10	(1) LEGISLATIVE IN	NTENT The intent of this section is to
11	recognize that music the	erapy affects public health, safety, and
12	welfare, and that the pr	ractice of music therapy should be
13	subject to regulation to	o protect the public from the practice of
14	music therapy by unregis	stered individuals.
15	(2) DEFINITIONS	
16	(a) "Board certif:	ied music therapist" means an individual
17	who has completed the ed	ducation and clinical training
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18	requirements established by the American Music Therapy
19	Association, and who holds current board certification from the
20	national Certification Board for Music Therapists.
21	(b) "Music therapist" means a person registered to
22	practice music therapy pursuant to this section.
23	(c) "Music therapy" means the clinical and evidence based
24	use of music interventions to accomplish individualized goals
25	for people of all ages and ability levels within a therapeutic
26	relationship by a board certified music therapist. The music
27	therapy interventions may include, music improvisation,
28	receptive music listening, song writing, lyric discussion, music
29	and imagery, singing, music performance, learning through music,
30	music combined with other arts, music-assisted relaxation,
31	music-based patient education, electronic music technology,
32	adapted music intervention and movement to music. The practice
33	of music therapy does not include the diagnosis or assessment of
34	any physical, mental, or communication disorder. This term
35	includes:
36	1. Accepting referrals for music therapy services from
37	medical, developmental, mental health, or education
38	professionals; family members; clients; caregivers or others
39	involved and authorized with provision of client services;
40	2. Collaborating with primary care providers to review the
41	client's diagnosis, treatment needs, and treatment plan before
42	providing services to a client with an identified clinical or
43	developmental need, or collaborating with the client's treatment
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44	team while providing music therapy services to the client;
45	3. Conducting a music therapy assessment of a client to
46	determine if treatment is indicated, and if so, collecting
47	systematic, comprehensive, and accurate information to determine
48	the appropriateness and type of music therapy services to
49	provide for the client;
50	4. Developing an individualized music therapy treatment
51	plan, including individualized goals, objectives, and specific
52	music therapy approaches or interventions, for the client that
53	is based upon the results of the music therapy assessment;
54	5. Developing and implementing an individualized music
55	therapy treatment plan that is consistent with any other
56	developmental, rehabilitative, habilitative, medical, mental
57	health, preventive, wellness care, or educational services being
58	provided to the client;
59	6. Evaluating the client's response to music therapy and
60	the music therapy treatment plan, documenting change and
61	progress and suggesting modifications, as appropriate;
62	7. Developing a plan for determining when the provision of
63	music therapy services is no longer needed in collaboration with
64	the client, physician, or other provider of health care or
65	education of the client, family members of the client, and any
66	other appropriate person upon whom the client relies for
67	support;
68	8. Minimizing any barriers to ensure that the client
69	receives music therapy services in the least restrictive
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70	environment;
71	9. Collaborating with and educating the client and the
72	family or caregiver of the client, or any other appropriate
73	person regarding the needs of the client that are being
74	addressed in music therapy and the manner in which the music
75	therapy treatment addresses those needs; and
76	10. Utilizing appropriate knowledge and skills to maintain
77	informed practice including use of research, reasoning, and
78	problem solving skills to determine appropriate actions in the
79	context of each specific clinical setting.
80	(3) REGISTRATION
81	(a) The department shall register an applicant as a music
82	therapist when the applicant submits to the department:
83	1. A completed application form issued by the department;
84	2. Application and registration fees; and
85	3. Proof of passing the examination for board
86	certification offered by the national Certification Board for
87	Music Therapists, or any successor organization, or submits
88	proof of being transitioned into board certification, and
89	submits proof that the applicant is currently a board certified
90	music therapist.
91	(b) A music therapist registered under this section shall
92	renew such registration biennially by submitting to the
93	department a renewal fee and proof that the applicant holds an
94	active certificate as a board certified music therapist.
95	(c) A registrant shall inform the department within 10
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	Americamente No.
96	days of a change of the registrant's address or change in status
97	as a board certified music therapist.
98	(4) PROHIBITED ACTS; EXEMPTIONS A person shall not
99	practice music therapy or represent himself or herself as being
100	able to practice music therapy in this state unless the person
101	is registered pursuant to this section. Nothing in this section
102	may be construed to prohibit or restrict the practice, services,
103	or activities of the following:
104	(a) Any person licensed, certified, or regulated under the
105	laws of this state in another profession or occupation or
106	personnel supervised by a licensed professional in this state
107	performing work, including the use of music, incidental to the
108	practice of his or her licensed, certified, or regulated
109	profession or occupation, if that person does not represent
110	himself or herself as a music therapist;
111	(b) Any person whose training and national certification
112	attests to the individual's preparation and ability to practice
113	his or her certified profession or occupation, if that person
114	does not represent himself or herself as a music therapist;
115	(c) Any practice of music therapy as an integral part of a
116	program of study for students enrolled in an accredited music
117	therapy program, if the student does not represent himself or
118	herself as a music therapist; or
119	(d) Any person who practices music therapy under the
120	supervision of a registered music therapist, if the person does
121	not represent himself or herself as a music therapist.
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122	(5) DEPARTMENT AUTHORITY
123	(a) The department is authorized to establish application,
124	registration, and renewal fees estimated necessary to implement
125	the provisions of this section, but each fee shall not exceed
126	<u>\$50.</u>
127	(b) The department is authorized to adopt rules to
128	implement this section.
129	(c) The department may deny or revoke registration or
130	renewal of registration for failing to meet the requirements in
131	this section.
