Present subsection (9) of section 322.08, 40 Florida Statutes, is renumbered as subsection (10), and a new subsection (9) is added to that section, to read: 41 42 322.08 Application for license; requirements for license 43 and identification card forms .-44 (9) (a) To support carrying out the duties of the Department of Veterans' Affairs prescribed in s. 292.05 and to 45 facilitate its outreach to veterans residing in this state, the 46 47 application form for an original, a renewal, or a replacement 48 driver license or identification card must include a voluntary 49 checkoff authorizing a veteran of the United States Armed Forces 50 to request written or electronic information on federal, state, 51 and local benefits and services available to veterans. The 52 veteran may elect to receive requested information through Page 2 of 6

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53 United States mail or by e-mail. The requested information shall 54 be delivered to the veteran by a third-party provider selected 55 by the Department of Veterans' Affairs to act on its behalf. 56 The department shall collaborate with the Department (b) 57 of Veterans' Affairs to administer this subsection. The 58 department shall report monthly to the Department of Veterans' 59 Affairs the name and mailing address or e-mail address of each 60 veteran who requests information as provided in paragraph (a). 61 Following receipt of the monthly report, the Department of 62 Veterans' Affairs shall disseminate the contact information for 63 each such veteran to the third-party provider acting on its 64 behalf. The third-party provider must be a nonprofit 65 organization with sufficient ability to communicate with 66 veterans residing throughout this state. For purposes of this 67 paragraph, the term "nonprofit organization" means an 68 organization exempt from the federal income tax under s. 501 of 69 the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or any federal, state, or 70 local governmental entity. 71 In addition to the requirements of paragraph (b), the (C) 72 Department of Veterans' Affairs shall disseminate the contact 73 information for a veteran who selects the voluntary checkoff to 74 the appropriate county or city veteran service officer in order 75 to facilitate further outreach to veterans. 76 (d)1. The contact information of a veteran which is 77 obtained by a third-party provider pursuant to this subsection 78 may be used only as authorized by this subsection. The third-

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79 party provider may not sell such contact information. Except as otherwise provided, the third-party provider must maintain the 80 81 confidentiality of the contact information in accordance with 82 chapter 119 and the federal Driver's Privacy Protection Act of 83 1994, 18 U.S.C. ss. 2721 et seq. 2. A person who willfully and knowingly violates this 84 85 paragraph commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable 86 as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083. 87 Section 2. Military and Overseas Voting Assistance Task 88 Force.-The Military and Overseas Voting Assistance Task Force, a 89 task force as defined in s. 20.03, Florida Statutes, is created within the Department of State. The task force is created for 90 the express purpose of studying issues involving the development 91 92 and implementation of an online voting system that allows absent 93 uniformed services voters who are overseas to electronically 94 submit voted ballots. 95 The task force is composed of 11 members, as follows: (1) The Secretary of State or his or her designee, who 96 (a) shall serve as chair of the task force. 97 The Adjutant General or his or her designee. 98 (b) 99 (C) The executive director of the Agency for State 100 Technology or his or her designee. (d) 101 One member of the Senate appointed by the President of 102 the Senate. 103 (e) One member of the House of Representatives appointed 104 by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 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105 Three supervisors of elections appointed by the (f) 106 Florida State Association of Supervisors of Elections. 107 Three individuals appointed by the Secretary of State, (g) 108 with relevant expertise in computers, the Internet, or other 109 associated technologies. (2) Members of the task force shall serve without 110 111 compensation, but are entitled to reimbursement for per diem and 112 travel expenses pursuant to s. 112.061, Florida Statutes. 113 (3) The task force, at a minimum, shall study and report 114 on the following issues: 115 (a) Any factor that limits the ability of absent uniformed services voters who are overseas to request, receive, and return 116 117 absentee ballots within the current statutory time period for 118 casting absentee ballots. (b) The costs associated with the development and 119 120 implementation of an online voting system. 121 The feasibility of absent uniformed services voters (C) 122 who are overseas using an online voting system to electronically 123 submit a voted ballot. 124 (d) The security of electronically submitting a voted 125 ballot through an online voting system. 126 Procedures adopted by other states to facilitate (e) 127 greater electoral participation among absent uniformed services 128 voters who are overseas. 129 (4) The Secretary of State shall submit a report to the 130 Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the Page 5 of 6

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131 House of Representatives by July 1, 2017, containing the task 132 force's recommendation of whether the state should pursue the 133 development and implementation of an online voting system that 134 allows absent uniformed services voters who are overseas to electronically submit voted ballots. If the task force favorably 135 136 recommends an online voting system, the report must include 137 recommended steps for developing and implementing such a system. 138 The task force shall expire upon submission of its report. 139 (5) The Division of Elections of the Department of State 140 shall provide support staff for the task force. The Agency for 141 State Technology shall assist the task force upon request. 142 Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 2016.

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
