating to water oversight and planning; establishing the Water Oversight and Planning Board to address water issues in the state; providing membership and terms; providing meeting requirements; requiring the Department of Environmental Protection to provide staff to the board; providing reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses; providing meeting requirements; providing board duties; requiring the board to submit its long-range plans to the department, each water management district, the Governor, and the Legislature; requiring the board to provide its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. (1) The Water Oversight and Planning Board is established as the statewide oversight board for issues affecting and impacting water supply and water supply planning, water quality restoration and protection, flood protection and flood plain management, and natural systems protection and restoration.

(2) The Water Oversight and Planning Board shall consist of 15 members as follows:

45	(3)(a) The board shall meet at least quarterly, and each				
46	meeting within any one year shall be held in a different				
47	location in the state. Additional meetings may be held upon the				
48	call of the chair. A majority of the members of the board				
49	constitutes a quorum. Board meetings may be conducted by				
50	conference call, teleconferencing, or similar technology.				
51	(b) Members of the board shall serve for a term of 4				
52	years. A vacancy occurring during a member's term shall be				

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filled in the same manner as the initial appointment. The board shall be chaired by a member chosen by majority vote.

- (c) The Department of Environmental Protection shall provide the board with staff necessary to assist the board in the performance of its duties.
- (d) Members of the board shall serve without compensation but are entitled to reimbursement for per diem and travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061, Florida Statutes.

 Reimbursements made pursuant to this paragraph may be paid from appropriations provided to the Department of Environmental Protection by the Legislature in the General Appropriations Act.
- (4) Recognizing that water is an essential public resource that benefits the entire state and must be carefully managed to ensure its sustainability, the Water Oversight and Planning

 Board shall use the best science available to:
- (a) Review and monitor district regional water supply plans developed under s. 373.709, Florida Statutes.
- (b) Use data provided by the water management districts and others with peer-reviewed scientific data to:
- 1. Develop 5-year, 10-year, and 20-year forecasting plans to ensure the state has the appropriate quantities and quality of water at the appropriate times of the year for people, agriculture, and the protection and restoration of natural systems.
- 2. Identify and inventory existing sources of potable water.

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3. Identify new sources of water for potable uses, agricultural uses, industrial uses, and protection and restoration of natural systems.

- 4. Identify the largest consumers of water by water management district and overall statewide.
- (c) Consolidate and compile existing water data supplied by the water management districts and others with peer-reviewed scientific data into a standardized format for creation of an electronic water data center. The water data center shall be housed within the Florida Geological Survey and be available to the public.
- (d) Building upon the reports previously submitted by the Department of Environmental Protection, investigate techniques, financial incentives, and regulatory mechanisms to promote or require water conservation.
- (e) Working with the Department of Education, investigate ways to promote water conservation education and practices.
- (f) Promote reuse of reclaimed water and treated wastewater for nonpotable purposes, such as landscape irrigation and farming, as appropriate.
- (g) Review recommendations contained in the regional water supply plans developed under s. 373.709, Florida Statutes.
- (h) Assess mechanisms to ensure water management districts expedite the protection and restoration of natural systems, including by expanded use of reservations of water under s. 373.223(4), Florida Statutes.

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(i) Investigate mechanisms to incentivize the construction of technologies such as desalination and reuse to produce new sources of potable water.

- (j) Review the impact of underground activity, including drilling, hydraulic fracturing, chemical injection, mining, and stormwater injection, that may impact or pollute the aquifer, surface waters, or natural systems.
- (k) Randomly sample dredging projects from permits issued by the water management districts to assess the impacts of dredging activities on natural systems.
- (1) With input from the Fish and Wildlife Conservation

 Commission, develop recommendations to protect natural systems,

 including lakes, springs, wetlands, marshes, wildlife habitats,
 recreational sites, and streams.
- (m) Make recommendations for improved management of beaches and coastal systems, Everglades restoration, wetland and submerged land protection, and techniques for beach renourishment.
- (5) By September 1 annually, the board shall submit its long-range plans to the Department of Environmental Protection, each of the water management districts, the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (6) Every other year, beginning on September 1, 2017, the board shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the

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Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2016.

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
