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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to community health worker certification; creating s. 381.989, F.S.; defining terms; requiring the Department of Health to approve qualified third-party credentialing entities to develop and administer voluntary community health worker certification programs; establishing criteria for the approval of a third-party credentialing entity; requiring a third-party credentialing entity to issue a certification to certain qualified individuals who meet the grandfathering standards established by the entity; establishing a maximum fee for such certification; providing an effective date.

WHEREAS, Florida faces a critical shortage of health care providers in primary care, oral health, and behavioral health, particularly in rural and inner-city areas, and

WHEREAS, there is substantial evidence that the comprehensive coordination of care for individuals who have chronic diseases and the provision of information regarding preventive care can improve individual health, create a healthier population, reduce health care costs, and increase appropriate access to health care, and

WHEREAS, community health workers have demonstrated success in increasing patient access to health care in medically underserved communities, providing culturally appropriate education regarding disease prevention and management, providing translation and interpretation services for non-English speakers, improving health outcomes through the coordination of

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care, increasing individual health care literacy and advocacy, and improving the health care of medically underserved communities, while reducing the overall costs to the state's health care system, and

WHEREAS, the Legislature recognizes that the services provided by community health workers are an essential component of the health care delivery system in this state, and

WHEREAS, the Florida Community Health Worker Coalition has begun to develop a voluntary process that will ensure that only qualified individuals are designated as certified community health workers by a department-approved, third-party credentialing entity, which will allow community health workers to earn a living wage and be part of an integrated health delivery team, NOW, THEREFORE,

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 381.989, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

49 381.989 Community health worker.—

- (1) DEFINITIONS.—As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Certification" means the voluntary process by which a department-approved, third-party credentialing entity issues a credential to an eligible individual to function as a certified community health worker.
- (b) "Certified community health worker" means a community health worker to whom the department-approved, third-party credentialing entity has issued a credential affirming that individual's mastery of community health worker core

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competencies.

(c) "Community health worker" means a frontline health care worker who is a trusted member of, or who has an unusually deep understanding of, the community that he or she serves and who performs the following functions:

- 1. Serves as a liaison, link, or intermediary between health care or social services or service providers and members of the community in order to facilitate patient access to health care services, improve the quality of such services, and help make health care providers more culturally aware of the community served.
- 2. Provides information regarding available resources and social support and serves as a health care advocate for individuals in a community setting.
- 3. Builds individual and community capacity to prevent disease and promote health by increasing knowledge regarding wellness programs, disease prevention, and self-sufficiency among the members of the community through a range of activities, such as community outreach, education, and advocacy.
- 4. Collects data to help identify the health care needs in a medically underserved community by:
- a. Assisting members of the community in improving their ability to effectively communicate with health care providers.
- b. Providing culturally and linguistically appropriate health and nutrition education.
- c. Advocating for improved individual and community health, including oral health, behavioral health, and nutrition.
 - d. Providing referrals, followup, and coordination of care.
 - (d) "Core competencies" means the basic knowledge, skills,

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and abilities necessary for a community health worker to carry out his or her work responsibilities.

- (e) "Department" means the Department of Health.
- (f) "Grandfathering" means a time-limited process by which a department-approved, third-party credentialing entity grants community health worker certification to a qualified individual who was providing community health worker services before the establishment of the community health worker certification program as provided in this section.
- (g) "Medically underserved community" means a community in a geographic area that has a shortage of health care providers and a population that includes individuals who do not have public or private health insurance, are unable to pay for health care, and have incomes at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty level.
- (h) "Recertification" means the biennial renewal of a community health worker certification.
- (2) THIRD-PARTY CREDENTIALING ENTITIES.—The department shall approve one or more third-party credentialing entities to develop and administer voluntary community health worker certification programs for individuals who provide community health worker services. A third-party credentialing entity shall request such approval from the department in writing. In order to obtain department approval, the third-party credentialing entity must demonstrate its ability to:
- (a) Establish professional requirements and standards that an applicant must achieve in order to obtain a community health worker certification, including forms and procedures for the receipt, review, and approval of applications for initial

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community health worker certification and for recertification,
or to qualify for grandfathering, as that term is defined in
this section.

- (b) Develop and apply core competencies and examination instruments according to nationally recognized certification and psychometric standards.
- (c) Maintain a professional code of ethics and disciplinary procedures that apply to certified community health workers.
- (d) Maintain a publicly accessible database of all individuals holding a community health worker certification, which must include any ethical violations committed by the individual.
- (e) Require continuing education for recertification or reinstatement of a community health worker certification.
- (f) Administer a continuing education provider program to ensure that only qualified providers offer continuing education to a certified community health worker.
- (g) Maintain a community health worker advisory committee of at least 8 and no more than 15 members consisting of at least 2 representatives of the department, 5 representatives of the Florida Community Health Worker Coalition, and up to 2 representatives of other key stakeholder organizations identified by the department. Such members shall be appointed by the organization they represent. The department-approved, third-party credentialing entity may appoint additional members to the advisory committee.
- (3) GRANDFATHERING.—Department-approved, third-party credentialing entities shall, for a period of at least 15 months after implementation of the community health worker
